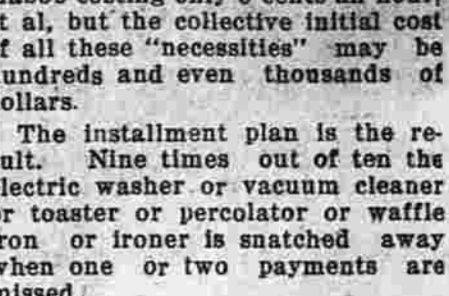

**ROW OVER APPLES GOES TO APPEAL**

Owner of Farm Socks Buyer Who Dickered With Former Proprietor.

Who owns the apples? That's the question which may be decided in Tolland county superior court when the case of Daniel Civallo of Bolton, charged with breach of the peace and assault, comes up for a hearing.

At a hearing in the Bolton town court at the home of Justice of the Peace James A. Connors last night, Civallo was found guilty on both counts and fined five dollars and costs for assault and one dollar and costs for breach of the peace. He took an appeal and was freed in \$200 bail.

The charges against Civallo are the result of an altercation he had with Harry Silverstein who lives at the foot of Nigger Hill, Bolton, over some apples on the old Loud farm which was bought by Civallo a short time ago.

Silverstein, it seems, had made a previous agreement with the former owner of the farm for the purchase of the apples, it being agreed that they were to remain on the trees until ripe. The other day, when Silverstein went to the farm to begin his harvest, he met with unexpected opposition. Civallo was present and insisted that the apples belonged to him, inasmuch as he had bought the whole farm.

The argument reached a crisis when Civallo, it is alleged, punched Silverstein in the face, and, according to Silverstein, drew a revolver. Then Silverstein retreated. Afterward he had Civallo arrested.

Bolton is quite interested over the outcome of the case and for that matter, so are many Manchester people, for both Civallo and Silverstein are quite well known here.
