The French steamer Formosa has picked up 720 survivors and it seems probable that the Principe Dudine and other vessels have picked up other survivors.

A message from the Principe Dudine to the Italian embassy says that the Mafalda lost a propellor and that water rushed in causing a boiler explosion and the consequent sinking of the vessel. Marine experts here believe that possibly this message indicates that the propellor shaft may have broken, opening the plates of the vessel and thus letting the sea into the hold of the vessel.


Officials of the Navigazione Generale Italiana denied reports that the Principessa Mafalda had been sunk by an explosion caused by faulty machinery.

1926. Much comment has been caused here by discussions as to whether the Principessa Mafalda had been experiencing difficulty during her voyage prior to the disaster. She was three days behind her schedule, as advertised here.

Most of the survivors will be landed at Bahia, it is reported.

The Principessa Mafalda was built in 1908 and during the war was used by the Italian government as a troop ship. Her tonnage, according to Lloyd's Register, is 9,-210. She was 485 feet long and had and cash from a hiding place of her a 56-foot beam.

The liner made one trip to the United States, touching at New York, just before the war broke out in 1914.
