(3) What Determines Connecticut?

For 100 miles along Long Island Sound there stretches the southern boundary of a busy little commonwealth. The eastern boundary runs 45 miles northward, and the western 76 miles in the same general direction. Connecting the northern extremes of these two lines and running approximately parallel to the Sound is the northern boundary. (27) ~

Within these modest limits lies one of the original thirteen colonies, busy, thrifty, inventive and conservative -Connecticut. To the northward, the westward and the eastward lie three other of the thirteen colonies that started the United States. To the north it is Massachusetts; to the west it is New York and to the east it is Rhode Island.

The 4,965 square miles, of which 145 is water, within its borders make Connecticut the 46th state in area. The average length of the state is about 95 miles and the average width 57. In comparison with other New England states, Connecticut

is fifth in size, only its neighbor on the east being smaller. Besides Rhode Island, Delaware is the only other state that is smaller. Connecticut occupies 1-610 of the total area of the 48 states and 1-13 of the total area of the New England states. Connecticut is slightly larger than Jamaica and a third as large as Switzerland. .

Connecticut lies between the parallels 40 degrees 59 minutes and 43 degrees 3 minutes north latitude, and the meridians 71 degrees 47 minutes and 73 degrees 43 minutes west longitude.





Another good fight will come when the naval appropriations bill comes up. The outcome of the Geneva conference has given an impetus to the big navy movement, and while there will be strong opposition it looks as if money for ight new cruisers would be voted. Confirmation of certain pitesi-

dential appointments is considered doubtful, especially that of Eugene Meyer as chairman of the Federal Farm Loan Board. An alien property bill probably will be pushed through, and there will be any number of minor measures nassed.
