## Connecticut-Fourth in Woolen Goods.

Five New England states are among the first six producers of woolen goods in the United States. Connecticut with a product valued at \$32,747.733 stood fourth at the last census. The first three states, in order of their ranking, were Massachusetts, with an output valued at \$93.079,965; Pennsylvania, with a product worth \$46,466,746, and Maine whose output was valued at \$40,-002,293. The three other New England states turned out woolen goods valued as follows: New Hampshire, \$28,906,292; Rhode Island, \$21,141,962, and Vermont, \$14,327,688. The total value for the 48 states was \$361,524,034.

Both the absolute value and the percentage value of the Connecticut production have been steadily increasing. During the first 25 years of the present century, the value of woolen goods for the country as a whole increased 120.9%. This same increase for Connecticut was 304%. During 1900 Connecticut factories turned out 6.9% of the total for the United States. The 1925 output was 9% of the country's total.

The output for all states during 1900 was valued at \$118,-430,158, Connecticut's share being \$8,097,218. During that year 4,668 wage earners in Connecticut factories earned \$1,-760,917. Twenty-five years later 6,470 wage earners made \$8,140,105. The cost of materials during 1900 was \$4,951,162 and 1925, \$19,540,893.
