It does not believe there is the slightest necessity for the widening of Birch street or any other cross street extending between Spruce and Main, either now or at any time in the future. It believes that any

money that might be expended by the town on such widening would be money wasted on mere display for which there is no justification and for which there would still be no justification even if there were not

many more imperative demands on the exchequer-which there are.

Connecticut stands third among all the states in the annual output of cutlery (not including silver and plated cutlery) and edged tools and steel springs (railway, vehicle, heavy machine, etc., not made in rolling mills). In both industries Connecticut plants turn out 11% of the total for the United States.

Thirty-one factories and 3.000 persons are engaged in the manufacture of cutlery and edged tools. The value of their product is \$9,227,412. During 1900, however, 44 Connecticut plants with a product valued at \$5.362,620 produced 36% of the total for the United States. Thus Connecticut's percentage of the total has decreased considerably since the first of the cen-Massachusetts leads in this industry with a product valued at \$32,309.071. New York is second. is stock-taking. The indications are, according to Patrick Hogan, Minister for Agrlculture, that 1928 will be the greatest in the history of the Free State. The future ahead looks bright, Hogan believes, and there is every ground for an optimistic outlook.

"The average Irish farmer is working hard," Hogan declared in an interview with International News Service. "By his policy of increased production of better articles, he will be in a very good position to take advantage of any increase in prices and demand that is likely to arise from improving industrial conditions in the'markets where he sells his products. "The economic position of the

farming industry in the Free State," Hogan continued, "is intrinsically sound. It is true that the lower prices now ruling are causing a dimunition in the farmers' incomes, but the majority of Irish farmers are effectively meeting the difficulty. Farmers Doing Well

"They are doing this in two ways. First, by working for an increased production of better class animals and high grade produce. Secondly, by reducing their expenditures and cutting out what they regard as non-essentials.

"Of course, the farmer who is entirely dependent on the grazing of store cattle to fatten is not in a good financial condition, simply because the present low price of beef cattle bears no profitable relation to the price he bought at last spring.

"On the other hand, he will be able to buy his stores cheaply now, and be able to make a fair profit next spring. Big farmers, employing a large amount of capital, also are not doing well, but these men are very few in number; and bear Asked about the immediate prospects, the Minister said they were "excellent."
