

PLAN TO SPEED UP **NEW POST OFFICES**

Bill Before President Calls For An Additional \$10,-000,000 Appropriation.

Washington, Feb. 7-Construction of new post offices and other this one job. federal buildings throughout the country will be speeded up under a bill which today awaited the sigmature of President Coolidge.

This measure, authorizing the expenditure of \$10,000,000 in addition to a like amount already appropriated for new construction outside of the District of Columbia, will save the government many unnecessary delays in carrying out its tato prower. ten-year building program. It will also make it possible for the postoffice and treasury departments to plan for new buildings in many cities not provided for under that program.

Present Law

The existing law allows the expenditure of \$10,000,000 annually, this sum to be allotted on a prorata basis among the various cities which are to have new buildings. It was found, however, that the allotments for certain cities were not sufficient to start work in the first year. This was particularly true of New York City, where the initial the ground on which the new post office is to stand.

MOVIE FANS ARE NOW DEMANDING QUALITY FILMS

New York .- "Quality" motion pictures not "gilded trappings' that ane being dished out as added features-are what the American movie audiences are demanding today, in the opinion of Wilton A. Barrett, Executive Secretary of the National Board of Review of Motion Pictures.

He told International News Service in an interview that picture audiences are insisting on a better grade of screen entertainment and reacting against the side features put on in many motion picture palaces, such as vaudeville, tableaus, revues and super-orchestras.

"The future of the motion picture business will depend upon what is shown on the screen," he said.

The motion picture producers realize the situation and are striving to meet the wishes of the public, he asserted. But, with \$00 pictures being produced annually, it is asking too much to expect all of them to be worth while-in fact, 100 good pictures out of the \$00 is a pretty fair average.

Economically unsound "All this ginger bread stuff that is being put out with the pictures is economically unsound and the producers realize it," said Barrett. Barrett made it plain that the National Board of Review is opposed to legal censorship. It is a trained, volunteer, disinterested citizen organization, composed of upward of three hundred persons who review films in New York City before they are released for general exhibition to the public, with associate, advisory members. and affiliated citizen groups in many localities throughout the NATION'S ROADS country.

"We are in favor of the constructive method of selecting better pictures and building up audiences and support for them through the work of community groups, in order that the producers may be en-couraged to make the finest pictures." he said.
