

### NEW STRIKE OF 350,000 MINERS NOW THREATENS

Senate Committee Hears  
That Union Men in Twelve

April 1.

Washington, Feb. 28.—A new strike of 350,000 union miners in twelve states is threatened April 1. United Mine Workers officials reported today to the special Senate coal committee.

After nearly a week's investigation in Pennsylvania fields, the committee, headed by Senator Gooding, Republican of Idaho, returned to Washington today to prepare a report for the Interstate Commerce Commission.

In Payroll Hold-Up.

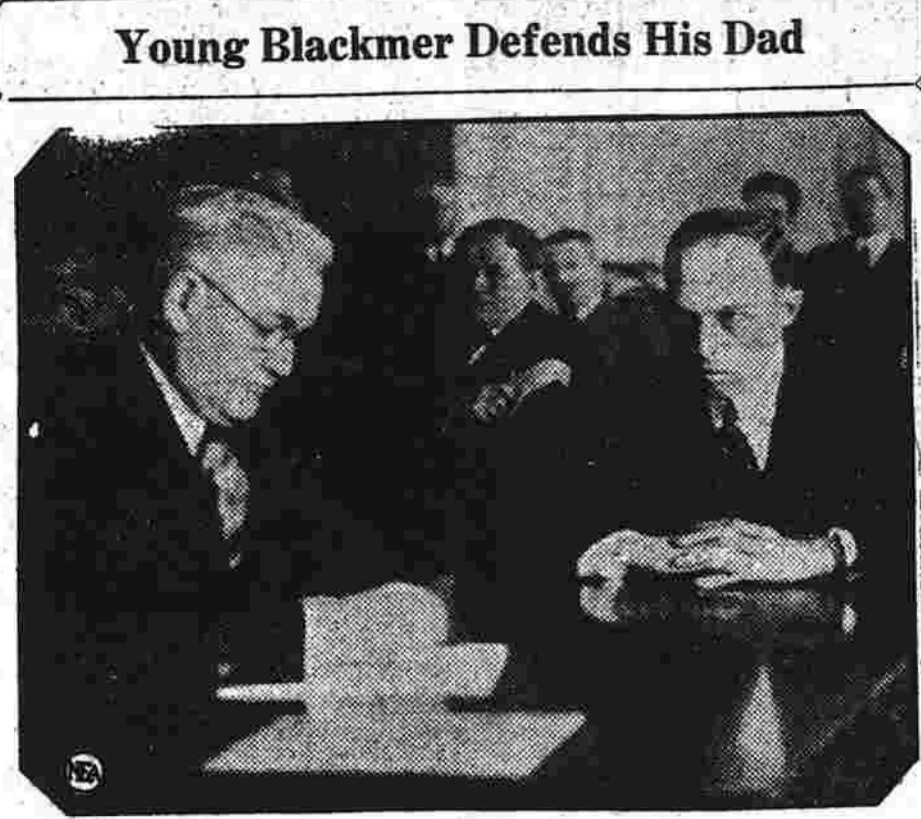

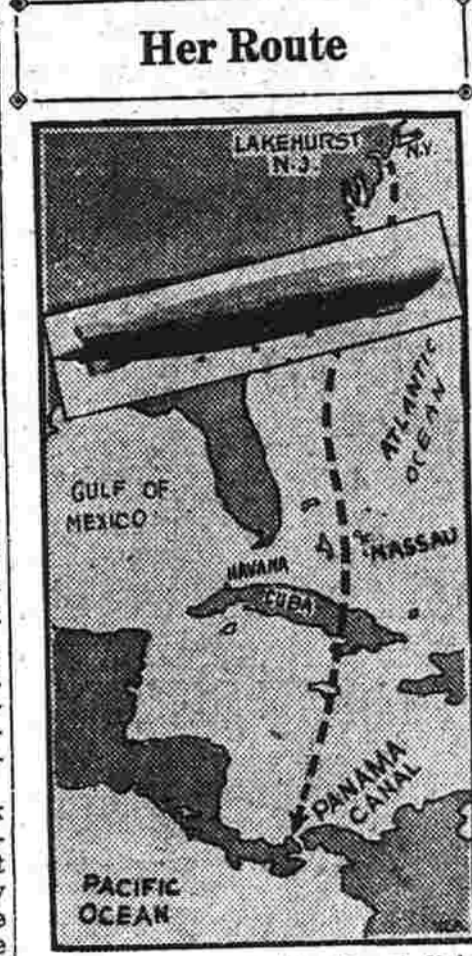

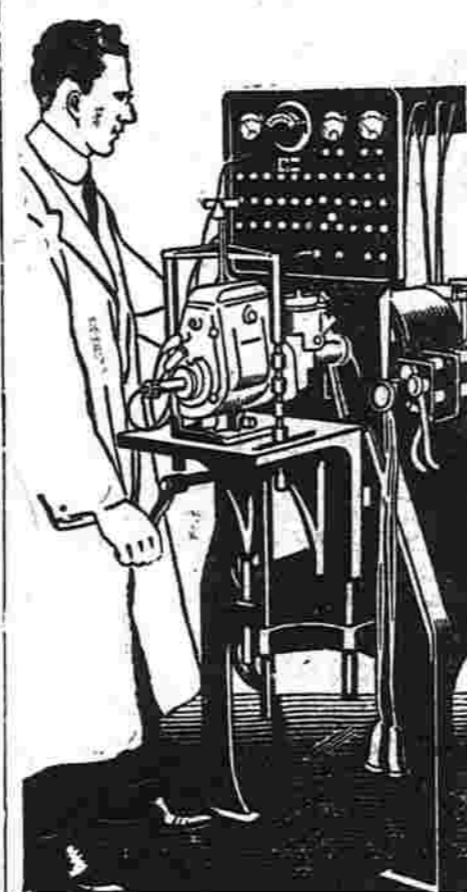
