FATHER SAYS HE MURDERED HIS TWO SONS

(Continued from page 1)

clared Mrs. Lawrence's nagging about his children drove him into murdering them, but he denied that he had any connection with the crime or even knew of its execution.

Chisholm told how he took his boys to the canal bank and induced them to bind themselves and jump into the icy water. Later, after hours of grilling, he called for a pencil and wrote a new confession which authorities believe is substantially correct.

Strange Confession It was as strange a document as ever a father wrote. It calmly related how Chisholm lured his boys to their death with a promise that they were to see their grandmother. It pictured them going laughing to the canal in which he drowned them, playing cowboy on the way.

It told of the father's farewell kiss to them. It set forth he showed him to carry him below the surface, into the canal before he could cry out.

The other lad, it showed realized in one brief instant, that he and his brother were being murdered and screamed. His scream was stifled in the water as his weighted body followed the other youngster's.

Mrs. Lawrence, who has posed as completely in the man's confession, but is being held for further questioning. She is booked as a material witness with bond fixed at \$1,000. Chisholm said he would plead guilty and ask for the death penalty, hoping it would be executed promptly.

The man's arrest was brought about by a neighbor, Edward Hill, who became suspicious after reading newspaper accounts of the finding of two unidentified bodies, then missing the boys from the neighborhood.

Chisholm said he had intended to drown all three of his sons, but that Robert, the twin brother of George, would not go with them that night because he knew his grandmother was dead.

While Connecticut is not one of the states which play a major part in the manufacturing of furniture, more than two dozen factories employing a thousand persons turn out furniture valued at more than \$3,000,000 in this state yearly.

Among all states Connecticut stands 25th in the product value of its furniture factories. Connecticut's output during 1922, only 4% of \$68,145,913, the total for the United States, was worth \$3,668,720.

The value of mattresses and springs turned out by Connecticut factories during 1922 was \$977,882, or 8% of the total for the United States; the value of window and door screens and weather strips was \$291,614 or 1.3% of the total; window shades and fixtures, \$136,744, or 3%.

Washington, March 5.—Mr. Herbert Hoover, presidential candidate, is no rabble-rouser.

Mr. Hoover, if he is elected president, will win on the basis of his record, his ability, his genius for organization and for inspiring loyalty among those who work under him.

There are two Hoovers. One is Hoover the food administrator, Hoover the secretary of commerce, Hoover the executive, Hoover the organizer, Hoover the engineer, Hoover the trouble-shooter.

Mr. Hoover shines when there is no demand for tagwagging, oratorical flourishes or histrionics. He can direct large groups of men efficiently.

The other Hoover is Hoover as he appeared before the Senate committee engaged on preparing a flood relief bill.

Here was Hoover on the defense, Hoover, a chorine symphony, Hoover, a rather embarrassing situation, Hoover dragged into the notion of a drink so low as gin, the average young lady of the present Manhattan generation will consent to drink almost anything that happens to be on her companion's hip.

That Hoover did not show to advantage for that Hoover was and is uninspiring. Before this committee, a large part of it supposed to be hostile, he shifted uneasily. 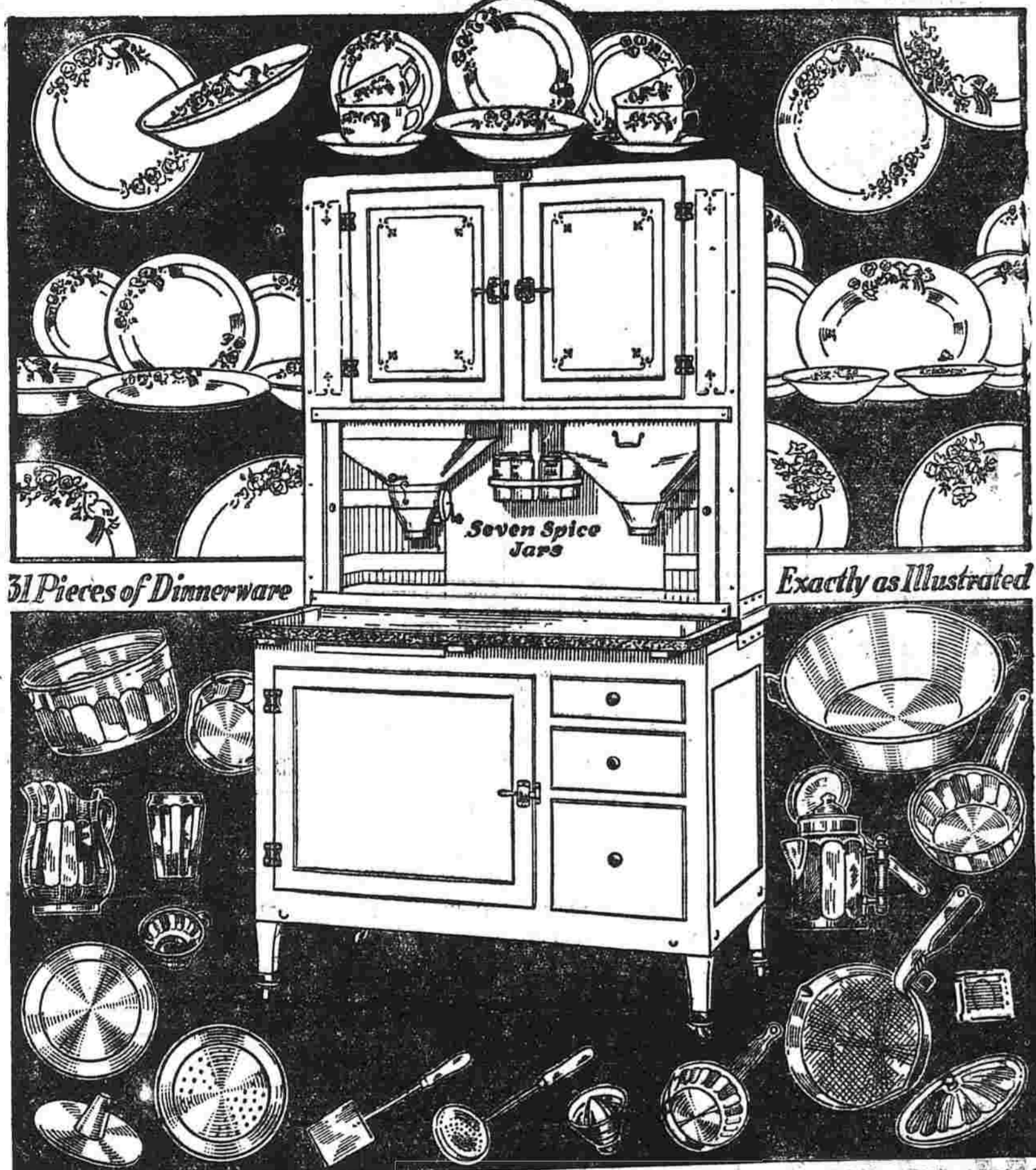

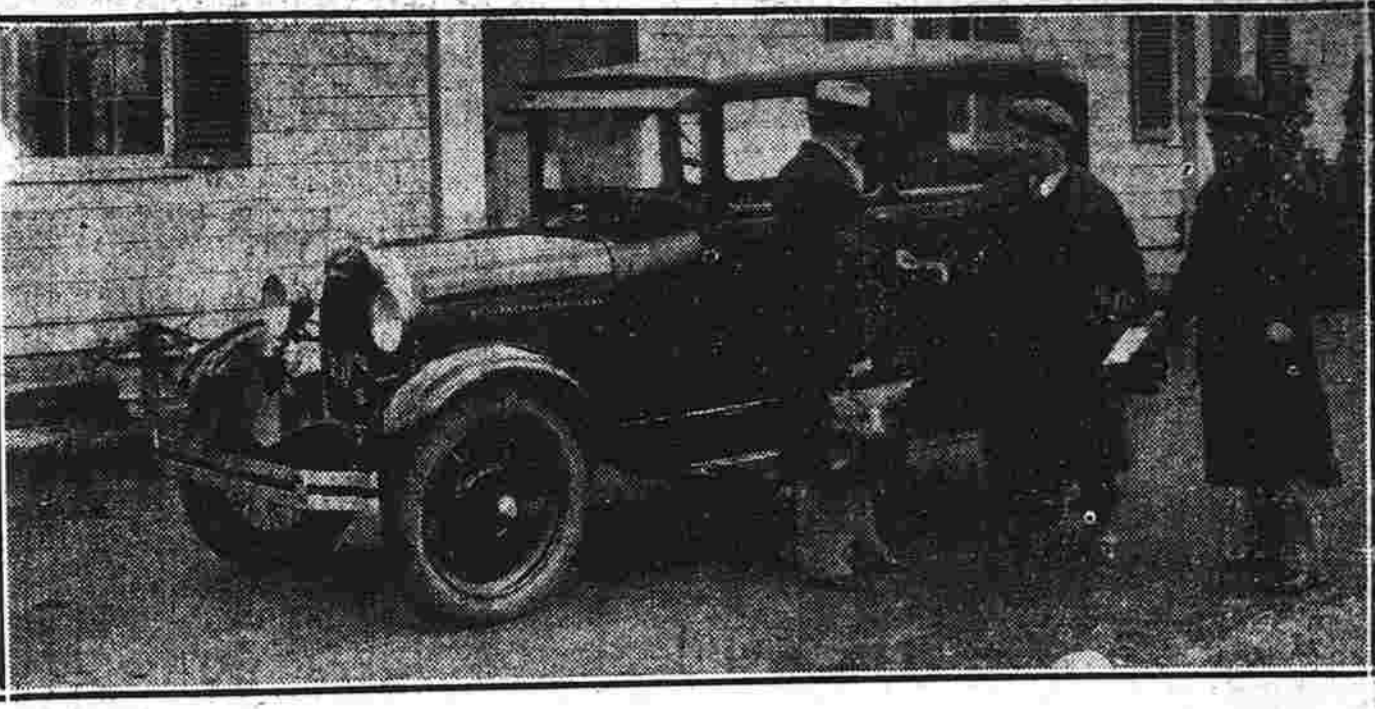

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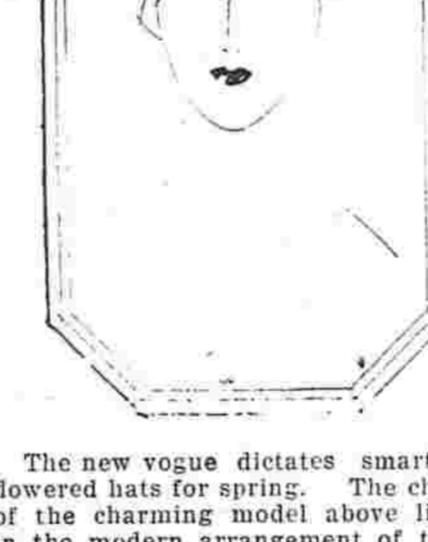

CARR, HAHN ABLE TO BREAK MARKS			
Olympic Team Trainer Says They Can Do Much Better If They Wish.

New York, March 5.—Men like Hahn and Sabin Carr, who set up almost incredible records in the half mile run and pole vault respectively within recent days, probably have not reached the full limit of possible performance, according to a statement made to the writer today by Lamson Robertson, head coach of the American Olympic team. He declared that it would be possible for Hahn to have bettered 1.51 for the half mile on Saturday night, if he had been raced to the tape the way most record-breakers have a right to expect.			
"When you get athletes like Hahn and Carr shooting for records, the limit resolves itself into the question of what else we may be able to give them in modern equipment," Robertson declared. "Pole vault records began soaring as soon as we introduced the hampole pole twenty years ago. It has remained for a super-vaulter like Carr to make the most of the improved implement."			
Fast Track			
"Hahn went to the mark on Saturday night, facing a nearly perfect course. It was a fast, springy track, banked perfectly on the turns and wide enough to prevent any congestion. It was conceded that Hahn had it in him to run the half mile in record time, if conditions were right. They were almost perfect, and with Sam Martin's fast early pace, Lloyd did the rest. He beat Perser's outdoor record of 1:51.35 by exactly a fifth of a second."			
"Which was the more meritorious performance? Well, Hahn had no wind resistance to contend with but, then, he didn't get the competition Peltzer got, either. The German was chased home by Lowe, one of his greatest, when he made his record."			
Wind resistance, or lack of it, also enters into the matter of Carr's indoor and outdoor pole vaulting, it seems. There is none indoors and because of this, and other factors, Robertson looks for him to reach his greatest heights as an indoor vaulter. The other factors that he may expect to aid him are the superior spring in the wooden runway and the fact that it does not become out up, as does a cinder path, by the spikes of competitors.
