

for the hop-off for America. A strong westerly wind was blowing, making flying conditions unfavorable.



(101) Savings Banks' Assets Increase.

The assets of Connecticut savings banks have more than doubled during the last twenty years. In 1907 there were 87 savings banks with total assets of \$270,935,319. On September 30, 1927, there were 75 such banks with total assets of \$637,093,414.

873,148 during the same period, and the total amount of savings deposits from \$256,372,061 to \$575,609,549.


During 1907, 76 banks paid interest of 4%, the highest rate at that time, two paid 3% %, eight, 31/2%, and one paid no interest. Nineteen of the 75 savings banks operating at present

more than half of the assets of the savings bank today, whereas in 1907 this item, amounting to \$83,408,743, was less than a third of the total assets. The largest single holding in 1907 was railroad bonds and stocks, which amounted to \$102,593,518 almost half the total assets .: In 1927 railroad bonds and stocks, amounting to \$100,005,475, were less than a sixth of the total assets. State, town, city and district bonds and obligations have also decreased. In 1907 these holdings amounted to \$49.843.835, today they total \$25,610,306. Public utility bonds and bonds of foreign countries were not among the assets of savings banks in 1907. The total amount of the former on September 30, 1927, was \$43,7\$1,439 and the latter \$40,412,-851. Loans on personal security have decreased from \$3,666,-083 in 1907 to \$2,827,622 in 1927. U.S. government securities increased from \$20,000 in 1907 to \$32,797,839 in 1927, and bank stocks from \$7,198,546 to \$26,426,135.
