On January 13, 1926, Dr. Moran was suspended from the staff of the Manchester Memorial Hospital for failure to observe the rules of the hospital relative to histories and records of patients.

On May 12, 1926, the trustees lifted Dr. Moran's suspension, upon his promise to observe the hospital rules and regulations in the future. On November 14, 1927, the superintendent of the hospital, acting within her authority, temporarily suspended Dr. Moran from practice in the hospital. That suspension was ratified by the trustees on December 13.

Washington, April 12 .- Evidence purporting to show that ex-Secretary of the Interior Albert B. Fall made a "shut-out" proposition of leasing the Teapot Dome naval oil reserve to Harry F. Sinclair, was introduced by the government today at Sinclair's criminal conspiracy trial.

Amos L. Beaty, former president of the Texas Company, was put on the stand by the government. He said that in March 1922, a month before the Sinclair lease was signed, he went to Fall with an offer for the naval reserve.

"Fall told me," Beaty testified, that he had an offer from Sinclair that was satisfactory."

The Texas Company's capitalization Beaty said, was \$164,500,000. Beaty said Fall had told him he would give preference to the company that acquired title to certain placed mining claims then existant on the Dome. Sinclair already had

Another oil man who fared similarly followed Beaty on the stand. He was Birch Helms, of the Texas Pacific Oil Company.

Helms made the rounds of Washington in the spring of 1922 seeking a lease on Teapot Dome, he said.

"I' was referred to Secretary Fall," Helms declared. "I saw him about the middle of April. He told me he would be glad to consider a proposition."

Sinclair had actually signed a lease a week before this, on April

Armenian Throws Whole Factory Into Panic-No Reason For Actions.

Troy, N. Y., April 12 .- Fifty em- this time two Germans and an oyees, including many girls, were Irishman taking the "long chance" thrown into a panic shortly before noon today when a crazed Armenian, known as "Mike" ran amuck with a gun in the Troy Garment Company in the Gurley building, Fulton and Union streets.


Two men shot by the Armenian before he turned the gun on himself are dying in the Samaritan hospital. "Mike" also is in a critical condition. The victims of the maniac's gun

are John Chalaux, 24, of Watervliet, and Harold Hughes, 30 of this city. Before he turned the gun on himself the man fired point blank at John J. Shea, president of the garment company, but missed. The man was talking with Hughes when suddenly he whipped

a .32 calibre revolver from his pocket and started firing. Hughes dropped to the floor with a bullet in his abdomen. A second later Chalaux was shot in the chest.

As the Armenian reached a rear stairway, he pointed the gun at his own head. There was a report and his body slid down the stairs into a crumpled heap.

FOUR KILLED BY BLAST

Twenty-six trans-Atlantic passenger steamers line the path which the silver gray German monoplane "Bremen" has taken in its projected flight from Baldonnel Field, near Dublin, to Mitchel Field, N. Y., but none of them up to shortly before noon had reported sighting the plane. Only a few of these liners, however, were close enough to the European coast to have sight-

The first word from the Bremen with Captain Hermann Koehl, Com-Baron Ehrenfried von. Huenefeld aboard, came in the form of a Central News dispatch from Galway which said that the plane passed over Galway on the west coast of Ireland, at 7:05 a. m. (2:05 a. m., New York time). The plane was flying strongly in a northwesterly irection. Then at 7:25 a. m., civil guards on Oran island, at the en-

trance to the Bay of Galway, reported sighting the plane. Weather Conditions

Weather conditions were reported satisfactory as far as mid-Atlantic but there were indications that after that point is reached the flyers may run into difficu'ties. Dr. James H. Kimball of the New York Weather Bureau said that strong winds, severe cold and sleet along the north Atlantic coast await the flyers. He said that easterly winds are blowing over Halifax at the rate of 3? miles an hour and that if the Bremen keeps up her anticipated schedule she should arrive at Cape Grace, just in time to meet a storm which is moving northward from Care Cod.
