Because he will deal extensively with every campaign issue in his notification speech, particularly prohibition and farm relief, the governor is determined to have the ceremony broadcast through radio stations in every part of the country. As yet, however, he has not been Five Big Flat Cars Pile Up able to obtain assurances from the National Broadcasting Company that the nationwide hookup can be secured for the hours on the night he has in mind.

Decides On Date

It is understood the governor has settled on the week of August 20 for the notification and that he would prefer either Wednesday or Thursday night if proper radio arrangements can be made.

The notification ceremony will be held on the steps of the state capitol where for twenty years the governor has been a familiar figure. First as a member of the Assombly. then as leader of that body, and finally as chief executive. In front of the capitol there is a spacious park which can easily accommodate the 100,000 Democrats expected to attend for the event.

The Ceremony

Mayor John Boyd Thacher this week will announce the appointment of a committee of leading citizens to aid in planning the details of the ceremony. The mayor already has announced that on the night of the notification all streets in the vicinity of the capitol will be closed to traffic.
