
HOOVER PLANS SIX SPEECHES FOR CAMPAIGN

Other Addresses of G. O. P. Nominee Will Be Over the Radio From His Washington Home.

Stanford University, Calif., Aug. 6. - Herbert Hoover's personal campaign for the presidency, if he has his own way, will consist of six major speeches in as many sections of the country with occasional use of the radio to broadcast prepared addresses from Washington, it was learned here today.

The Republican nominee definitely rejected all proposals for barnstorming trips on which he would be expected to make a series of speeches. The nominee told his friends that such a campaign would lower the dignity of a presidential candidate and that he would not agree to it. Washington, Aug. 6 .- Every presidential year brings forth number of books dealing with political phases and personages. The current political season offers an unusually worthy crop of reading matter for the campaign months.

No one has yet written a comprehensive history of American politics. The essentials are crammed into Dr. Edward Stanwood's "History of the Presidency," the standard work on nominations and elections up to 1916. While Stanwood's book is a gold mine of information and a book of immense value to students and other writers, some larger work yet to come will include volumes of additional detail. For the present, the full vivid, colorful story of our polities can only be had by reading innumerable histories, biographies and reminiscences, along with files of newspapers and periodicals.
