

# **HOOVER BARS** MUDSLINGING IN CAMPAIGN Makes It Plain He Will Not **Countenance Any Person-**

alities Against Smith or Other Democrats.

Stanford University, Calif., Aug. 9 .- With his formal notification 48 hours away, Herbert Hoover today barred "mudslinging" from his campaign for the presidency.

The Republican nominee let it be known that he will not countenance any personalities in the campaign either against his Democratic rival, Gov. Alfred E. Smith, or other prominent Democratic Party leaders. He placed "mudslinging" under the same ban he recently put upon the "barnstorming" plans and "ballyhoo" programs, devised by his enthusiastic personal friends.

The candidate was looking forward today to the arrival of Senator George H. Moses, of New Hampshire, chairman of the notification committee. Senator Moses will deliver the notification address at the exercises here Saturday in Stanford Stadium. A copy of Moses' speech was sent the nominee some time ago and he returned it to the Senator with a number of sugges-

Weather Bureau Sends Out Warnings of Still More Gales on Way-Millions of Dollars Damage; Wire Down All Along West Coast-Fruit Orchards Hit Heavily-No Lives

Washington, Aug. 9 .--- A warning to all shipping in the vicinity of Jamaica and eastern Cuba was issued today by the Weather Bureau because of a tropical disturbance about 75 miles off Santo Domingo.

The storm is heading northwest at a fair rate of speed. It was described as of moderate intensity.

While the storm apparently is headed toward the southwestern American coast, officials said it might turn off before striking Florida.

The disturbance will cause strong northwest winds tonight over the Windward passage.



> **Removing Debris** Meanwhile towns of the lower

east coast as far south as Palm Beach, engaged in removing the debris left in the wake of the hurricane, were warned by the weather bureau that another storm was sweeping in from the sea. This new disturbance was believed to be centering about 100 miles southwest of Porto Rico early this morning, and moving northwest or west northwest.

Indications were that the second storm would exceed its predecessor in intensity, the Weather Bureau reported. Last night, however, it

was of but moderate intensity. The total damage done by the tropical storm that lashed the Florida east coast for a stretch of 125 miles between Palm Beach and was conservatively estimated here.

### **Greatest Damage**

The greatest damage was suffered by the public utility companies, when miles of wires were torn down by the gale, leaving this territory. without power and wire service for many hours. Telephone communication had been partially restored

A group of egg-laying dinosaurs (Protoceratops), which lived somewhat earlier than the stogosaur, is shown in another painting.

Other Paintings The other two paintings now placed on exhibition show the huge moas (Dinornis) of New Zealand, prehistoric birds which looked much like gigantic ostriches, and a group of immense kangaroos, which were as large as the modern rhinoceros, and are easily recognizable

as the direct ancestor of the smaller kangaroo of today. These creatures became extinct in comparatively recent times, as the geologist figures time-that is, they lived more or less contemporaneously with the earliest men.

In each painting the environment is represented as it is believed to have appeared during the period in which the type of life depicted was in existence. The entire series of paintings, of which those now shown are the first to be completed. will consist of 28 canvases, fourteen of which will be 25x9 feet, and fourteen 11x9 feet in size. They will extend around the walls of the entire hall, and will be arranged in chronological order according to their subjects. Several years will be required for the completion of this entire program.
