

HOOVER SEEKS

Washington, Sept.' 11 .- Herbert Hoover today completed a tentative draft of his third public address as the Republican presidential nominee-the "labor" address to be delivered at Newark, N. J., September 17.

Hoover will seek to win the support of organized labor. The high points of the address undoubtedly will be a pledge to bend every effort; if elected, to continue high wages and steady employment, au explanation of his party's pledge to enact legislation curtailing excessive use of the injunction in labor disputes and a further endorsement of the principle of collective bargaining.

In his acceptance speech, Hoover touched but briefly on the labor subject. He cited the pledges o the Republican platform and declared the demand today was far beyond " a full dinner pail" and that the workers actually desired "larger comfort and greater participation in life and leisure."

"Living Wage. The Republican platform praised the tariff and restrictive immigration laws as providing a "living
