

HOOVER GETS BIG WELCOME IN ARGENTINA

Crowds Cheer Him All Along Line of Parade—To Re- main Two Days in Buenos Aires.

Buenos Aires, Argentina, Dec. 14—Impressed by the cordiality of the popular welcome accorded him upon his arrival here, President-Elect Hoover today began the first of two busy days of official banquets, receptions and speeches after a good night's rest at the American Embassy.

There was no perturbation among members of Mr. Hoover's "good-will" party over reports that a plot aimed at the president-elect's life had been frustrated only two days before his arrival. Nevertheless, Mr. Hoover's temporary residence, the American Embassy, is constantly under heavy guard.

The last thirty miles of the Hoover party's journey resembled a campaigning tour of a candidate for presidential election in the United States. Throngs of cheering people gathered at every crossing. A holiday atmosphere pervaded. "Vivas" filled the air.

The good-will of the populace was evident everywhere. Mr. Hoover was received by President Irigoyen.

Closely Guarded
Police lines were broken "one and again as the president-elect and Argentine president rode to the United States Embassy in an automobile. San Martin guards and members of the Argentine Secret Service preceded and followed the cars.

One untoward incident in the entire reception was the attempt of a small group of persons to parade behind "Viva Sandino" banners. The police shattered the attempted parade to a side-street without any serious trouble.

The morning papers today all praise Mr. Hoover in the highest terms. They were especially pleased by the short speech made in answer to President Irigoyen's greeting in which he stressed the "greatness, splendid development and magnificent resources of the Argentine."

The papers also gave much space to descriptions of Mr. Hoover. They describe him as a "student of human advancement." Stressing his engineering feats, his post-war work in aid of refugees and his general modernism.

City Decorated
The entire city is gaily bedecked in honor of the distinguished visitor. Extended flags of the United States and Argentina together with "Welcome Hoover" signs are prominently displayed everywhere.

The chief event scheduled for Mr. Hoover today is a banquet at which President Irigoyen will act as host. The banquet will be held in the "white room" of the national palace. Mr. Hoover is expected to deliver a lengthy speech at the banquet.

Mrs. Hoover, at the same time, will attend a dinner in her honor tendered by the wife of the civil governor of the Province of Buenos Aires. Wives of members of the diplomatic corps have been invited to attend.

To Attend Opera
The most colorful affair at which Mr. and Mrs. Hoover will be guests of honor during their stay here will be the gala performance at the famous Colon Opera House tomorrow night.

Mr. Hoover will sit in the center box with President Irigoyen while Mrs. Hoover will sit in the presidential box at the right side of the opera house in the company of the most important society women of the Argentine.

During his stay here, Mr. Hoover will also have an opportunity to inspect the modern harbor of the city, the extensive meat refrigerating plants and the central produce market. Being an engineer, the president-elect is naturally interested to see the advances the Argentinians have made in these public projects.

On Sunday morning the president-elect will board the Argentinean cruiser "Buenos Aires" and will be taken up the river La Plata to Montevideo, Uruguay. That night he will board the U. S. S. Utah for the trip northward to Rio de Janeiro which will be reached Dec. 20.

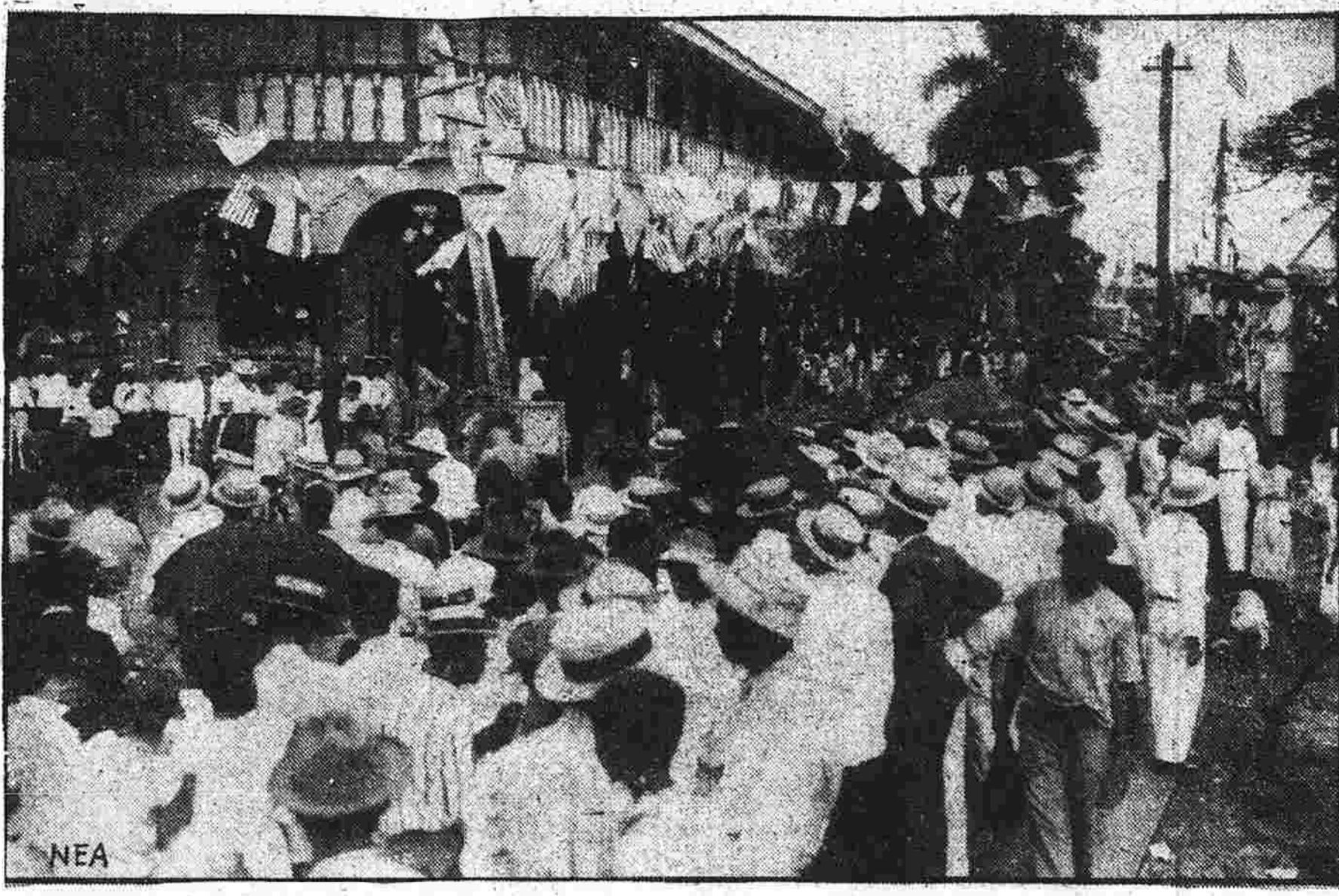
The explosion was in a vacant three family house a mile away from the chief's residence. Not only Chief Logan but the whole town was aroused.

SENATE "WETS" "PUT OVER" BIG APPROPRIATION

Ask for 270 Millions to En- force Prohibition; Confer- ence Certain to Slash the Amount to 13 Millions.

Washington, Dec. 14.—The Senate's "one-man" appropriation of \$270,627,384 for prohibition enforcement will bring a "showdown" it was apparent today, on the question of dry law enforcement.

With the wets contending for the last several years that actual enforcement of the Volstead Act would require hundreds of millions of dollars, Senator William C. Bruce (D. of Maryland, by coup had the \$270,627,384 appropriation incorporated in the treasury appropriation bill. He secured approval of his amendment while conference resigned in the Senate and scarcely a Senator present realized at the time what he had accomplished.

May Be Cut Down
The fight today was transferred to the conference between the Senate and House, where all differences between their respective bills are adjusted. In all probability, the Senate's appropriation will be slashed down to the \$13,500,000 level approved by the House a week ago and which a majority of the Senate thought had been approved by the upper branch. Whatever happens, there is likely to be considerable debate in both branches when the conference report comes back for final enactment.

Coolidge Against It
The \$270,627,384 appropriation naturally must fall by the wayside or President Coolidge, undoubtedly would veto the bill. This sum would represent an increase of \$257,127,384 over the recommendation of the budget bureau.

Situation Is Tense In Bolivian Dispute

Buenos Aires, Dec. 14—President-Elect Herbert Hoover's good will visit to Buenos Aires today came at a time when the Argentine government is striving to maintain South American peace with a report current that President Irigoyen has warned both Bolivia and Paraguay through diplomatic channels against going to war over disputed territory.

The situation continues tense, but neither government has made any open warlike move. Thousands of Indians in Gran Chaco (the territory in dispute) and Bolivians being abroad have offered their services with the Bolivian army, according to word from La Paz. These offers have been courteously rejected indicating the Bolivian government believes there will be a peaceful settlement.

The new coalition Bolivian Cabinet assumed power today at La Paz. The Bolivian and Paraguayan Congresses are in daily session. It is rumored that Bolivia is sending reinforcements to the Gran Chaco frontier.

HOLD 3 SUSPECTS IN BANK HOLD-UP

N. Y. Police Believe They Have Members of Gang Which Stole \$100,000.

New York, Dec. 14—Police and detectives have definitely established that at least three of the eight men arrested in a raid on a Bronx speakeasy yesterday participated in the daring \$100,000 hold-up of a bank truck in Yonkers Wednesday. It was reported today.

The men, all said to be members of the James Nannery gang, will be questioned today regarding the other members of the holdup gang and disposition of the loot which is estimated to be in excess of \$100,000.

Men Identified
Police would not say which of the eight men had been identified as the Yonkers bandits, but an announcement to this effect is expected later. Edward J. Quirk, chief of police of Yonkers, and Patrolman Patrick O'Keefe, who was in the bank truck when it was attacked, are said to have made the identification.

Several of the men arrested in the raid are known to have police records and detectives hope to link them to other robberies in addition to the Yonkers holdup.

Have Police Records
Joseph Piteo is said to have the blackest record. Piteo admitted that he is now at liberty in \$5,000 bail on a charge of the attempted murder of Eddie Diamond, brother of Jack Diamond, gang leader mentioned in the Arnold Rothstein investigation. In Denver, Col. Piteo was sentenced to a six year term in Sing Sing in 1921 for Grand larceny and had also been sentenced twice previously for similar offenses.

Charles Weisberg was sent to Sing Sing for from 5 to 10 years in 1920 for a bank robbery and was subsequently arrested, but discharged for homicide.

BIG LUMBER MERGER

OUTLOOK GOOD FOR BUSINESS, SAYS EXPERT

Head of Manufacturers Draws Optimistic Picture of Next Year's Conditions; Made Nation-Wide Survey

New York, Dec. 14—Returning from an extended trip to every section of industrial America, John E. Edgerton, president of the National Association of Manufacturers, told International News Service today that the heads of industry are well satisfied with the volume of business they are doing, and are looking forward hopefully and confidently to the future.

"Drawing a picture of the business ahead for 1929—and it has been my good fortune to have visited every section of industry within the last few months, I believe we are going to advance along the same line of good business, or better, than we have had during the past year," Edgerton declared.

Officials Satisfied
"On all sides of me I have found heads of industry who are content with the volume of business they are now doing. The great majority

CARROLL ACCUSED BY CHORUS GIRL

Famous Theatrical Producer Who Staged Bathing Par- ty, Again in Trouble.

New York, Dec. 14.—Earl Carroll, Broadway theatrical producer who staged the famous Joyce Hawley champagne bathtub party a year ago last February and got himself into a peck of trouble and a cell in Alcatraz, today received another blast of publicity that threatens to bring about complications.

This time, two 17-year-old chorus aspirants, Miss Louis Blakely and Miss Ann Carroll, are the complainants. They claim they decided to stay out of Carroll's musical show rather than appear in a private rehearsal of one of the scene's. They assert they declined to rehearse in the manner allegedly requested by Carroll, and have employed Louis Hande, a lawyer, to represent them.

Carroll, through his attorney, emphatically denied the girls' charges. He was crushed by the publicity given the story of the two girls.

Miss Blakely and Miss Gaynor were reported to have made their complaint to Miss Dorothy Bryant, executive secretary of the Chorus Equity. She is said to have advised them to take the matter up with United States District Attorney Charles H. Tuttle. How the federal officials qualify in the case was not quite clear, since Carroll's good behavior parole has expired and he is no longer accountable to the federal authorities.

CONDITION OF KING REMAINS UNCHANGED

Strikers In Columbia Disarm State Troops

New York, Dec. 14—The United Fruit liner Santa Marta arrived here today, the first ship to come from the Zone of the Columbian banana trade uprising bearing the story of how 40,000 banana workers disarmed the first contingent of Colombian troops who opposed them and threw them into improvised jails.

The strikers burned and derailed several freight trains and cut off telephone and telegraph communication, officers of the ship said.

A declaration of martial law was followed by the despatching of a squadron and a greater force of troops that finally quelled the insurrection, they said. Three of the

ringleaders said to have been agitators from Moscow were taken aboard the ship. American residents had armed themselves with shotguns and taken their stand on the Main street of Santa Marta expecting that the insurgents might at any time attack the city but there was not actual fighting in the town at any time.

The liner, after soldiers had regained control of the situation, took on its full shipment of fruit and came safely through to New York but the ship was delayed three days in sailing. It was estimated that more than a hundred strikers were killed and 200 wounded.

INACTIVE STOCKS INJURE NEW ENGLAND INDUSTRY

Blocks Owned by Widows and Orphans and Held in Trust Do Not Help Busi- ness in Section.

Providence, R. I., Dec. 14—Many New England industries are "suffering from inactive stock interests" because large blocks of stocks are "owned by widows and orphans, or held in trust or in agency," John S. Lawrence, retiring president of the New England Council, told the thirteenth quarterly meeting of the All-New England organization here today.

In order to "turn the liability of the dead hand into a live asset," the most important announcement would soon be made. It will be, he announced, one of the giant mergers of recent years.

Details were not available but it was said that a merger plan might be agreed upon shortly and that an announcement would be made within 24 hours.

The 30 point advance in Radio on the New York Stock Exchange was attributed in some circles to the rumored imminence of the merger.

David Sarnoff, vice-president of the Radio Corporation of America, declined to discuss the report. "There is no statement to make," he said.

When the Radio-Victor merger was first discussed last spring, Edward E. Shumaker, president of the Victor company, was quoted as saying that the consolidation of these two big companies "would be of tremendous benefit to both companies." He pointed out that the combined facilities under one management "would work toward greater economy and would lower the cost of production which in turn could be passed on to the public."

CONNECTICUT CO. ASKS TO ABANDON 3 LINES

Only in One Case Will Trolleys Be Replaced by Bus Line, Officials Say.

Hartford, Conn., Dec. 14.—The Connecticut Company desires to abandon service on three separate lines in the state, and will appear before the Public Utilities Commission here next Friday to explain conditions. Only in one of three proposed abandonments does the trolley company ask for the right to substitute a bus line. The lines to be abandoned are Winsted-Torlinton, Thomaston-Fort Hill-Turnout, Waterbury, and Portland-to Middletown.

The Winsted case will be heard at 10:30 a. m. Friday December 21, the Thomaston case at 11 a. m., and the Portland case at two p. m. The company asks a certificate to operate a bus route from Gilder to Gilder, through to Hillside avenue, South Farms, Middletown. If the Portland case is decided in favor of the company the whole town will be freed from trolleys, as will the bridge over the Connecticut river.

The Connecticut Company's petition that two of the three lines do not produce sufficient revenue to meet operating expenses.

MAKE MOVIES IN CANADA
Montreal, Que., Dec. 14.—A British film organization controlling 450 theaters throughout Great Britain, is negotiating for the production of four films yearly in Canada by the Canadian International Film Co., it was learned today.

Monarch's Illness Has

Reached the Stage of Anxious Waiting—Next 36 Hours Will Tell the Story; Doctors Now Fight- ing to Prevent Spread of Infection in the Right Lung.

London, Dec. 14.—King George's serious illness this afternoon had reached the stage of anxious waiting.

Every method known to advanced science has been exhausted in the battle for the monarch's life. It is officially admitted that the royal patient's progress must be slow and difficult.

The whole nation and especially the royal family, anxiously await the developments of the next 36 hours.

The King is suffering exhaustion, but the failure of the morning medical bulletin to mention any increase in heart weakness gave fresh hope.

The physicians are now fighting to prevent a spread of the infection that affected the left lung.

Many members of the royal family gathered at Buckingham palace this afternoon, but the object of the meeting was not known.

It was officially stated at the palace at 3 o'clock that the King's condition was unchanged.

Later it was learned that the members of the royal family had assembled for a quiet birthday luncheon given by the Queen for the Duke of York. This was his 33rd birthday.

Those present included Princess Mary, her husband, Viscount Lascelles; the Duke and Duchess of York and the Prince of Wales.

SLIGHTLY BETTER
London, Dec. 14.—King George's condition continued slightly improved today, medical bulletins issued by the royal physicians this morning stated.

"The slight improvement noted last evening in the King's condition is maintained. Any progress must be slow and difficult."

The bulletin, signed by Sir Stanley Howard, Sir Hugh Rigby and Lord Dawson, of Penn.

The official spokesman at Buckingham palace stated at eight o'clock this morning that the King had spent a fairly comfortable night, during which he managed to obtain several hours of sleep.

The spokesman, usually most reticent, indicated that the royal family was somewhat relieved over the King's condition although still extremely anxious and not minimizing the dangers which must be encountered by the sovereign during the next few days.

Crisis Near
The crux of the situation now appears to hinge upon the King's ability to maintain his strength within the next thirty six hours.

His Majesty does not appear to have lost any ground since his operation, according to the general belief expressed in medical circles.

Although he is admitted, in a weakened condition, his weakness in itself is not regarded as unusual in view of the fact that he has just undergone a serious and exhausting operation.

It is believed that so long as his pulse remains steady, he will continue to cope with the general toxemia and gradually recover his recuperative powers.

The public appears much gratified at the present results shown by the operation. Throughout England prayers for the King's recovery were said yesterday. Impressive services were held in Westminster Abbey.

PRINCE IN NEW YORK
New York, Dec. 14.—In time to make his midnight dash for home on the Cunard liner Berengaria, Prince George, fourth son of the King of England, arrived here today from Bermuda aboard the cruiser Durban.

After being fog-bound outside the harbor this morning, the warship steamed up the bay shortly before noon, received the national salute of 21 guns as the passed Governor's island, and docked at pier 54, North river.

Employees of the Cunard line immediately began to transfer the royal passenger's luggage from the Durban to the Berengaria, which the prince hopes will carry him across the Atlantic in time for him to reach his father's bedside within a week.

The Coastguard cutter Calumet steamed down the bay to escort the Durban to her dock.

However, in accordance with the request of the British embassy that no formal welcome be given, Prince George, the Calumet carried no official committee of reception.

MORAN, GUNMAN, PAYS PENALTY FOR CRIME

Ossining, N. Y., Dec. 14—Thomas (Red) Moran, 20 and hard-boiled, was executed in the electric chair at Sing Sing prison early today for the murder of two Brooklyn policemen in 1926. The current was turned on at 1:05:30 o'clock and Moran was pronounced dead at 1:08. The youthful Brooklyn gangster, who shouted "I want to burn" when sentenced in court, tried to appear nonchalant at the end but could not conceal his nervousness. A cigaret was taken away from him and his request for whiskey was refused. An hour earlier he had enjoyed a game of pinocle with a keeper. Moran made no statement. He had said farewell to his brother, Charles, and to a mer sweetheart who visited the prison with a babe in her arms. The execution was postponed two hours while the other convicts were being entertained at the annual Sing Sing show, a musical comedy. The killer's last dinner was a hearty meal which included steak, potatoes and ice cream, with some choice cigars for a final smoke.

WHEREABOUTS OF O'NEILL NOT KNOWN TO FRIENDS

Noted Playwright Leaves China—Says He Is Going to Honolulu.

Shanghai, Dec. 14.—Newspaper correspondents and members of the American colony here had failed today in discovering the whereabouts of the playwright, Eugene O'Neill, who on Tuesday left his hotel here after sending his physician a note in which he said that he was leaving Shanghai in search of peace and privacy. "There are more snoots and gossips here than in any New England village," he said in his note to the physician. "I am going to Honolulu and then perhaps to Tahiti if Honolulu adopts the same attitude as Shanghai, that I am a politician whose life must be public."

Mr. O'Neill declared in the note that he had recovered from the bronchial attack which had been reported as being a return of a tubercular trouble, and that his nerves were better than they had been.

No trace of O'Neill as a passenger on any steamer leaving here has been discovered, but it is thought he may possibly have gone to Japan on one of the numerous vessels plying there, intending to take a ship for Honolulu at some Japanese port.

FLU CLOSES COLLEGE

Chicago, Dec. 14.—The University of Chicago will close its doors today as a precaution for its students and faculty members against influenza, now epidemic over most of the United States and parts of Canada. Classes will resume soon after the holidays, it was said. Although the influenza epidemic is gaining headway in Chicago, Health Commissioner Dr. Arnold Kegel has not deemed it necessary to order the closing of schools, theaters and other places of public assembly. Forty-two students at Northwestern University at Evanston are in the campus infirmary, but none of them in a serious condition, it was said. University officials have taken no action toward closing the school ahead of the regular holiday vacation.

FAMOUS AUTHOR HURT

Pompton Lakes, N. J., Dec. 14.—Albert Payson Terhune, famous writer of dog stories, escaped with slight injuries today when he was struck by a hit and run driver while walking near his home here. Terhune was hurled a considerable distance, but suffered no broken bones. Terhune lay on the ground for about ten minutes until another auto approached. The driver picked him up and took him to Sunnyside. Terhune was conscious and in considerable pain.

STANLEY JAMROGA STILL PARALYZED

North End Young Man Injured Two Months Ago Cannot Yet Use Arms.

The condition of Stanley Jamroga, north end football player, who was critically injured while playing with the Cloverleaves early in October, remains practically unchanged at Hartford hospital. The Herald was informed today by a hospital official. Both of the young man's arms and legs remain paralyzed the same as they were when he was first admitted to the hospital. Jamroga does not realize the serious extent of his injury and is most optimistic about his ultimate recovery. Hospital authorities, however, declare that it is extremely difficult to foretell the outcome. Fortunately Jamroga has suffered no pain to speak of.

are optimistic, although many of them are expecting something of a shading off in prices next year. Only in a few places have I found forebodings, one or two of our industries are suffering heavily because of the trends in our everyday life. Offsetting these, I have found numerous extensions in the newer industries that have transformed losses into gains.

Again Elected
For the ninth consecutive time, John E. Edgerton has been elected president of the National Association of Manufacturers, a voluntary organization enlisting the cooperative activity of the leading manufacturing firms all over the country. He is president of the LeBannon (Tenn.) Woolen Mills; president of the Tennessee Manufacturers' Association and chairman of the National Industrial Council, which has affiliations with 300 local and state industrial organizations.

Contrary to the general impression that the coming into office of a new president means a general slackening of business, said Edgerton, "I believe we have every reason to be happy and confident that the incumbent that will take his seat in March will do nothing to disturb our industrial equilibrium."

Under Edgerton's leadership, the manufacturers are now trying to "take the politics out of the tariff" and the tariff out of politics by seeking an extension of the powers and scope of the tariff commission, to make it a more practical adjunct of Congress and give it more flexibility in rate adjustments.

LUNCHEON CLUBS

It has been said that punning is the lowest form of wit. We doubt it. There is a diversion, indulged in with great gusto and unanimity by that group of youthful writers whose cue is to scoff at pretty much everything save dirt and radicalism as bourgeois and fat headed, which to our mind is much less witty than the cracking of a good pun. We mean the ill-natured ridicule cast at the luncheon clubs—Rotary, Kiwanis, Lions, etc.

If we have ever, in the past, loosed a little momentary rallery at Rotary, Kiwanis or Lions—and we are not sure that we ever have—it was by way of poking a little good natured fun at an institution that is predicated partly on fun and which ought to be able to appreciate it as well as we all at the luncheon table.

There is a very genuine, very admirable and perfectly intellectual motive underlying these organizations. It is the development of charity. Not the charity of the institution and of the funds to relieve destitution, primarily, but the charity which impels men to seek out of the good in their fellows rather than the evil; which fosters friendliness as a policy of life; which hacks at the barriers of reserve that too often keep men isolated and lonely through all their days; which promotes good understanding and helpfulness among the constituents of a community.

And it is rather astonishing, when one thinks it all over, to have the realization forced upon one that until these luncheon club orders came on the scene we had no such agency, consciously motivated in such direction, at all.

Perhaps there are times when the luncheon club's levity is a bit forced, when some of the banter and the all-boys-together stuff may go a little flat—but what of it? So do automobile tires, sometimes go flat, but we don't sneer at the institution of the tire, do we? And if it weren't for the tires we'd all be afoot!

And most times the good fellowship, the friendliness, the turn-out of the sunshine is spontaneous and real. The net of it all is an immense gain in breadth of sympathies, in extension of good acquaintance, in the making and cementing of true friendship among fellow citizens.

Perhaps one of the most valuable aspects of the luncheon club is the opportunity it gives to those endowed with the qualities and character of leadership in the humanities. The Manchester Kiwanis club, for instance, is close to completion of a year under the presidency of Clarence P. Quimby. Mr. Quimby is a schoolmaster. The town has known him to be a successful educator. But a schoolmaster, even if successful, is not always a pathfinder and a captain in the humanities, not always a gifted and eager promoter of good will and friendship. The Kiwanis' club's near-year under the Quimby regime, however, has shown the schoolmaster to be just that, and in an extraordinary degree. Where else could those special talents have been so effectively employed as in welding the friendships and mutualizing the purposes of a large and important group of men?

There is an enlargement, expansion, liberalization of the individual in the luncheon club system. There is betterment of ethics, there is discouragement of littleness and pettiness and grudgingness in it. It rouses out creases of habit in the characters of men whose mental skins have been growing to fit the ruts in which they traveled.

And if we were busted and jobless and dinnerless we'd rather tackle any member of the Manchester Kiwanis or of any other Kiwanis, Rotary or Lions' club for the loan of a dollar than to try our luck on Sinclair Lewis, H. L. Mencken, Ben Hecht or any of that tribe. By a whole lot!

THE WATKINS PROBE

The action of Judge Marvin in re-establishing the current grand jury after receiving its report of "progress" in the Watkins case inquiry and in connection with the probing of bootlegging corruption, will be applauded throughout the state. It would have been more than regrettable if on some technical ground this grand jury had been discharged with the investigation of the ramifications of the Watkins scandal only partially complete. Judge Marvin's assurance to the grand jury that its scope is practically unlimited frees that body from any trappings and opens the way for the laying bare of all the circumstances of the affair.

The charges brought by the grand jury against Attorney William E. Egan, while extremely serious and likely to center the attention of the people of the county, for the time being, upon that one aspect of the case, are by no means likely to constitute the only angle which will develop as the jury's activities go on. The Watkins affair, it is the general belief, has many loose ends which, gathered together by grand jury investigation, may be woven into a fabric whose edges may touch many personalities, not entirely to their credit.

Of especial interest is Judge Marvin's instruction to the grand jury to the effect that that body would be perfectly within its rights to inquire as far as it saw fit into corruption in connection with the liquor traffic.

Judging from the way this grand jury is working it is animated by the purpose of getting results and there are indications that it isn't afraid of the cars. This is as it should be. There has been a lot of whispering around this state ever since the Watkins case broke. An exhaustive grand jury probe should have the result of clearing the air. It should either amplify the whispers into a loud noise or squelch them altogether.

WAR AND THE PACT

There has been quick manifestation of a tendency to belittle the effectiveness of the Kellogg peace pact on the score that Bolivia and Paraguay are both committed as signatories of the treaty and have still completely disregarded its provisions in their eagerness for war.

It has been pointed out by some critics of the situation that the moral effect of the treaty on the populations of the signatory countries, which was depended on to provide most of the strength of the pact, has, in this early transpiring case, amounted to just nothing. No thought at all seems to have been given by the peoples of Bolivia and Peru to the circumstance that they have just struck hands with the rest of the world in renunciation of war as a national policy. And because this is so there is a disposition on the part of some writers to conclude that no particular effect on the war spirit, as a result of the treaty, is to be expected among populations anywhere.

It seems to us that this conclusion fails to take into consideration that, of all the nations signing the treaty, the two in question are among the least forward—it is no longer polite to use the word "backward", speaking of peoples. Bolivians and Paraguayans, very largely of native Indian blood, are among the most illiterate of populations. Probably not one in five of them ever heard of the Kellogg pact.

That would not hold true in the great majority of the signatory countries. And the fact that the Bolivians and Paraguayans pay no attention to the peace treaty when they are impelled to war does not at all carry with it the certainty that the Rumanians would not remember it, or the Greeks or the Latvians.

GROVER WHALEN

Though the name of Grover Whalen has become familiar to any number of Americans outside of New York, through his service as chairman of the Mayor's Committee of Reception to Notable Guests, comparatively few of them have realized that Mr. Whalen was not a professional politician but, instead, a business man filling a highly responsible position, that of general manager of the Wanamaker stores, at a salary said to be a hundred thousand dollars a year.

The question of whether or not he would accept the headship of New York's police department, in the place of Commissioner Warren, who has blown up in the withering light of the Rothstein case, may have been determined by the time this is printed, or it may still be moot.

The problem does not seem to be altogether whether a first class business man could make a success of administering the police activities of the great city, but whether such a success could be made by a person who is at once a first class business man and an experienced,

altogether sophisticated insider in New York city affairs.

One of the most lamentable fizzes in the way of a reform administration in New York was that headed by a merchant, the late Mayor Strong, who went into office determined to purify the city and left it a terrible mess. But Strong was just a merchant. Grover Whalen is a merchant and a "hy guy" at the same time. Perhaps he could do something.

TWO PASSINGS

Within a few days' Connecticut journalism has lost by death two of its veterans—James L. Doyle, head of the New Britain Record, and James M. Emerson, retired head of the Ansonia Sentinel. Each was the founder of the newspaper which he directed, both had been successful and both possessed personal qualities which endeared them to their associates in the newspaper world and to the peoples of their communities.

Each had gambled, rationally, on the growth of the community in which his lines lay, and each won. New people and more of them gave Doyle's little New Britain Record its chance to grow up alongside its older and long established competitor, the New Britain Herald. Emerson, converting a little weekly into a daily nearly forty years ago, managed to make his newspaper so efficient unto its territory that competition was never possible.

They lived and had their being in an activity which is distinctly satisfying to those successfully engaged in it and whose followers have reason to believe is of peculiar usefulness in our civilization—the small city newspaper. Both will be missed from among the fraternity in Connecticut. Each was a fine man and a figure of importance in his community and in the state.

WASHINGTON LETTER

Washington, Dec. 14.—A lot of people in Washington are going to regret the departure of President Coolidge from the White House next March 4, but none will regret it more than the capital's small army of newspaper and movie reel photographers.

For Mr. Coolidge is regarded by them as one of the best "subjects"—while they think President-elect Hoover is about the worst.

Mr. Coolidge doesn't mind being photographed; Mr. Hoover does. Mr. Coolidge is willing to pose in almost any way requested; Mr. Hoover isn't.

One learns a lot about big men from the fellow whose job it is to photograph them on all sorts of occasions and under all kinds of conditions and circumstances. They come to know them well.

"Yeah, Coolidge is okeh," one of the picture hounds will tell you. "He always sees to it that every one of us gets our pictures. Some times several of the boys are late and they'll come running up just after the nose is finished. The president will wait for them and do the handshaking stuff all over again. He never leaves but what he turns around and smiles. 'Well, boys—got all you want?'"

But Hoover's entirely different, according to these fellows. They have known him as food administrator, secretary of commerce, flood relief director and many of them were with him in Belgium. And they call him the hardest man in Washington to photograph.

An outstanding complaint seems to be that Mr. Hoover, when being photographed, dislikes to remove his hat, always prefers to look the lens full in the face and utterly refuses to button his famous double-breasted coat.

"He should know better than to wear double-breasted, a big fellow like him," said one of the cameramen. "And if he must, he ought to keep 'em buttoned—but he won't."

And, to prove his point, he drew forth a file of Hoover pictures. All were in the double-breasted coat and the double-breasted coat was open to the breeze, regardless of the weather.

Another difference—from the cameramen's standpoint—is that Mr. Coolidge is willing to wear clothes that make good pictures, and Mr. Hoover isn't. For instance, when Mr. Coolidge goes fishing he gets in fishermen's togs, when he goes trapshooting he dresses as a trapshooter should dress.

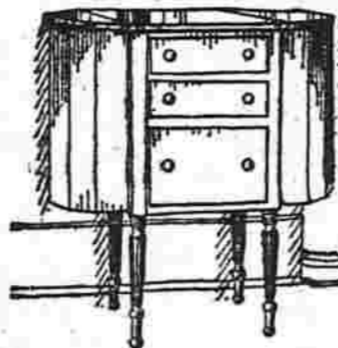

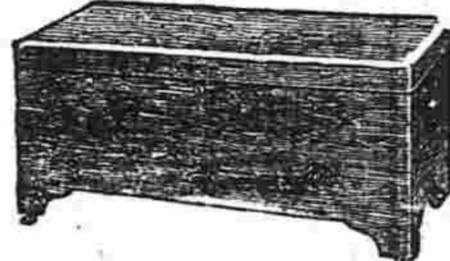

that spins a bit hectorically at times these days, a faint suggestion of the lavender and old lace that once was still clings to the Little Church Around the Corner.

Caught, as it is, in the midst of a city that sprouts even faster than a lanky lad in his teens, the "little church" is variously an oasis and an incongruity. It suggests quiet and rest in the midst of noise and disturbance. It suggests the quaint and the pastoral where all is urban and mechanical. Its tiny lawn, its little pathways, its simple coloring and charming architecture are exaggerated by the harsh contrasts about it. It does not seem to cry against its surroundings; rather it leaves the passer-by to stage his own revolt.

And there is about it, too, the romance that runs through wild-flowered meadows; romances that meet at country cross roads and go contentedly on to the grave; romances

that defy the city's clamor and sing in soft voices in the face of the city's roar; romances clad in dimity and in short skirts as well—but romances that brewed of the same ingredients whatever their geography or their nature.

The Little Church Around the Corner is a place to make one sentimental; a place to kick off the sophisticated armor that one dons to ward off the blows of metropolitan life; a place to come upon at sundown when the racket and clamor is becoming a faint echo.

Walking thus at sundown it is not uncommon to see old couples walking along the paths and through the gates and into the church doors. They come from over the earth . . . men and women who found this the end of romance trail. They come by the day, by the week, by the month and by the year. They come for their anniversaries and they come to water the fading flowers of young love.

I am told that hundreds of couples make this their yearly pilgrimage. And now and then one

comes alone . . . an old man or a young woman . . . And when they come alone they pause hesitantly at the gate . . . and look about in blurred confusion at finding themselves alone . . . Sometimes they cannot force their way through the doors, but turn away with tear-dimmed eyes . . . and sometimes they sink into a pew and collapse sobbing.

The church attendants are accustomed to every sort of emotional demonstration. Tears have brought before their eyes such dramas as they cannot describe.

One night, I was told, a girl started for the river. She had planned to wed in this church, as have so many hundred others, but the man had disappeared a few nights before the wedding. She had waited and waited . . . and then in a burst of despair, had started out to end her life. But, as she passed the church, she faltered and went in. Before morning she had sobbed her story to the rector and had gone home.

Women whose profession cannot be discussed wander in from their nightly promenades to ponder their tragic lots and to sense the romance and love which they can capture only vicariously. For the church doors are never closed. One can never tell at what hour of the day and night someone may wander in from the muddled world outside for a moment of peace and self-contemplation.

For, by tradition and appearance, the "little church" inspires a confidence and trust.
