SENATE PLANS TO RATIFY THE **KELLOGG PACT**

Sidetracks Big Navy Bill by Postponing Debate on Both Measures Until After Christmas Recess.

Washington, Dec. 21 .- The Kellogg multilateral anti-war treaty, by which odd neUfigtswife-etnioalfrIt which fifty odd nations renounce war will be ratified by the Senate before a final vote is taken on the administration's "Big Navy" bill, it became apparent today.

The action of the Senate in postponing debate on both measures until January third sounded a death knell to the hopes of administration leaders of enactment of the new cruiser measure first. This would have made their task far easier than to secure its passage once the Senate has approved a treaty, which, its sponsors contend, will outlaw all war between the great nations of the earth.

Welcomed Delay Senate "Irreconcilables" meanwhile welcomed the delay as a period in which to seek recruits for their resolution, announcing publicly a set of terms under which America would ratify the treaty. Under treaty would not involve the United States in the conditions of any other treaty, would not restrict her right to act at any time in self-defense and would not compel her to take punitive action against any offending nation. The fate of the resolution remains in doubt although administration leaders pre-

Irreconcilables' Hope The Irreconcilables hope to win over a majority of the Senate to their resolution in the debate after Christmas. They have contended that the treaty is but a gesture toward peace and that its real meaning and danger lay in the international correspondence, which ac companies its negotiation. Much stress will be placed upon one Brittish note under which Great Britain reserved the right to defend cer-





Washington, Dec. 21.- President Coolidge signed the Boulder Dam

The struggle of years to enact a measure that would control the flood waters of the Colorado river, protect the residents of the Imperial valley of California, and supply much-needed water and power to arid lanus, was ended in he president's office at 10:20 o'clock this morning. The measure

is now a law. President Coolidge attached his signature to the bill with a pen brought to the White House by Representative Philip D. Swing. (R) of California-who with Senator Hiram Johnson (R) of California, fathered the project in its legislative form, the pen was saved for later presentation to George Young, publisher of the Los Angeles Examiner.


































NEW FLOOD LIGHTS TO BE OVER COPS' HEADS
