ANCIENT LANDS BEAR WITNESS TO CENTRAL SYMBOL OF FAITH

The International Sunday School Lesson for January 20, 1929, is "Christ the Saviour" Luke 13:3-7; Romans 5:6-10.

On one day, in the Syrian quarter of New York City, I saw an oriental with a cross tattooed on his hand, as one so often sees it in the East—an ineradicable profession of faith, in the presence of an overwhelming Islam.

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So the tale might run endlessly. The cross is the accepted symbol of Christianity, even as the Apostle Paul wrote. Both the mind and the heart of mankind have perceived throughout the ages that the cross signifies the central truth of the religion of Jesus.

EQUATED PUPILS Apparently the "equated pupil" is going to be banded about from pillar to post in the present legislative session. Some time in May, it is expected, the branch of the Canadian Northern railroad which has been in prospect for half a century and under more or less active construction for almost half that time, extending from Hudson Bay Junction in Saskatchewan to the rudimentary seaport of Churchill, in far northern Manitoba, will be finished and open to traffic.

Within a reasonable time after that, no doubt, the road will be seeking tourist business, appealing to that hankering for new experiences which will almost certainly send a considerable number of people from the States, as well as Canadians, to a railhead where in midsummer there is no night.

Perhaps it will not occur to this Legislature, or to the next, but it probably will come to be realized in the fullness of time, that the way to get the money to help out with equalization grants is to institute some sort of economy in the administrative end of the state government, rather than by piling up taxes.

There is also, perhaps, still one other way out; which is to permit the towns to spend in their own way, on the education of their children, such sums of money as they can provide without bankruptcy.
