For a lover's open face sandwich—these are intended for Valentine's day—mix one cup of tender pink boiled ham and add one cup chopped pimento. Use a little thick mayonnaise colored pink to moisten and spread on thin slices of buttered bread cut in heart shapes. Chopped green pickle or strips of pepper may be used to form a narrow border around the edge of the heart.

**Orange Shortcake**  
In making an orange shortcake, peel and slice thinly several good sized oranges, place them in a deep dish and sprinkle each layer with sugar and then squeeze over all the juice of one or two lemons. Be sure all the orange seeds have been taken out during the cutting.  
Make a shortcake or short biscuit dough, bake a delicate brown and when done split and butter generously. Lay on a hot plate and cover thickly with the sliced orange; then put on the upper crust, butter again, and cover thickly with the orange, sprinkle with a little more sugar and turn the juice over all. Serve immediately.  
A plain sugar syrup flavored with lemon juice may be used in making a good sauce for the shortcake.

HINTS ON HOW TO KEEP WELL  
by World Famed Authority

**QUININE WAS AN INDIAN REMEDY 300 YEARS AGO**

By DR. MORRIS FISHBEN  
Editor Journal of the American Medical Association and of Hygiene, the Health Magazine.  
Apparently the first knowledge of the use of the bark of cinchona to be definitely established was published in 1739 by one De Jussieu. This writer stated that the town of Loja, Peru, was using the bark as early as 1600, when an Indian chief told a Jesuit missionary from Spain that the bark was of value for the treatment of intermittent fever.  
The bark was called quina-quina, which meant bark of barks, which shows that the Indians attached special value to the preparation.  
According to C. J. S. Thompson, the first scientific account of the use of cinchona in the treatment of disease was its application to the wife of the fourth count of Chinchon in Lima in 1638. After that time various treatises were written on the subject, the first mention in England being published in 1655.  
In 1682 a book about the bark

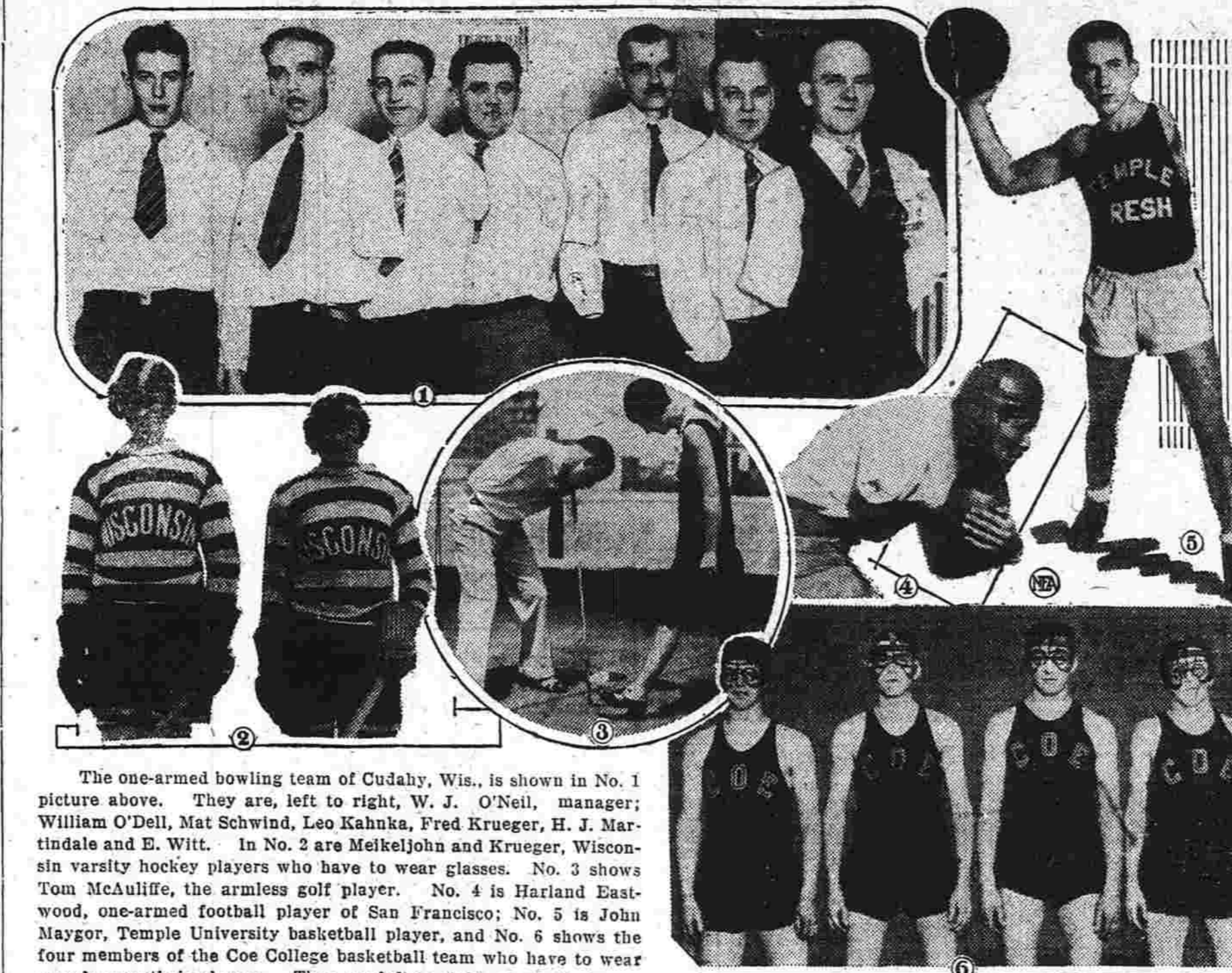
