



BARON HUENEFELD DIES IN GERMANY

Was One of Three Who Made First East to West Atlantic Flight.

Berlin, Feb. 6 - The death of Baron Ehrenfried Gunther Von Huenefeld, who with Captain Hermann Koehl and Major James E. Fitzmaurice made the first successful east to west flight across the Atlantic last April, was mourned throughout Germany today. The baron who for several months last year was feted in many parts will man the governmental departof the world for his part in the enochal flight of the monoplane Bremen, died in a sanitarium here last night following an intes-

tinal operation. He had suffered from intestinal disorders for some years. Last July he was operated upon for appendicitis but after his flight from Berlin to Tokio' his condition again became chronic.
