



# **EXPERTS TO DECIDE** THE SUM GERMANY CAN PAY TO ALLIES

# This Procedure Being Followed So That Nation Can Pay Her Huge War Debt to United States.

By RODNEY DUTCHER NEA Service Writer

Washington, Feb. 7 - Representatives of the world powers will meet soon in Europe to decide how much can be squeezed out of the reparations-debts situation without killing the goose that lays the golden eggs.

Germany, of course, is the nation to do the paying, and the allied nations are the ones who are trying to find out just how much Germany can pay without wrecking herself. This figure, whatever it may be, must then be contrasted with the figure the allies have set as their goal, and the two must be harmonized somehow.

The United States has no money in particular coming from Germany, but Owen D. Young and J. Pierpont Morgan will be there, nevertheless, to protect the United States' interests. For the nations to whom Germany owes reparations are the nations which they will pay the United States- Berlin. and, conversely, the less they get,





# CONNECTICUT CONNECTICUT CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

(228) The Chief Executive.

The Constitution vests in the Governor the supreme executive power of the state. He is required to see that the laws are faithfully executed. He has the power to administer oaths, sign writs and issue processes. He is commander-in-chief of the militia; has power to grant reprieves in all cases except impeachment; may himself be impeached; has power in the matter of requisitions for criminals. All commissions must be signed by him. He nominates to the General Assembly the judges of the Supreme and Superior Courts and appoints, with the consent of the Senate, various commissioners and members of boards and directors of various state institutions.\* He is, ex officio, a member of several state boards.

On special emergencies he has power to convene the Legislature at any time in any place. He has the power to veto all bills passed by the Assembly, but his veto may be overridden by a majority vote in both houses. The Governor presided over the General Assembly before it was divided into two houses in 1698. From that date until the adoption of the Constitution of 1818 he presided in the council or upper house with a casting vote but no veto power. The title "His Excellency" was given to the Governor by the Assembly in May, 1777. The Executive Secretary of the governor has charge of the governor's official correspondence, receives applications for appointments, commissions, and conveys executive messages to the General Assembly

The Governor is elected to serve for two years and receives an annual salary of \$5,000. The salary of the earlier governors was modest. On November 9, 1641, it was ordered "that 160 bushels of Corne shall be sent in by the county to the governor, to be levied upon the towns by the proportion of the last vote."

Prof. Douglas in Charge Professor William O. Douglas of the Yale Law School will be in charge of the investigation. Professor Walton Hale Hamilton, also of Yale, will be the advising economist. W. C. Plummer, of the Domestic Commerce Division of the United States Department of Commerce, will assist the investigators through the co-operation of the Department of Commerce in making the factual study of consumers' credit and the relation of retailing methods to retail bankruptcles.

The investigation will begin within a few days, when Paul O. Ritter, of the Yale Law School, will commence in Philadelphia a study of the bankruptcy cases of that section. As funds are secured, the study will include the New England states; New York; the industrial and agricultural sections of the south; the mining and agricultural ections of the Middle West; and the states on the Pacific Coast. When the complete program is under way, the staff under Professor Douglas will include an economist, several legal assistants, and a number of economic assistants.

"The credit structure is of supreme importance in the United States today, since in approximately 90 per cent of all merchandise sales, credit is extended," Dean Hutchins said in commenting upon the need for the investigation. "It is estimated that through the various means open to debtors, sums totaling \$800,000,000 are annually wiped off the books. The administration of the Bankruptcy been introduced, the last in the 70th Congress. 





# Two of Them Hint That Politics Has a Hand in Picking Members.

By Davis J. Walsh.

New York, Feb. 7.—Airing their views for the benefit of a local publication, five prominent athletic coaches today attempt to tell what is the matter with America in Olympic competitions and judging by the purport of their remarks, the only thing less inspiring than the results attained in the tracks events, is the method by which the teams are selected. Two of the coaches, Eddie Farrell, of Harvard, and Harry Hillman, of Dart-mouth, appear to dally with insinuations in which the ugly word 'politics," rears its head.

Three of them, Farrell, Hillman and Jack Ryder, of Boston College and the Boston A. A., were members of the 1928 staff at Amsterdam.
