ENGLAND IS PARADISE FOR THE SMOKERS

London—England is the paradise of the smoker. In no other country is the lover of the fragrant weed allowed so many liberties.

To begin with, there is hardly a restaurant or hotel dining room in which one may not smoke at will. Occasionally there is one restriction—pipe smoking is forbidden.

Smoking is permitted in all hotel lounges except one, which is reserved for old ladies who object. All trains are provided with carriages in which smoking is permitted and these greatly outnumber those in which smoking is not allowed. Smoking is freely permitted in the restaurant cars and in the sleeping cars. Men do not have to huddle in the wash-room of a Pullman as they do in America.

O. K. in All Movies
The underground trains all

have more cars in which smoking is permitted than those in which it is forbidden. The tram cars have a top story in which smoking is allowed. So have the omnibuses. The vast bulk of the London theaters permit smoking in the auditorium. Every movie in town permits it.

This is in sharp contrast with America. In New York, for instance, it is an offense even to take a lighted cigar or cigarette down the stairs to the subway, much less smoke in the cars or on the platforms.

Germanic countries have been more like the United States in this regard. There are practically no theaters in Berlin where one is permitted to smoke. Smoking is allowed on top of tram cars and buses, but these are uncovered, so that it is like smoking in the open air, whereas most of the top stories of the London buses and tram cars are glassed in.

In Vienna the extreme of rigidity is observed. The theatergoer is not only forbidden to smoke in the auditorium, but is not even allowed to smoke in the lobby. Vienna municipal authorities have a wholesome fear of fires.

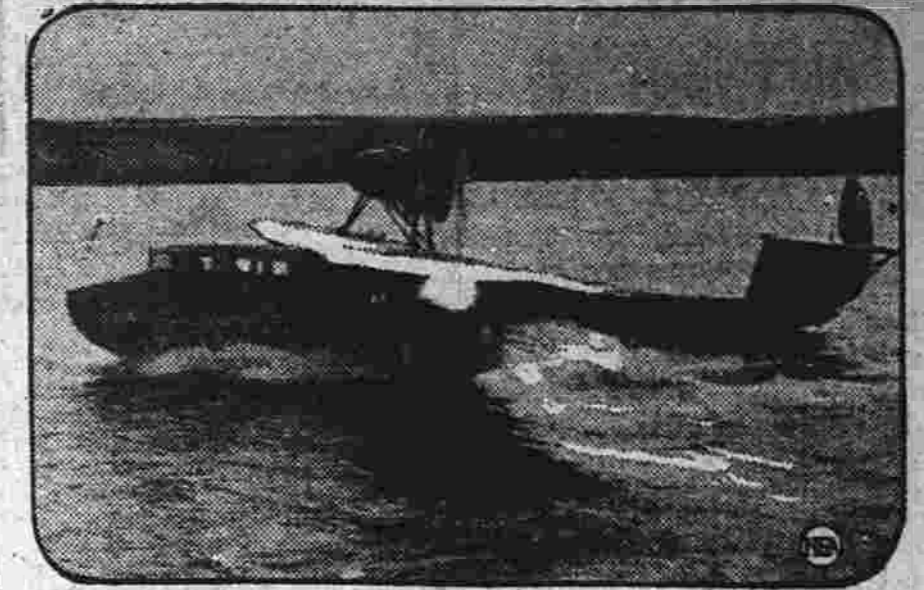
Paris Strict, Too

Paris bids fair soon to link itself up rather on the side of New York, Berlin and Vienna rather than with London. Chappé, the energetic new prefect of police, has decided against smoking in all amusement places unless permission has been granted at the express request of the managers and then only after a body of his technical experts has inspected and approved the ventilation and fire precautions.

This is all the more piquant, because the average Briton prides himself on being the greatest fresh air fiend in the world, whereas he constantly pokes fun at the Frenchman and his fear of clean air. The fact is the Briton wants clean air and cold air in his home, but he is utterly indifferent to it in the theaters.

When a show is popular and the house is packed, along about the middle of the third act, the air in the average London theater is thick with pipe, cigar and cigarette smoke.

\$40,000 Berlin Jewel Burglary Reveals Real Kingdom Of Rogues

Berlin.—The existence of a Rogue's Kingdom in the center of the capital of the German Republic ruled by a grand sachem of the underworld, with an overlord of gangsters as his aide and a Supreme Court of Thieves fling pronouncing verdicts on and threatening with death any violator of the "code of criminals" has been revealed by the police following the arrest of gunmen after a \$40,000 burglary in a Berlin jewelry shop. The revelation is taken as one of the most striking proofs of a rapidly proceeding, thorough Americanization or Chicagoization of Germany.

Clean Up City

"A clean city within 24 hours," was the ultimatum of the Berlin police chief to his force, analogous to that of the Mayor of Philadelphia. The town was swept and while His Majesty the gang leader has not been found, several higher "officials" were put behind the bars.

The arrested three leaders, including one woman, at first flatly refused to give any explanation, though all were submitted to hours of thorough grilling. Being told that their obstinate silence would only make their position worse, one of the men answered:

"That's alright, detective. Don't you worry! You put us in jail but they put us to death!"

"Who, they?" was the query.

"Well, they find me \$80 marks the other day, because I squealed to the cops on some of my friends. They have made it plain to me that the next time I won't get off that cheap, and no joke about. They will blow my brains out this time, I guess."

And then, piece by piece, he revealed the story of a chief of a ring of burglars and thieves ruling the rest of Berlin's underworld and of a court acting as his executive.

Chief Has Fled

The chief, who has fled across the border, according to the tales of

his subjects, owns a motor car, two lingerie shops and a number of luxuriously fitted apartments all over town. He likes travelling, and he seems to have travelled a lot in all countries, according to the amount of jewels he brought home, partly for his wife, to wear, and partly to alleviate the hardships of a strenuous life filled with much "professional" work.

It was furthermore revealed that the court of thieves has established rules and regulations of proceeding against "squealers" and pronouncing verdicts on the strength of what they considered their own particular code.

The "social ministry" of the underworld kingdom had even started a sort of life insurance for its subjects, to which every member of the community contributed his share.

Honoring The Barrymore Tradition

New York.—The very remarkable clan of Barrymore, which has achieved considerable fame, applause and even tradition, is about to have a more lasting memorial to its name.

In West 47th street, where theaters now all but tumble over each other, workmen are tearing away the scaffolding from the bright and shining new facade of a new show-shop which will bear the name of Ethel Barrymore.

The Messrs. Shubert, who have erected it in Miss Barrymore's honor and for her use, dedicate it simply "to the outstanding actress of the American stage." Here she will reveal her ripe talents in winter repertoire—the first produc-

tion to be Sierra's Spanish drama, "The Kingdom of God." The pageant of opening, receiving, acclaiming and formal dedication will be the outstanding theatrical event of the current season, with Manhattan's most important silk hats, evening gowns, critics and theatrical folk in attendance.

So much for the simple facts!

There is no theatrical family produced by America with a more loyal stage tradition than the Barrymore's. In fact, last season there appeared on Broadway a particularly amusing play by Edna Ferber, "The Royal Family." It was, obviously, a satiric comedy of this clan. Loyalty to stage traditions played an eminently important part. The outstanding characters were slaves to their audiences and theatrical illusions. It was the character presumed to be Ethel Barrymore who "floated" most of the rest of the clan. It was to her that they all came when they were hard up and it was in their menage that they all gathered to eat, vacation or impose.

This character was, of course, highly exaggerated. She was pictured as engaged to wed a wealthy South American who wanted to take her away from the stage, to give her ease and luxury. Yet, in a moment where the very stability of the romance was at issue, a stage call came and she rushed away to the theater, leaving her love staring vacantly into air.

And there was the venerable grandmother who, when scarcely able to totter, still was preparing to take the road as a trouper and who sat in her arm chair endlessly adoring the painting of a celebrated sire who had made stage history. Finally there was a fictitious youthful member of the family, who vowed not to be enslaved, as were the others, and whose sweetheart sought to rescue her from the traditional ties. But, in the end—she, too, went.

They tell me that the Barrymore did not take kindly to the allusions. And yet, in spite of all the kidding, it seemed to me a fine tribute, after all, to a stage tradition that is fast disappearing. Nor was the comedy entirely untrue. It may have shown madder scenes than one would find around a Barrymore family gathering—yet it asked you to believe that the theater is firmly implanted in their blood. Which is not so hard to believe.

At any rate, the name of Barrymore will hang for many a year before a tasteful theater, of Spanish architecture—reminding one not only of Ethel, but of the great Maurice and of Georgia Drew, of John Drew, and of John and Lionel Barrymore and all the rest of a great theatrical clan.

The week on Broadway was marked only by the 146th—or was it the 143rd—play from the pen of Owen Davis. Davis seems to be the one playwright who can leave the indefatigable Willard Mack behind him.

Davis is a most adroit and skillful craftsman of the theater. His most trivial item is likely to be a better product than one boasted by many a more high-batted gent.

This time he is back at mystery-comedy—the opus being "Tonight at 12," with a new producer to Broadway, Herman Shubert, in charge. It is one of the few entertaining pieces in town. The opening of the week was "The Squealer," which went to the old-fashioned melodrama for its thrills and may succeed in amusing jaded theater-goers.

Dinner: — Vegetable soup, Salisbury steak, baked grated carrots, salad of celery and lettuce, jello with cream.

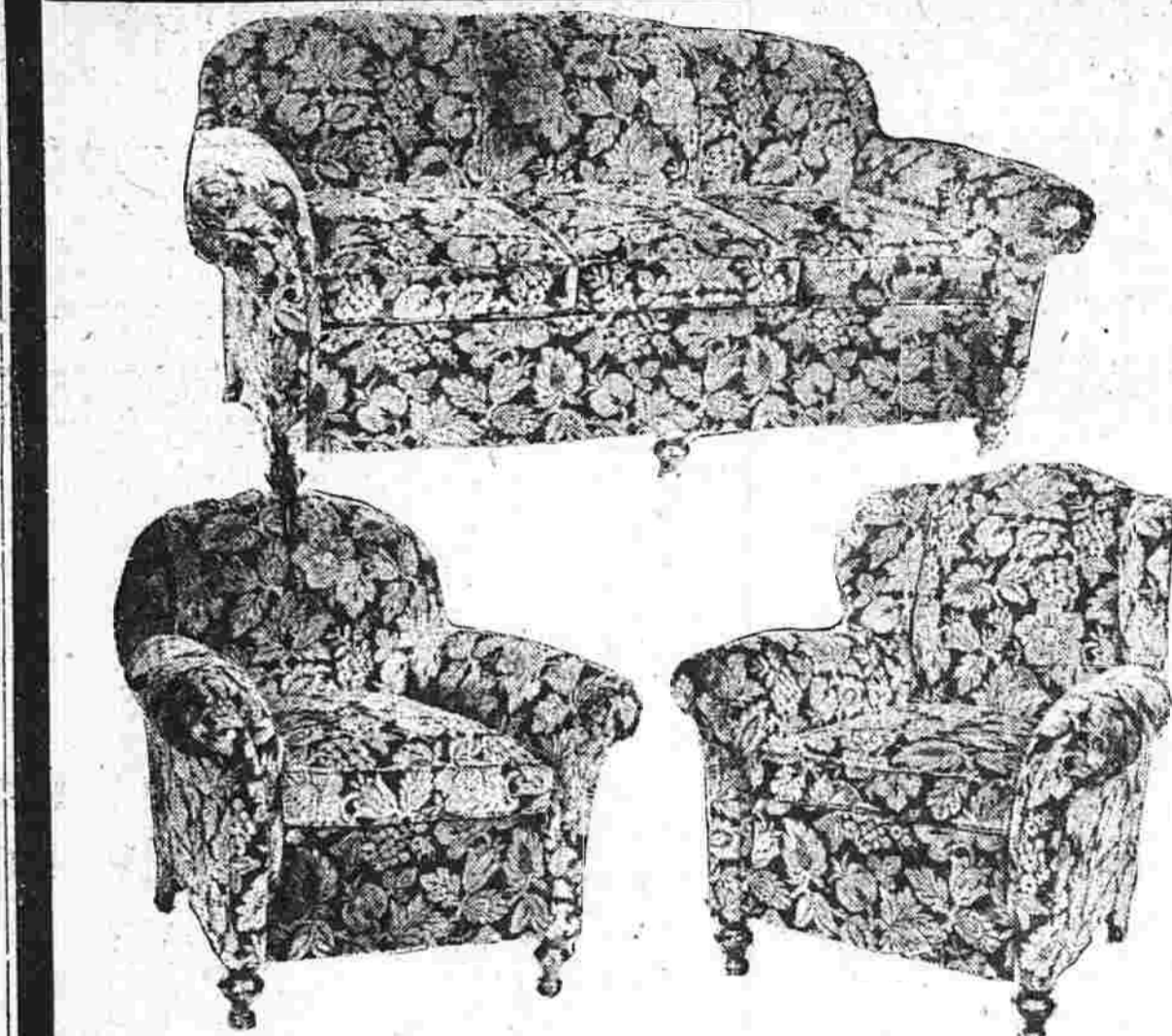

OLDEST BREED OF DOGS OWNED IN PORTLAND Descendants of the oldest breed of dogs known to man are owned by L. P. Baker of Portland, Conn., who plans to enter six in the coming dog show at the Foot Guard Armory, Hartford, Conn., Feb. 18 and 19. These hounds were known by Alexander the Great, when he invaded India, 329 B. C. Hieroglyphics on Temple of Thebes 1600 B. C. and carvings of 7000-6000 B. C. show that these dogs existed before Pharaohs of Egypt. Mummified specimens have been found in Egyptian tombs. The breed is known as the Saluki and has always been famous for its swiftness, stamina, and for hunting. The Crusaders brought some back with them. The Romans and Greeks who soldiered in the East observed their prowess in hunting the Gazelle. The Saluki resembles our modern greyhound in body and is colored in fawn, black and white, black and tan and pure black or white, with feathered ears, tall and limbs. The speed of these keen-eyed hunters has made them famous of late in England, where the racing of gazelle hounds has stupendous popularity. The sport has been brought to American and we already have several tracks devoted to racing these dogs.

Big British Camp
As a tribute to General Sir Robert S. Baden-Powell and in celebration of the twenty-first anniversary of the founding of the Boy Scout Movement, 30,000 Boy Scouts, representing forty-three nations will encamp at Birkenhead, across the Mersey from Liverpool, England, from July 31 until August 14, 1929. 1,000 Boy Scouts of America, representing every portion of the United States, will take part in the International Jamboree.

Although the actual length of the International Jamboree Encampment will be fifteen days, due to the fact that Scouts will be visiting in Europe from all parts of the world there will be Boy Scouts traveling on educational tours through Europe during the entire duration of the school vacation period.

No Competitions
Instead of competitive games which were a part of all previous International Jamborees, the Jamboree this year will take the form of a world-wide camp or series of camps in which Scouts from each of the countries represented will carry on camping activities as they do in their own countries. It will be the greatest peace-time encampment of boys in the history of the world and the purpose of the Jamboree is to increase the feeling of brotherhood between the Boy Scouts of many nations.

Tribute
The International Jamboree will also take the form of a tribute to Sir Robert Baden-Powell, who twenty-one years ago crystallized his studies of years and his Scouting experiences at Mafeking and organized the first troop of Boy Scouts in the world. There are now nearly 2,000,000 Boy Scouts and Scout leaders affiliated through the International Bureau. Somewhat less than half of this number are Boy Scouts of America, there being at present 600,000 boys and more than 200,000 leaders enrolled in this country. These Scouts all subscribe in common, to the tenets of the Scout Oath and the Scout Law. The Boy Scout Movement share with the Red Cross the quality of being a great world-wide program and with it is one of the only four service organizations chartered by Congress.

MORE SCHOOL DAYS PROPOSED IN BILL

State Board of Education Wants to Define More Certain Schedule.

Hartford, Feb. 15.—A school year of 190 days is provided for in the proposed revision of the Connecticut school laws now before the general assembly. The present law requires 38 weeks of school and with omission of school days due to holidays and other causes the net school year in most towns is about 184 days. The state board of education, which is supporting the measure, feels that with the increasing sums being spent on school plants and teaching personnel and with the enriched curriculum offered, that the best interests of pupil and the public are served by a lengthening of the compulsory school year. The proposed revision would fix a minimum school year whereas the present law, providing that schools shall be open 38 weeks, permits wide variation from year to year as a week might include from one to five school days.

Another interesting provision in the proposed code is that giving the

state board of education authority to grant such degrees, exclusive of honorary degrees, as are usually granted in colleges of education. This proposal is intended to aid many hundreds of teachers in the state. These teachers are accumulating academic credit by taking professional courses either at summer schools or during the school year. Fully 600 Connecticut teachers take courses at Yale each year. Few colleges will give a student a degree who has not been in residence for a much longer period than is possible for most teachers.

Furthermore, there is no college in Connecticut giving the professional courses that in-service teachers desire that will grant a bachelor's degree to a woman.

And so these teachers, under the proposed plan, would earn their credits at recognized institutions and when, with their normal school credits they had met prescribed standards, the state board of education would confer the degree of bachelor of education.

A high school education and free text books are made rights rather than privileges under other sections of the bill. The present law says that a town "may" provide high school opportunity. The revision substitutes the word "shall" as it is felt that secondary school education is now really the right of any boy or girl in the state mentally equipped for it. The section requiring free text books will affect only a few towns, and the high school section fewer. And as regards text books, it is pointed out that under this revision high as

well as elementary school texts would be free to the pupil.

Several sections of the revision pertain to the towns having school districts. There is one provision that district superintendents shall have the same rights as town superintendents now have in regard to nomination of all teachers, those nominations to be accepted or rejected within a month. Another section refers to the fact that previous to 1909, by voluntary action, 104 towns had consolidated their school districts. The proposed revision would take from these towns the right to return to the district system, placing them in the same status as the towns that were consolidated by legislative act in 1909.

In speaking of the proposed revision of the school laws State Education Commissioner Albert B. Meredith said today that there has been an attempt to effect simplicity and directness so that the law may be easily read by a lay person. The term "board of education" would be established as the name of the body having charge of local schools, "committee" being eliminated except as regards school districts. Many of the school laws enacted from time to time have provided for specific penalties for violations. Most of these have been eliminated as the general law code violation of school statutes is considered adequate in most cases.

the seven foot chasm between the two buildings, threw water on Bitter's clothing and rolled him in blankets until the fire was out. Her heroic measures were in vain, however, for Bitter died a few minutes later.

YALE TO ESTABLISH NOVEL INSTITUTION

Scientists to Investigate Man's Behavior in New School Planned.

New Haven, Conn., Feb. 15.—Yale University has received gifts and subsidies representing a capital of \$7,500,000 for the establishment of an Institute of Human Relations in which the University's resources for the scientific investigation of man's behavior from the physical and mental to the individual and social viewpoints will be concentrated, according to an announcement made tonight by President James Rowland Angell.

The Institute is designed to bring together sociologists, biologists, psychologists and economists, who will combine with their colleagues in such applied fields as law, medicine, and psychiatry to correlate knowledge of the mind and body and of individual and group conduct, and to study further the interrelations of the many factors influencing human actions.

The announcement states that Yale intends to make a study of human behavior in all of its aspects one of the University's major objectives. All of the departments of the natural and social sciences will co-operate so far as possible in the plan, with the Institute as the point of contact between them and as a center for their graduate and research work. Every man on the staff of the Institute will hold an appointment in a fundamental University department in order that the work of the Institute may be articulated with that of the University as a whole. This will make possible a co-ordination of related activities dealing with man's welfare, and a concentration of knowledge and concentration of effort which have not been attempted in the solution of complex problems of human relations.

Close Affiliation

Such close affiliation with the professional schools, as well as with the fundamental departments of study, will encourage students to think of their professions as having to do primarily with human beings, rather than with test tubes, statute books, codes or creeds.

Of the total amount mentioned, \$3,500,000 has been given by the Rockefeller Foundation for a building. The income from \$2,000,000 amounting to \$100,000 a year, has also been granted by the Foundation for a period of ten years for the development of psychiatry, \$50,000 to be used annually for the development of the educational program in this field, and \$50,000 for the care of patients.

There is also available for this phase of the Institute's work the income from \$1,000,000, amounting to \$50,000 a year, granted by the Commonwealth Fund in 1926 and continuing through 1931. This will be used as in the past for the work in mental hygiene.

The income from \$3,000,000, amounting to \$150,000 a year, has been voted for ten years by the Laura Spelman Rockefeller Memorial for research in the social sciences and for the continuance of research in child development and in psychology.

Conduct of the Institute will rest with the professors devoting their full time or the larger part of their time to its interests. The plan is to form an executive committee composed of the deans of the graduate, medical and law schools, one representative of the social sciences, and one representative of the natural sciences.

Institute Building

Plans are now being drawn for the Institute building which is to be located on land already acquired in the immediate vicinity of the Yale School of Medicine and the New Haven hospital. It will provide modern facilities for activities now inadequately housed and widely scattered, bringing these units into contiguity with each other, so that all may enjoy a constant exchange of ideas and facilities.

Although a startling innovation, the Institute of Human Relations is, according to President Angell, a logical development of the best tendencies in modern education and research. It is designed to permit progress which cannot well be made as long as sharp lines divide the various branches of a science from one another in educational institutions. It is based on the belief that speaking precisely, the living human body and the human mind are not separate, but inter-dependent entities; and that, in like manner, the individual and the social group can be understood only in relation to each other.

Though unique in conception the Institute is thus held to be based on the soundest principles. It will foster no fads and hold no brief for theories except those which grow out of thorough scientific investigation. It is believed by those organizing the Institute of Human Relations that the specialization which followed the important scientific discoveries of the last century has done much to advance man's knowledge of human life and the technique for dealing with special phases of it, but that the time has now come for drawing together this knowledge and applying it to the best advantage of mankind as a whole. Man himself must now be the center of study, and his welfare an end and aim of the biological and social sciences and of the related professions.

It is believed, concluded President Angell, that the Institute of Human Relations will make important contributions not only in specific additions to knowledge through research, but also in breaking down old barriers between the branches of science and in bringing about a unification of knowledge which will revitalize graduate study and the training of workers in all the fields which have to do with human conduct.

BUILDING PROGRAM TO AID INDIANA STONE SELLERS.

Bedford, Ind.—A large part of the \$269,000,000 appropriated for the new building program of the United States government will enrich the stone belt of Indiana, according to A. E. Dickinson, president of the Indiana Limestone Company.

Specifications require that buildings be constructed of the famous Indiana limestone which is quarried in Lawrence and Monroe counties of this State.

Indiana stone sellers have almost obtained a monopoly for building material for the 6 to 8 blocks of government construction on the Mall in Washington, D. C.

THREE HUB-EX-MAYORS MAY RUN FOR SENATE.

Boston.—A triple ex-mayorality battle may be staged in the Hub this year for the seat in the United States Senate, now occupied by Senator Gilbert.

The three ex-mayors whose names are linked with the report are John J. Fitzgerald, Andrew J. Peters, and Mayor Malcolm E. Nichols. The latter's term as chief executive of Boston expires Dec. 31. Under the present city charter, no mayor may be a candidate for that office two terms in succession.

I have two hobbies. One is that any room is not good enough for the children, the other is that just any old room is not good enough for the boy.

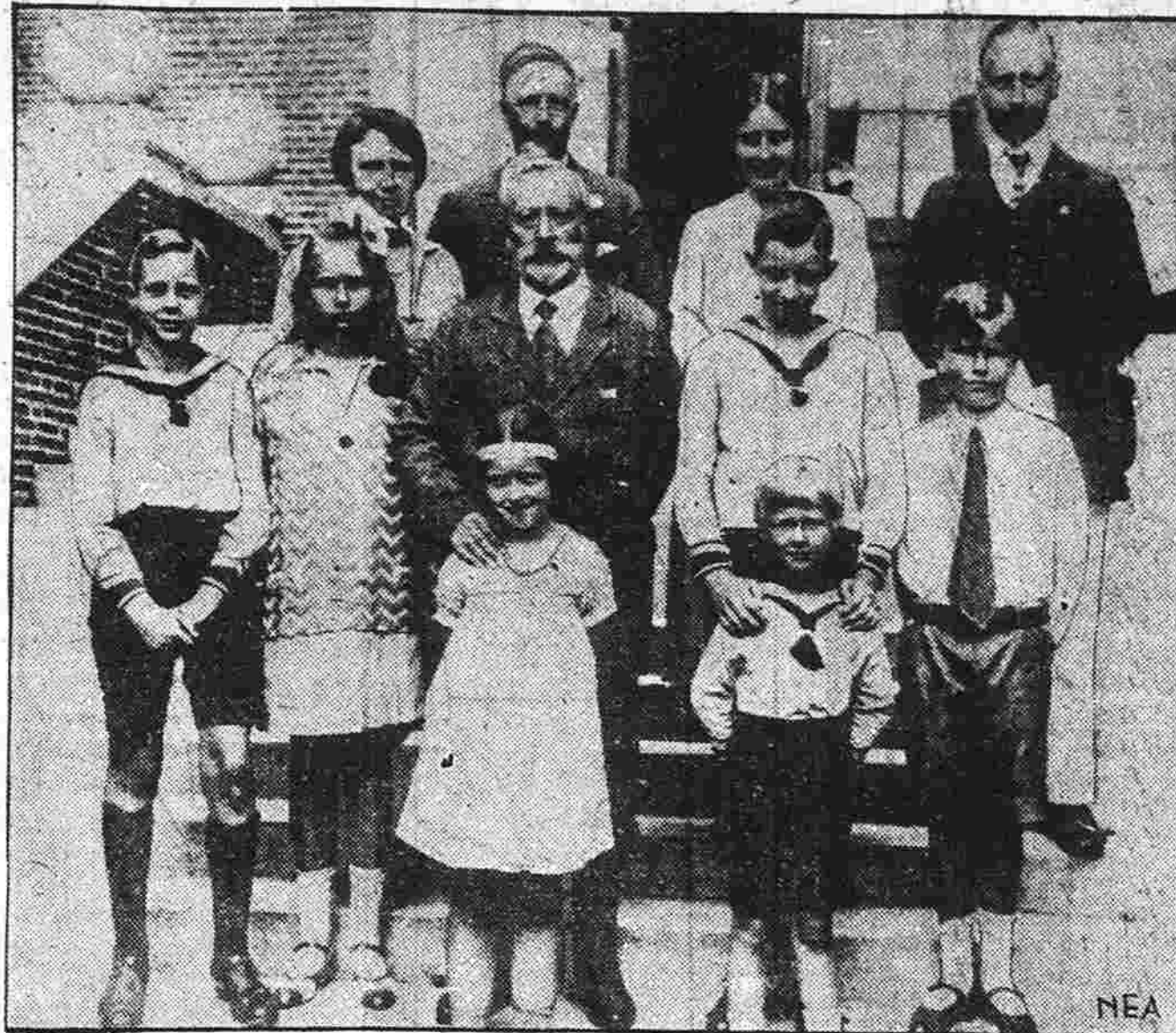
Why shouldn't a boy experience a feeling of unfairness and resentment if his living quarters suffer by comparison with those of his sisters and parents?

PROLETARIANS CHEER DEATH SENTENCE ON MILLIONAIRE KILLER

Moscow.—A courtroom jammed with proletarians, thirsty for revenge, cheered the death sentence of Alexey Kalganov, 25-year-old son of a former millionaire fish merchant, is one of the most sensational class war trials Moscow has had in months.

Kalganov was accused of stabbing to death Karavayev, the Communist chairman of the apartment house tenants committee, in which he lived. The house used to be owned by Kalganov's father, who with son and daughter, continued to occupy a slice of their once luxurious quarters since the revolution when the building was confiscated. The sting of being bossed by a "low" Communist and workers' committee in their own home caused bad blood.

Finally Karavayev ordered Kalganov to get rid of a dog which neighbors complained against as a nuisance. Kalganov refused. A fight ensued in which Kalganov drew a Finnish knife and stabbed the committee chairman to death.

The murder caused a sensation. Investigation revealed that the house was full of former bourgeoisie who passed themselves off as workers in order to obtain lodgings. Some of them had threatened the house chairman with violence. The prosecutor branded the murder as an act of political terrorism tantamount to counter revolution. On this ground the judge sentenced Kalganov to death, though murder in the ordinary sense is not punishable by execution in Soviet Russia.

The case started a city-wide man hunt for "princes" who are usurping lodging space that rightfully belongs to the workers. Scores of private traders and former blue bloods are being thrown out of even tiny apartments which they are not legally entitled to occupy so long as there are members of the working class inadequately housed.

LIFETIME JOB

Lewes, Del.—Following his recent election as mayor of this town, Dr. James T. Thompson, 85, commenced serving his 28th term in office. Mayor Thompson has been the oldest mayor in point of service and age in the United States. One-third of his life has been devoted to the job.

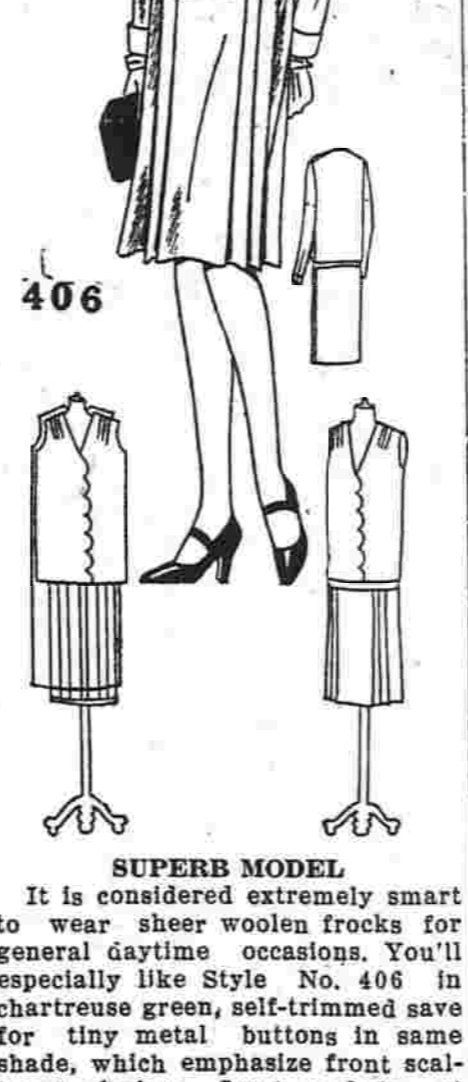

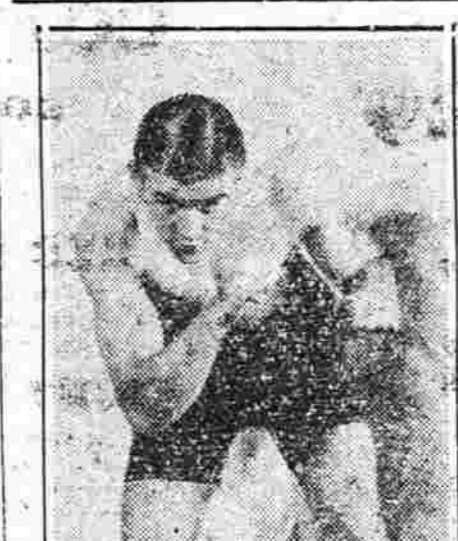
MOONLIGHT GOLF MATCH TO BE STAGED AT MAICON.

New Book Gives Changed Idea Of Prince Rudolf

By MILTON BRONNER.

London.—The great war and toppling of thrones have caused the opening of many secret archives. Not only has the international interplay about treaties and alliances been revealed in all its nakedness, but a dazzling light has been thrown on some of the personalities who for so many years played so large a part in the old world stage. Revelations have made the European nations think less of their former heroes. But a recent book issued in Germany has quite the opposite effect. It deals with the reign of Franz Josef, war time emperor of Austria. The Crown Prince. It does much to rehabilitate that Crown Prince Rudolf, who, with his mistress, was found so mysteriously dead in a villa not far from Vienna. Rudolf has always been depicted as a light-headed, light-hearted Don Juan, addicted to wine, women and morphine. But this new book, with documentary evidence, shows him as a serious-minded youth who chafed at the fetters of his position, who saw through the rotten structure of the empire, and whose intimate friends were not drunken army officers and aristocrats and light women, but journalists who battled for liberalism. The man to whom he poured out his soul was Moritz Szeps, chief editor of the Neue Wiener Tagblatt. In 1882, the 24-year-old heir to the throne of the empire which was allied with Germany and against France, wrote Szeps: "We have enormously to thank France as the main-spring of all liberal ideas and institutions on the continent. On the contrary what is Germany? Nothing but an enlarged Prussian military state. What good was 1870 to Germany? In addition to their regiment of little kings and princes, the Germans now have a kaiser. They must pay for a much larger army. Supported on the points of bayonets, they have a reich ruled by soldiers, police and bureaucrats." Forsee Upheaval. He not only wrote democratically, but he acted so. When promoted to colonel in the empire's army, he chose for his regiment, not one of the crack organizations of the capital, but went to Prague as the chief officer of a Bohemian regiment, all of which officers, instead of being aristocrats, were men sprung up from middle class families. From Prague, keeping his eyes open, he constantly wrote letters giving Szeps inside information for his paper. He also wrote informative articles which appeared without any indication of their origin. He saw Vienna as clear-sightedly as he saw Germany. He wrote to Szeps from Prague: "What's going on in Vienna I glean from the newspapers and private letters: money swindles, theft, corruption, bleeding of the state. As a quiet observer, I am furious as to how little is to be done before an old and tough structure like Austria will crack and fall to pieces in all its joints."

HEAVEN'S BELLS

Moscow.—The biggest bell in Europe, the Tsar Kolokol, or "king" bell, has been converted into a chapel. The bell was cast in 1653, and weighed 198 tons. A fire in 1737 destroyed its supporting beams and the bell crashed to the ground. Then someone thought of cutting a door in the metal and, presto, a church bell became a bell chapel.

James Bassett, a Frenchman, is trying to make artificial diamonds in an electric kiln. He believes he will be able to create diamonds from carbon by using a pressure of 50,000 pounds.

Miami, Fla.—The pilot of the Pan-American transport plane, "Christopher Columbus," recently left New York for Miami with 12 passengers. When the plane landed only eleven passengers got out. 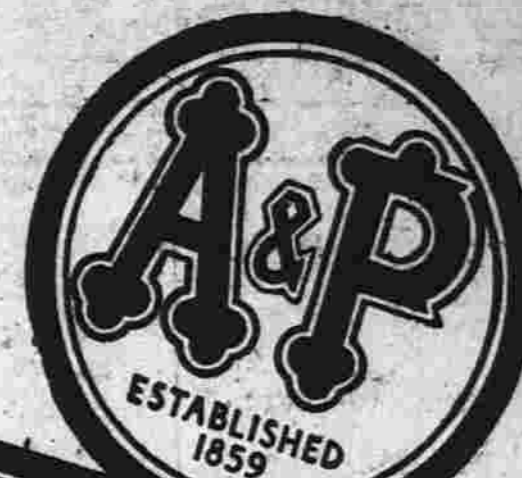

PATROLMAN SHOOTS CHICAGO BANDITS

Stands in Middle of Street and Brings Down Three; He Is Not Hit.

Chicago, Feb. 15.—Gunplay broke out in Chicago again today when three bandits were shot and seriously wounded by a policeman. Patrolman William Kattelhut standing coolly in the middle of a street, exchanged revolver fire with the bandits and brought each one down with five well-directed shots. They were rushed to a hospital. The three dashed from a grocery and Kattelhut ordered them to stop. They began firing at him and the policeman then drew his revolver and wounded them. The men had just robbed the grocery, the policeman learned later.

WAS BOOZE WAR.
Chicago, Feb. 15.—War between the George "Bugs" Moran liquor interests of Chicago and the notorious Purple gang of Detroit was the favored theory of authorities today. In explanation for the massacre of six Moran gangsters and one innocent bystander in a north side garage here yesterday. Recently, according to state attorneys investigation, several loads of liquor from Detroit which key runners had been "hi-jacked" here by Moran's men. The accused motor city gang is said to be under the leadership of four Bernstein brothers.

Trapped Like Rats.
The seven men were trapped like rats, lined up against the rear wall of the garage and shot full of lead from machine guns. They didn't have a chance. Six died in their tracks. The seventh, with twenty slugs in his body, crawled to the door as police arrived and died a few hours later in a hospital. This wholesale execution, carried out with the precision of a Mexican firing squad, required only a few seconds. The scene was the garage of the S. M. C. Cartage Co., 2122 N. Clark street, said by police to have been headquarters for bootlegging operations of the Moran gang.

BIRTH RATE IN DROP AS WOMEN ENTER INDUSTRY

Fort Worth, Texas.—"The entrance of mind into industrial pursuits sounds the doom of the old patriarchal family system," is the view taken by Card D. Wells associate professor of Sociology at Texas Christian University. "In the larger cities it is becoming more and more difficult to maintain a decent standard of living and at the same time have a large family," he says. Consequently, the birthrate is declining among the more educated classes. In order to maintain the standard our people have attained, something must be done.

Effect of Overwork.
While admitting the many advantages of the closer partnership between man and wife, Prof. Wells pointed out several rather serious disadvantages of the new order, such as the alarming frequency with which the birth of feeble-minded or otherwise sub-normal children is directly traceable to overwork and depression of the mother.

"Dr. Max G. Schlapp, professor of neuropathology at the New York Post Graduate Medical School has done a great deal of research in this subject and his figures are, to say the least, disquieting," said Wells.

A more optimistic reaction to the situation is had from Paul Baker, assistant professor in the T. C. U. sociology department, who does not fear the consequences of the industrial movement among women.

"It is, of course, easy to see the dangers we face, but I feel sure that they can be adequately met. Women's organizations are working with authorities to perfect legislation looking to the protection of women workers and medical people are studying methods for promoting their health and well being," Baker stated.

Declining Birthrate.
"The question of declining birthrate and the absence of mothers from their children during the day will be met. Training of children by teachers and caretakers qualified for the task, may result in a better citizenry than we obtain under our present system," Baker thinks.

When asked what profession they would choose from a comprehensive list presented, girls of the sociology classes of the university showed a preponderant choice for a place as home-maker and housewife.

"The census of 1920 showed that 1,920,281 women in the United States were engaged in paid employment. Of this number, 23 per cent were married women, so you see that the problem is with us and we will have to take steps to cope with it," Baker concluded.

KAPLAN TO TESTIFY

New York, Feb. 15.—Meyer Kaplan, ex-convict and bank swindler, is expected to resume his testimony today before the Federal Grand Jury which is inquiring into alleged bankruptcy irregularities.

The Grand Jury it is believed will concern itself chiefly with an examination of Judge Francis A. Winslow's action in releasing Kaplan on parole two years ago. Two other witnesses of yesterday, Abraham I. Manin and Moses Polakoff, former assistant federal attorneys, also are expected to testify again today. The examination of this pair indicates that the grand jury has taken up the case of Walter Gutterson, who was mentioned in the La Guardia charges. Manin and Polakoff prosecuted the mail fraud cases in which Gutterson and three other defendants pleaded guilty. Judge Winslow sentenced Gutterson to thirty days in jail and gave the minor defendants two days in jail each.

Meanwhile Judge Winslow is continuing in his announced intention to remain away from the bench until La Guardia's charges are substantiated or found false.

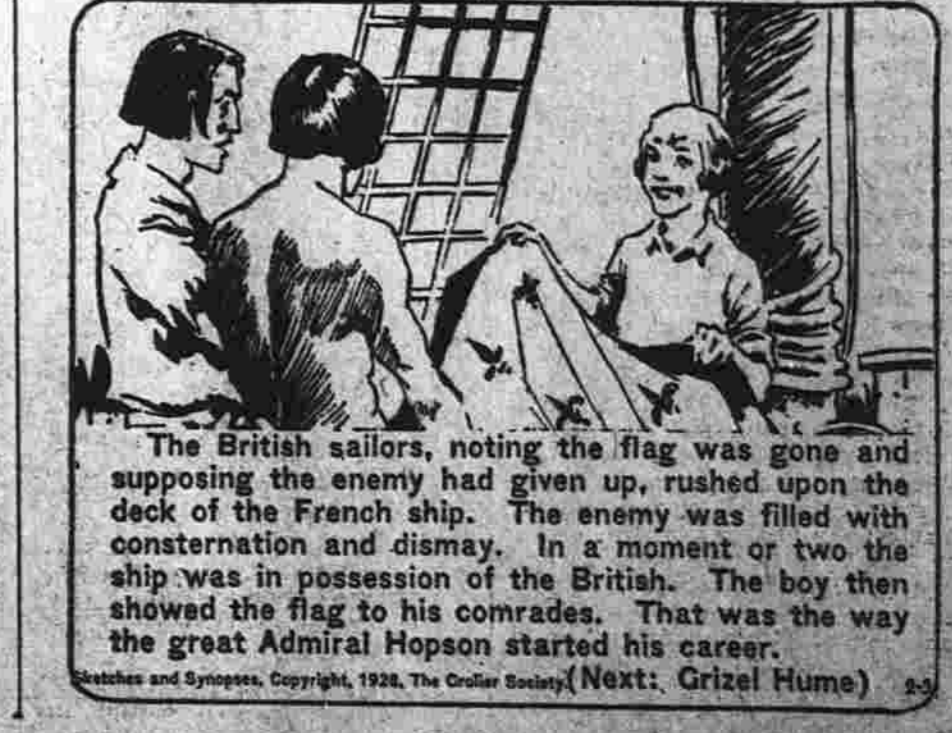

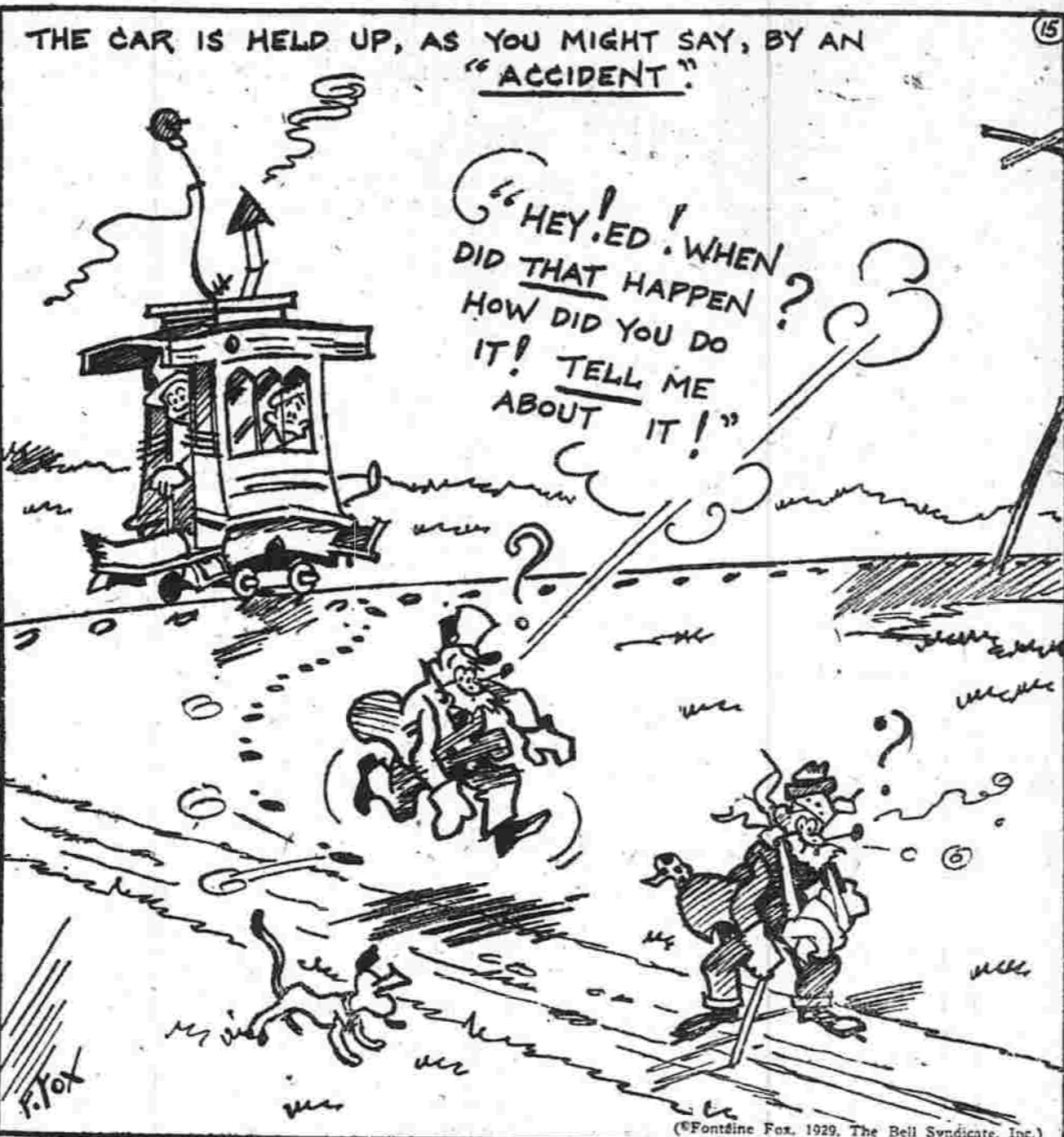

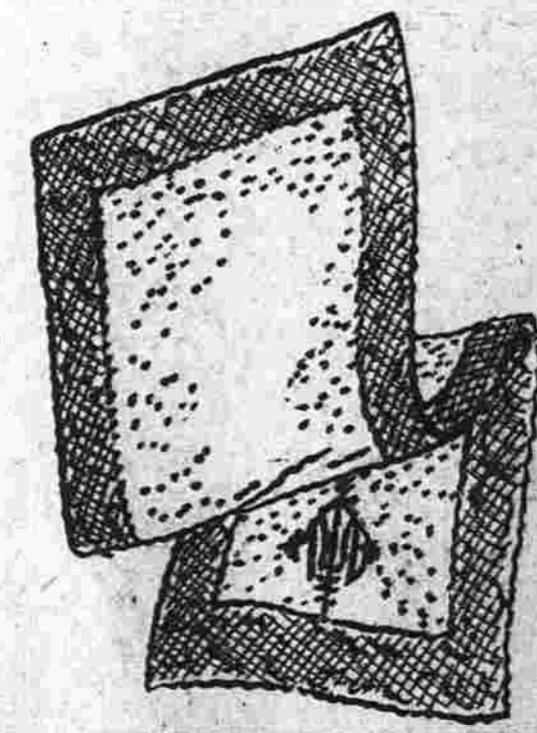
