

FACTS NECTICUT

(238) Postal Receipts Total Ten Million-

Gross receipts of the 329 post offices in Connecticut amounted to approximately \$10,000,000 during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1928. This was more than twice the total receipts for the year ending June 30, 1917. There are 49,944 post offices in the United States and insular possessions, 5,500 less than the total number ten years ago. The New England states have a total of 2.654 post offices-823 in Maine: 646 in Massachusetts; 384 in Vermont; 378 in New Hampshire; 329 in Connecticut, and 94 in Rhode Island.

Of the 329 post offices in Connecticut, the postmasters of 169 are presidential appointees, twenty-five being first-class, 47 second-class, and 97 third-class. There are in addition 160

Compensation of Connecticut postmasters amounted to \$495 .-902 last year as against \$352,468 ten years ago. First and second-class postmasters received \$215,745; third-class, \$170,-379, and fourth-class, \$109,778 last year.

The gross receipts for Connecticut post offices has increased more rapidly during the past decade than those of any other New England state. Total gross receipts of the 2.654 post offices in New England for 1928 amounted to \$49,702,742. Massachusetts led with a total of \$28,669,429. Connecticut was second with \$9.915,970. None of the other states exceeded \$4,000,000. The total receipts for New England for the year ending in 1917 amounted to \$26.815.481, Massachusetts leading. with \$15,686,352 and Connecticut second with \$4,512,703 in gross receipts. Connecticut's gross postal receipts last year were 1.5% of the \$673,953,726 total for the United States.

The trip has been made possible through the generosity of the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace.

The debate will be held on the evening of April 9 in the Teatro Nacional of San Juan. The question to be discussed is 'Resolved: that the future of Latin-America depends more upon the development of Pan-Hispanism than on the present concept of Pan-Americanism." 

Old and New Decorations

"Modern decoration" is only a relative term. New things may be old-fashioned and at the same time be modern. In the past, different countries have had their own ideals of decorative beauty, which were often found to be repeated now and again throughout the ages. The pyramids and the ancient tombs of the Pharoahs contain elements of design that are today, in spirit, extremely modern. There are cycles in the art of decorative painting, and repetition of line and design, either in entirety or modified form, that are not at all unusual.

The pyramids, with their simple and severe structural lines, were modern in 400 B. C., but in the reign of Louis XV, their sharp angles were obsolete. Today, however, the severe structural lines, which set them definitely apart as something of the past, may be readily recognized in modern architecture as better symbolizing thep resent day than would the intricate filigree and rococo work of 200 years : "o. Today, architecture endeavors to bring forward the constructive features of the building by disregarding such additional decorative motifs as have commonly been employed in such lavish manner in

Created Art Creations in art that come nearest to expressing the ideal of decorative beauty of their own time can be considered modern. Modern art has been created in all ages, and among all people. Even the savage and uncivilized races have produced art very modern and symbolical.

Each phase of civilizations has, In turn, arisen to a greater or lesser height, and then has declined, but, in passing, has fortunately left an intimate record of its own time. These records, written in decorative art, are not difficult to read and through them the entire life of a whole race can be reconstructed. Art is, in reality, a permanent record of the emotions, and after the creators have passed, only the objects which they have created remain as a definite and understandable record of their achievements.

Must Be Modern day; it must express life which is immediately about us, and must reflect the main characteristics of our own complex civilization. Our age is one of science, invention, machinery, industry, and commerce. The great complexity of things about us is constantly apparent. It is indeed difficult for human nature to keep pace with modern invention. and while complexity is a characteristic of our mechanical lives, it is the direct opposits of this which we seek for relaxation and enjoyment. The opposity of complexity is simplicity. The modern radio set, with its maze of wires, tubes, and ingenious contrivances, is perfected in the laboratories of industry. As soon as it enters the home, however, its entire complex mechanism is covered with a simple and dignified cabinet. Outwardly, the modern automobile, with its severe fines, is very simple compared to the curves and detailed carvings of an old coach, but beneath this simplicity a very complex machine is concealed. Simple lines are modern; they are restful to the eye, are dignified, and tend to cover up the complexity of the machine age It they do not completely do this, theyat least divert the attention and permit one to feel himself the master of the machinery. Simplicity is modern, and is typical of our time. Recently the most definite change

has taken place, and this change was first prompted by necessity. The problem that has arisen concerns the question of how to create a greater harmony between our external life and the interiors of our homes.

Develops Slowly great deal of experimenting has already been done in many fields, but the decorative arts have been slower in their development. The probable reason for this lies in the fact that the home is recorded as a gathering place too personal for the owner to indulge in too many costly experiments or novelties. While developments in decorative art have been slow, they have, nevertheless been steady and sure. As times goes on, one finds himself out of barmony, and completely out of sympathy, with period and imitation antique furniture. Walls and ceilings covered with fancy plaster work are distinctly resented. Marble-top tables, nicknack cabinets and gilt-edged furnishings of past penerations are gradually being discarded, while newer and simpler designs and color and form are taking their places. The modern trend in furniture design, as in all previous periods, is influenced very largely by the architecture of its day. Modern furniture has several strong characteristics by which it may be

readily recognized. It is built in flat surfaces and strong lines; the angles are decided and sharp. The proportions are well considered and the finished, in general, beyond reproach. Useless panel moldings and scroll-reliefs are avoided as much as possible, in order to gain the effeet of extreme and severe simplicity. In general color may be said to be the finish which is usually accorded it. Strong contrasts further vally the modern type of furniture, which the people of today are quick to welcome. This furniture, so constructed as to be in keeping with the type of interior in which it must be placed, offers the fullest advantages to the user of color who seeks to add more interest to the drab interior which constituted the home of a few years ago. 





'Over the Table" Costumes Require New Treatment of Wrist and Neck.

While much has been said of the way the silhouette is taking curves unto itself and skirts are adding this or that kind of fullness, cuffs and collars have slyly changed their whole character. They have gone graceful, charmingly feminine and very decerative.

There is a wealth of originality in neck and wrist treatments. Of course this really means that the whole bodice portion of a frock has increasing importance. The hot sandwich is in excellent solution of the luncheon problem on many occasions. Some combinations can be served satisfactorily to an entire family, particularly when toast is the frame-work. The toasted sandwich, a glass, of milk and fresh or stewed fruit makes an ideal spring luncheon for children as well as adults.

sides the regulation toast with filling. There are those in which sauted slices of bread, French toast or fresh slices of bread oven-toasted with the filling are used. The hot baking-powder biscuit type seems more like a meat or vegetable shortcake than sandwich.

There are dessert sandwiches and breakfast sandwiches and the novelty of them makes it possible to serve simple, nourishing foods so they will be welcomed by everybody. Open sandwiches are attractive with their garnish of minced parsley, thinly sliced pickle, olive or grated cheese in place of the top slice.

Crisp toast is more wholesome than plain untoasted bread since it makes us chew, the process that most of us take too little trouble about. So be sure to serve toasted sandwiches as soon as prepared before the filling has any chance to soften the toast.

This is an excellent way to use up left-overs and the open sandwich provides an ideal method of serving delicate spring vegetables in their own juice. For instance an open asparagus sandwich with a garnish of hard cooked egg means that the toast can absorb the moisture clinging to the vegetable. 

Then-the Accessories Along with her dresses and coat or her suit or ensemble, she must consider accessories. Hats, belts, shoes, purses, scarfs, pins and so on must be considered important members of the style family.

In some ways the very best choice for Easter is the spring coat and hat combination, with inexpensive figured frocks bought later as one can afford them. Such a coat should be medium or dark colored wool, without fur, but cut with a dash in its fullness, its cuffs or collar that makes of it something more formal than a mere sports coats.

Blue in medium shade, a good green black or brown are all good choices. One tires of red too soon. Light colors need too much clean-


