# Say They Vote to Please Constituents Despite Their Own Habits.

Washington, March 13 - Congress doesn't want any investigation of the "drink-wet, vote-dry" habit on Capitol Hill.

Suggestions that President Hoover's prohibition fact-finding commission investigate the manner in which Congress itself observes the dry law today with opposition among Legislators. Neither Wet nor Dry leaders would comment on the proposal for publication. Privately, they all agreed such an inquiry should not be held.

One hundred and fifty-one years ago today, the Marquis de Noailles, French ambassador in London, announced to the British government that his country recognized the independence of the struggling American colonies, and that it had formed a treaty of friendship and commerce with them.

The treaty had actually been signed several months before. Immediately after the surrender of Burgoyne at Saratoga had proved that the American cause was not altogether hopeless.

War-weary America received the news of French aid with great enthusiasm. It was received with other emotions in Europe, Lord possessions gave her a finger in the American pie, likewise resented the Telephone:

Within a month France and England were at war and Spain was

kept friendly to France only by a secret treaty, which promised that France would recognize United States dominion only as far west as the Mississippi river.


