The last meeting of the National Council was held in San Francisco, California in deference to the great growth of the Boy Scout Movement in the far west in recent years.

Progress It is expected that the Annual Meeting this year will usher in one of the most progressive periods in the history of the Boy Scout Movement. Plans for the general expansion of the Boy Scout program, especially in regard to the admittance of younger boys than those 12 years old as is the present Scout age and also in respect to the holding of the interest of the older boy in Scouting, will be discussed at the meeting. Further extension, too, of the vocational guidance program through the Merit Badges as awarded by the Boy Scouts will be dis-

Due to the fact that this year marks the coming of age of the Boy Scout Movement, internationally, being the 21st birthday of the Boy Scouts since the first Troop was founded by Sir Robert Baden-Powell in England, it is expected that one of the greatest Scout gatherings in the history of the Movement in the United States will be convened when the gavel falls at the Hotel Commodore on May 13.

661 Councils The Boy Scout National Council comprises delegates of the 661 Scout Councils of the United States and a number of additional delegates selected because of important contributions made by them to work among boys.

At the Annual Meeting the officers of the National Council and the National Executive Board are

Walter W. Head of Chicago, Illinois, internationally known as a banker and leader in boys' work, is president of the National Council.

SCHOLLARSHIP AWARD. Scout journalists throughout the United States will be notified this week of a four-year scholarship award to any recognized school of journalistic lines during 1929. The award is made possible through the J. C. Penney Foundation, the donors, and it is valued at \$1,200. It is expected that the award will be made each year.

At the annual meeting of the National Boy Scout Press association held at the same time as the Columbia University, on March 8th, the first announcement of the ward was made by E. S. Martin, Director of the Editorial Department of the Boy Scouts of America. On the same day, another award of an engraved gold watch, to be given to the Scout journalist doing the outstanding single piece of writing during the year was announced. This award will be made by the magazine, Boys' Life.
