SENATOR SAYS FREE SPEECH NOT IN LAWS

(Continued from Page 1) the state or the people. Most states guarantee these rights in their State Constitutions. Where such guarantees are not lodged in the State Constitutions, the rights do not exist.

Walsh Agrees Senator Walsh, one of the nation's greatest constitutional lawyers, said: "Senator King is right. The First Amendment to the Constitution simply prohibits Congress from enacting any law prohibiting free speech or religious liberty. Primarily the right of free speech, etc., rests upon provisions in the Constitutions of the states. But if a state passed a statute, the rights which it is to suppress free speech, a serious question would be raised as to whether it would not be void as violating the 14th Amendment of the Federal Constitution, which declares that no state shall deny to any person the right to life, liberty or property without due process of law."

On the other side, Senator Borah, also recognized as a great constitutional lawyer, observed: "I believe the Constitution amounts to a guarantee of freedom of speech, peaceful assemblage and religious liberty. If Congress is restrained from passing any law to forbid these liberties, the people are free to exercise them as rights."

VEGETABLE GROWERS PLAN NORWICH TRIP

Raisers of Million Dollars Worth of "Truck" Invited to See Three Farms.

The vegetable growers of Hartford County are invited to study plant raising under glass in the town of Norwich, next Tuesday, arriving at Avery Brothers, Norwich, town, 10:30 a. m., according to Chas. D. Lewis, Agricultural Agent of the Hartford County Farm Bureau vegetable committee to arrange such a study.

Avery Brothers raise 100,000 to 150,000 plants in three greenhouses, one of which is over 100 years old. After a study at Avery Brothers' methods, the groups will go to the farm of F. E. Peckham, East Norwich, where they will have an opportunity to study the operations in three large greenhouses and also learn how Mr. Peckham raises plants under several hundred hot bed sash.

From F. E. Peckham's group will go to the adjoining farm of L. R. Peckham who has five greenhouses devoted to plant raising and the production of some crops such as lettuce and spinach under glass. Demonstrations covering various operations in the production of plants will be arranged for the group at these houses and the members of the farms are invited will be on hand to answer any questions that may arise.

A million dollars worth of vegetables are produced in the Hartford area each year. The Farm Bureau vegetable committee includes, J. B. Lewis, Southington, Chairman; Lee Rand, Wilton; W. H. Carrier, Glastonbury; Chris Petersen; Wapping; James Anderson, Wethersfield; J. Jensen, Hartland; Don D. Manchester, Bristol; and Leon G. Hall, Berlin.

Many fashionable-gowned women were among the courtroom spectators finally ejected by the magistrate, as well as prominent medical practitioners, clergymen and welfare workers. In the throng were Mrs. Ogden Reid, Mrs. Charles Brush, Jr., trustee of the Brush Foundation for Eugenics, the Rev. Dr. Karl Relland, rector of St. George's Episcopal church and Dr. Dewit Stetten, Park avenue physician.

declared to be entirely satisfactory to him. The House bill was opened for amendment after five days of exhaustive debate. Despite the expected presentation of a score of amendments and some bitter opposition, Rep. Haugen (R) of Iowa, chairman of the agricultural committee, was confident of a final vote tomorrow.

Hoover's Program Both the old McNary-Haugen bill with its equalization fee and the export debenture plan of the National Grange were to be brought forth in the House in opposition to the so-called "Hoover Program" for a gigantic cooperative marketing scheme backed by the exportment to the extent of \$500,000,000. Among the amendments proposed to the House bill are:

Agriculture committee amendments designed to make it impossible for cooperative farm organizations to use government money to build warehouses and marketing terminals if existing facilities can be used. The export debenture plan, under which farmers would be paid an export bounty of some \$146,000,000 annually for losses on export crops, the money to be paid out of tariff receipts. Rep. Jones (D) of Texas planned to offer this as an optional plan in the Haugen bill. Equalization Fee The old equalization fee bill, to

be sponsored by Reps. Cannon and Nelson, both Missouri Democrats. Amendment of Rep. Luffitlum (D) of Maryland requiring Federal Farm Board to give existing private elevator and commission companies the right to function on the same basis as cooperatives, if they render equal services. Although the House has indicated during debate that it will support the Hoover program, both Reps. Cannon and Jones planned to make vigorous attacks upon the Haugen Bill. Mr. Hoover promised to let Congress formulate a bill but never has a president taken more arbitrary action than he did in writing a letter denouncing the expert debenture plan," said Cannon. "He promised to make the tariff effective on farm crops, but you must pass the equalization fee bill to do this."

He told sheriffs "he called to them but they wouldn't come." He denied he ignited the house.

Gehrig's Inferiority Complex Is Babe Ruth's Home Run Advantage

By DAVIS J. WALSH
New York, April 24.—Mr. B. Ruth undoubtedly will take himself off into the shadows before many years are done but the case is too disparate for mere homeopathic like that. They should call in Dr. Freud, meantime, to see what can be done for Henry Louis Gehrig, who is Mr. Ruth's chief assistant in the matter of hitting baseballs off the premises—and unfortunately is all too acutely aware of his status. Henry Louis is suffering today from an inferiority complex as malignant as any known to Freudian experience.

He hits the baseball almost as far and as often as does Mr. Ruth but Henry Louis simply can't accept the evidence furnished by his own ability and, to him, Mr. Ruth is a man apart and obviously one who is not to be approached except in a spirit of quasi-humility. They are great friends but Ruth dominates and Gehrig expects to be dominated; in fact, asks for it. Perhaps that is the abiding reason why they are great friends.

Rises To Fame
It may be remembered that Gehrig first knew fame in 1927 when he dared to challenge Ruth's right to call himself the Home Run King. For weeks and then months, they see-sawed in the lead until each whereupon, Gehrig suddenly stopped hitting them—for no apparent reason—and Ruth continued on to a new record—for every reason in the world.

I don't say that Gehrig suddenly felt that he was treading hallowed ground. I don't say it because I can't and still be sure of my facts. All I know is that Babe Ruth has slightly less of an inferiority complex than the average song plugger.

One hardly can say as much for Gehrig. There is, for example, the procedure that is followed when they go barnstorming under the auspices of Christy Walsh during their off season. On these trips, when they retire for the night in their Pullman drawing room, this is the amicable arrangement that is preserved throughout:
Ruth—lower berth.
Walsh—upper berth.
Gehrig—side seat.

Ruth Gives Reason
It is Ruth's contention that he fears he will fall out of the upper or off the seat. Walsh often gives him an argument just for the sake of exercising his self-assertion. Gehrig accepts the situation placidly. In fact, he expects to sleep on the seat and probably would be uncomfortable if he found himself in the lower at Ruth's expense. This is Exhibit A.

Exhibit B comes the following morning when Gehrig and Walsh arise at a seemingly hour and Ruth sleeps until he gets enough. There is no horseplay for Gehrig fears to disturb the great man's slumbers. Instead, he whispers, he tips-toes about. Then comes the question of breakfast. Walsh suggests going forward to the diner. Gehrig is horrified.

Yes, it's always the Big Fellow with Gehrig. And, patiently, he waits for the Big Fellow morning after morning, unable, or at least unwilling, to take even a most casual step without first learning the other's desires.

Their Training
One of these men is the product of an orphan asylum; the other was turned out by what is known as a hall of learning, with all of its advantages, implied and otherwise. But, of course, the stronger personality has won. Youth has nothing to do with it. In fact, it has never been established that undue modesty is a characteristic of youth in general. The case simply is a product of the old game of life, known as "follow the leader," and all too few of us are immune.

What, then, is to be the outcome when Ruth, the older man, takes himself off, leaving the field to the other? Is Ruth, the inspiration in every other respect, the trail blazer for Gehrig's hitting, too? Or, unfettered at last, will Gehrig go forward to greater things than ever possible under the old order?

These are interesting questions. The answers should be even more so.

TRADING-STAMP PLAN BACK IN CAMOUFLAGE

Now It Takes Form of "Auction" of Premiums With Toy Money. The Manchester Chamber of Commerce has been inquiring into the identity and purposes of a visitor who has been conducting a "survey of business conditions" in town and has learned that he is the representative of a Springfield, Ill., concern which is operating a scheme that bears all the earmarks of being a highly camouflaged first-cousin of the ancient trading stamp institution. The plan is to line up one retail concern in each major line of merchandise and supply the subscribers with a lot of "stage" money. Each purchaser of goods in the stores receives an amount of this toy script equal in ostensible value to the amount of real money he spends. At intervals "auctions" of premium goods are held in theaters and such places, at which the toy money is received in payment for the goods. The Chamber's investigations have elicited the fact that the concern promoting this enterprise is financially reliable enough, but expresses the opinion that the method of business stimulation involved is commercially artificial and therefore not commercially healthy. So far it could not be learned that any Manchester merchants had signed up.

WEALTHY CANADIANS BURNED IN AIRPLANE

Leaside Airdrome, Toronto, Ont., April 24.—One of the worst tragedies in Canadian aviation history was on record today with the deaths of William Mackenzie and Noel Marshall, wealthy Toronto flying enthusiasts, who were burned to death in a crash at the air field here. The men were flying a Moth plane directly over the airdrome last night when the plane swerved suddenly at a height of 150 feet and hurtled earthward. The gas tank exploded with a roar. The plane was immediately enveloped in flames. When the fire was extinguished, the charred bodies of Mackenzie and Marshall were taken from the cockpit where the flames had cut off their escape. Mackenzie was a grandson of the late Sir William Mackenzie, Canadian railroad builder and pioneer. Marshall was a grandson of the late Col. Noel Marshall, president of the Standard Fuel Co., of Toronto.

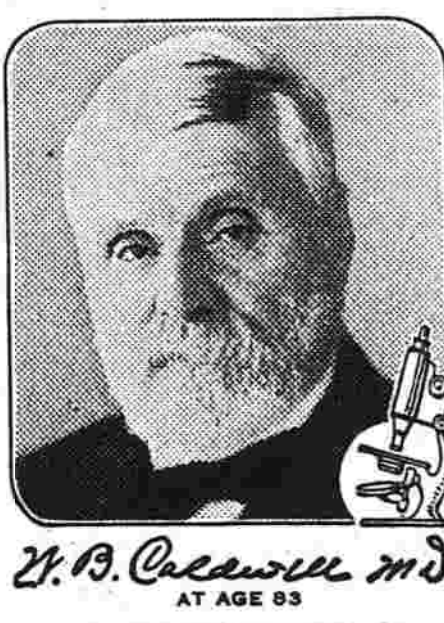

SPANISH-AMERICAN WAR.

Thirty-one years ago today Spain declared war on the United States in answer to resolutions adopted by Congress, recognizing the independence of the Cuban republic.

These resolutions adopted on April 19, 1898, the anniversary of the battle of Lexington, the start of the Revolutionary War, and of the first bloodshed of the Civil War on the streets of Baltimore, were in effect declarations of war on Spain.

As soon as they had been approved by the president, April 20, the Spanish minister asked for his passports, thus severing diplomatic relations. The following day, the American minister to Spain left Madrid.

On April 24 came Spain's formal declaration of war to create an enthusiastic patriotic sentiment in America. War had been expected since the sinking of the Battleship Maine in Havana harbor in the middle of February. A tragedy in which 260 members of the crew lost their lives.

This crisis was always regarded as the start of difficulties with Spain and gave rise to the cry: "Remember the Maine!"

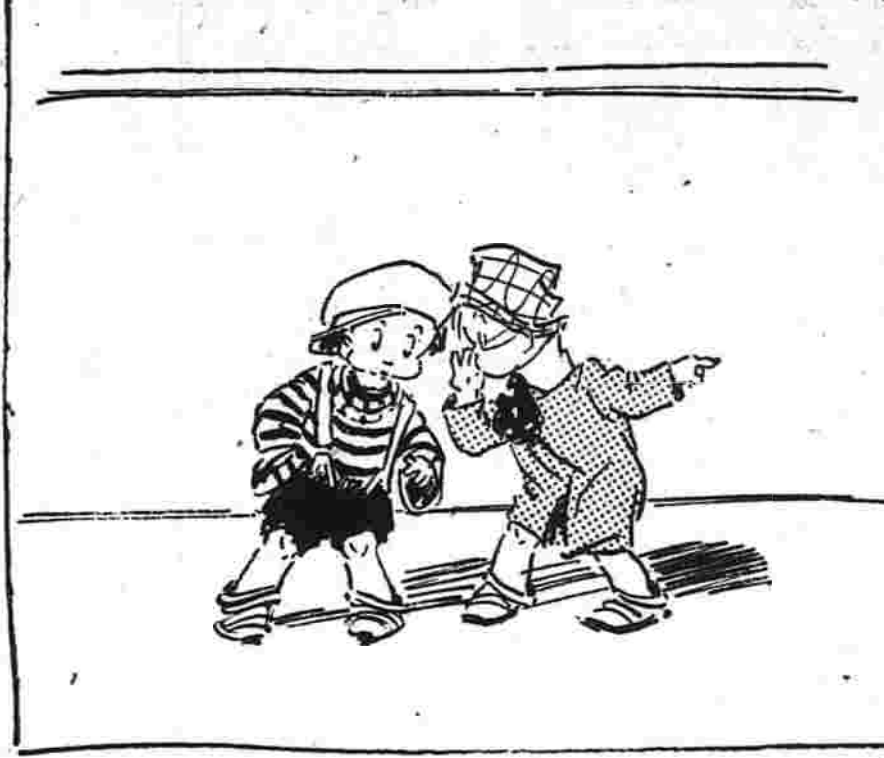

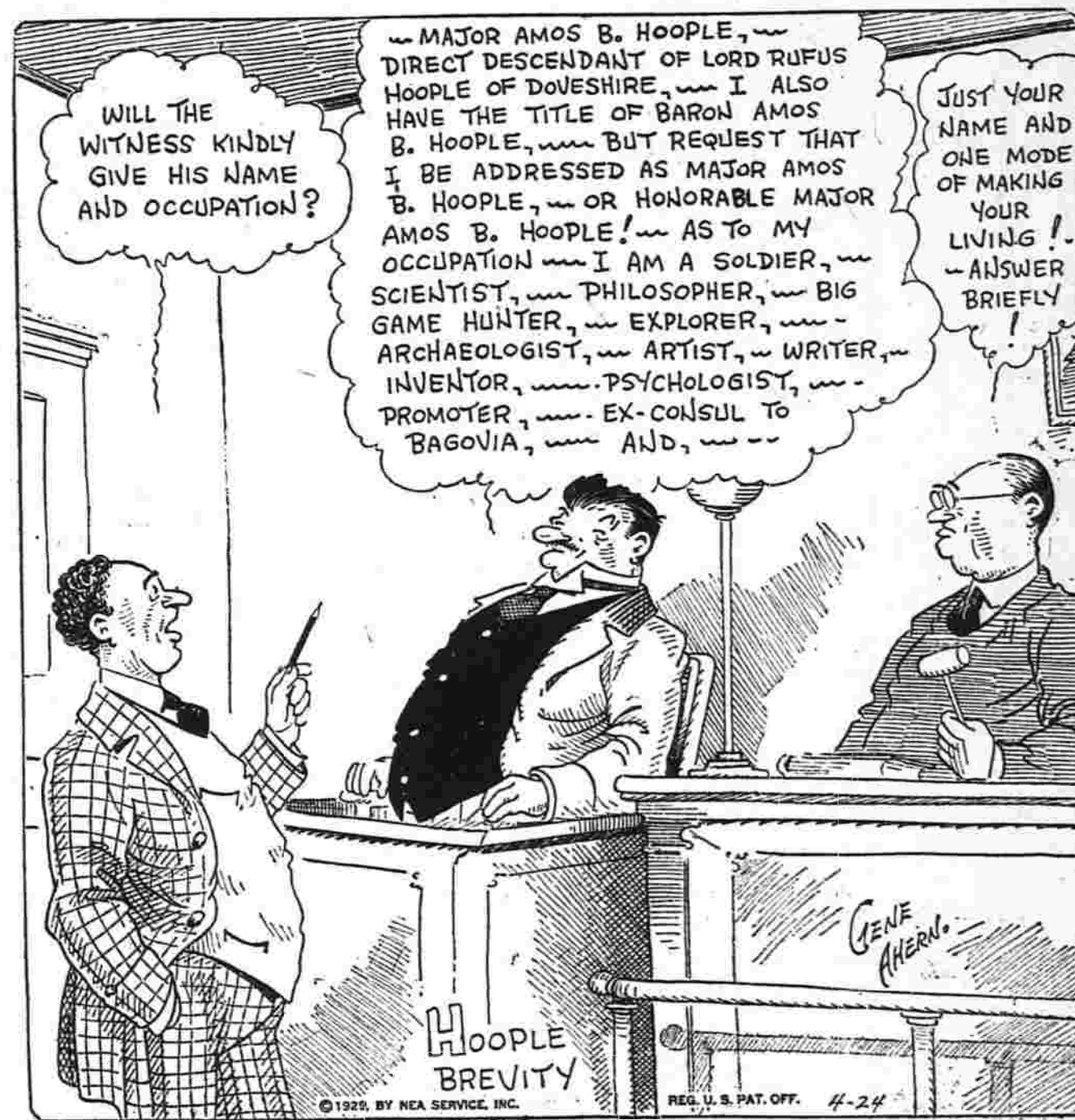

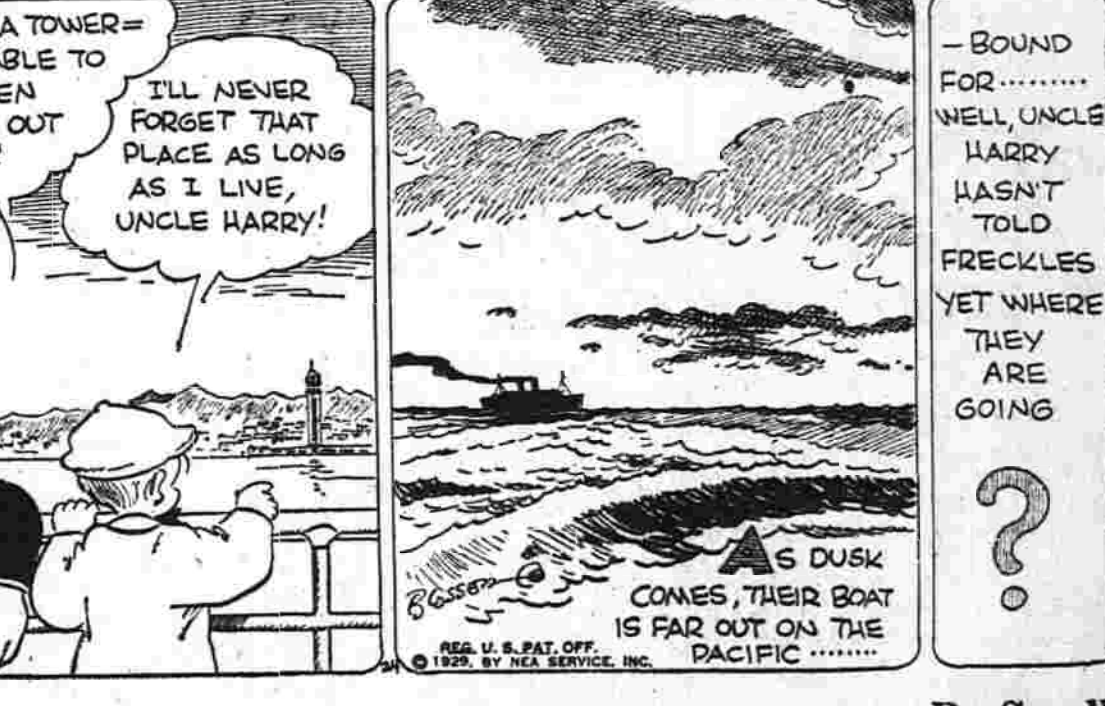
