









**HINTS TO HOUSEWIFE**

**ABOUT LINEN CLOSET**

To the fastidious housekeeper a well-ordered linen closet is to be viewed with as much pride as her

garment closet. If room and space permit, it is a far more convenient way of keeping one's linen than in any closet or drawer. The ideal closet should have at the bottom two deep, cedar lined drawers for blankets and quilts. Lacking those, one may slip in a small cedar lined chest, which will serve the same purpose. Above the drawers or chest

should be shelves which will hold the various piles of household linen, placed according to their use. Here also is an ideal spot to indulge one's decorative whims and fancies, providing, of course, they are consistent with the practical, for color and the little accessories will enhance the charm of the neat piles of linen. Quilted pads of flowered ma-

terial or sprigged calicoes may cover the shelves and are easily made at home. Matching covers and holders which fold around the piles of clean linen may be made in various sizes for the general linen. Broad, flat boxes, which come in nests of three, are ideal for keeping one's treasured pieces from dust and general soil.

FRIDAY, MAY 8, 1929

Road conditions and detours in the State of Connecticut made necessary by highway construction, repairs and oiling announced by the State Highway Department, as of May 1st are as follows:

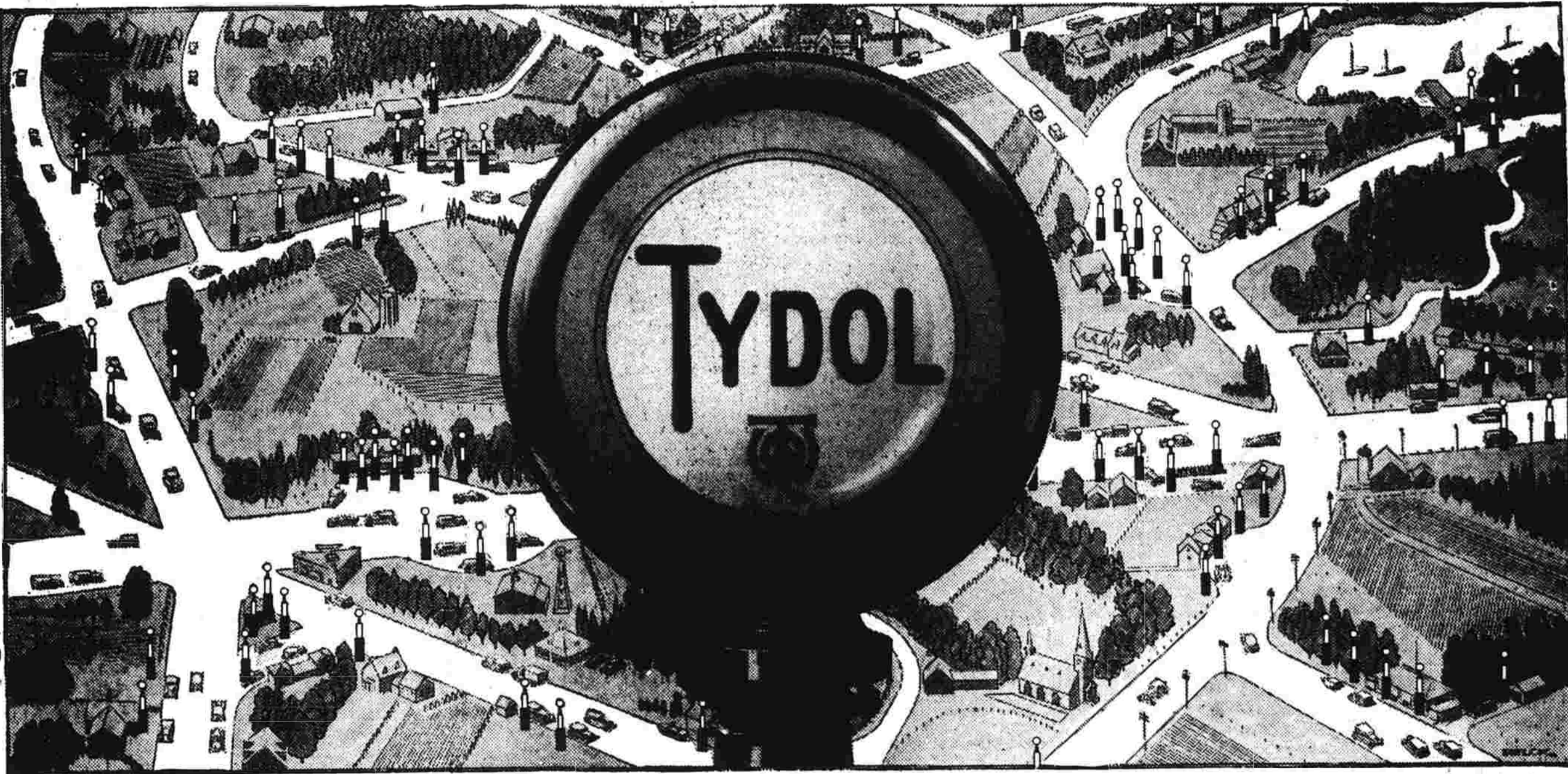

### MENUS For Good Health

A Week's Supply Recommended By Dr. Frank B. McCoy

Dr. McCoy's menus suggested for the week beginning Sunday, May 5: **Sunday.** Breakfast—8 ounce glass of orange juice thirty minutes before breakfast, codded eggs, melba toast. Lunch—Potato on the half shell, string beans, salad of lettuce with olive oil. Dinner—Jellied tomato bullion served in cubes, roast pork, spinach, cooked celery, salad of cold cooked asparagus (canned), baked apple.

**Monday.** Breakfast—Cottage cheese, pineapple (fresh or canned), melba toast. Lunch—Buttered beets, squash, salad of chopped raw cabbage. Dinner—Vegetable soup, broiled steak, cooked beet tops, egg plant, salad of stuffed beets, cup custard.

**Tuesday.** Breakfast—French omelet, small piece of broiled ham, melba toast, applesauce. Lunch—1 pint of buttermilk with 10 or 12 dates. Dinner—Roast mutton, baked small turnips and carrots grated together without removing the peel, green peas, salad of shredded lettuce, apricot whip.

**Wednesday.** Breakfast—Waffles, codded eggs, stewed prunes. Lunch—Stewed corn, cooked lettuce, ripe olives. Dinner—Baked chicken, string beans, salad of grated raw carrots, Jello or Jell-well with cream.

**Thursday.** Breakfast—Poached egg on toasted Shredded Wheat biscuit, pear sauce. Lunch—Glass of grape juice. Dinner—Vegetable soup, Salsed lettuce, salad of raw tender spinach leaves, pineapple sponge.

**Friday.** Breakfast—Wholewheat muffins, peanut butter, stewed prunes. Lunch—Generous dish of junket and 1 or 2 apples. Dinner—Tomato and celery broth, baked white fish, cooked turnips with tops, molded salad of peas and chopped celery, raspberry whip (without cream).

**Saturday.** Breakfast—Baked eggs, melba toast, stewed figs. Lunch—Cornbread, spinach, raw celery. Dinner—Broiled lamb chops, asparagus, baked ground beets of shredded lettuce, peanut butter dressing, carrot pudding.

\*Stuffed beet salad: Select beets of uniform size, scrub with a vegetable brush, and boil tender. Remove from the fire and place in cold water, then the skin will slip off very easily. Cut a slice from the stem of each beet (to make the beet flat) and scoop out a portion from the center with a sharp knife. Fill with finely chopped celery, cucumber and tomatoes and put in

the icebox for an hour or two before serving one or two of the beets on crisp lettuce. Do not discard the scooped out portion, but use on the following day by cutting into small pieces, reheating, and serving with butter.

#### QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS.

**Tuberculosis.** Question: Mrs. S. S. writes: "For the last three years my husband has been in the hospital suffering from tuberculosis. My little boy was born three weeks before my husband went to the hospital. That was my first knowledge that he had tuberculosis. Now, what chance has my boy? Will he inherit the disease, or how can I care for him so that he will be saved from it?" Answer: The tendency toward tuberculosis may be inherited, but it is not considered that the disease, itself, can be transmitted in this manner except in very rare cases. If your little boy is fed upon a well

balanced diet, allowed plenty of sleep, and perhaps given sunbaths, there is not much danger of his contracting this disease. I believe that it is quite easy for one to avoid contracting this disease by the proper hygienic measures.

**Salisbury Steak.** Question: Mrs. J. C. writes: "I missed your article stating what Salisbury steak was and why it was superior to hamburger, etc. How is it prepared? I am learning much from your column each day." Answer: Salisbury steak is made by grinding only the red, lean part of round steak after having removed all gristle and fat. This may seem similar to hamburger steak, but it is really more palatable and more easy to digest; it has an entirely different flavor than when the fat is included. Allow three-quarters of a pound for each person served when purchasing the steak. After grinding the meat,

press flat into an ungreased cake tin to a depth of about one inch, and place in a hot oven for about five minutes after which time turn down the fire. A tasty addition is made by grinding parsley or spinach with the meat. Do not season until ready to serve, then use only a small amount of salt.

**ROYAL BRICKLAYER** London—The Duke of Connaught, uncle of the king, is a recognized union bricklayer. He joined the International Bricklayers' Union and was initiated on May 6, 1924, at St. Thomas, Ontario. The day he laid the cornerstone of the Y. M. C.-A. building there.

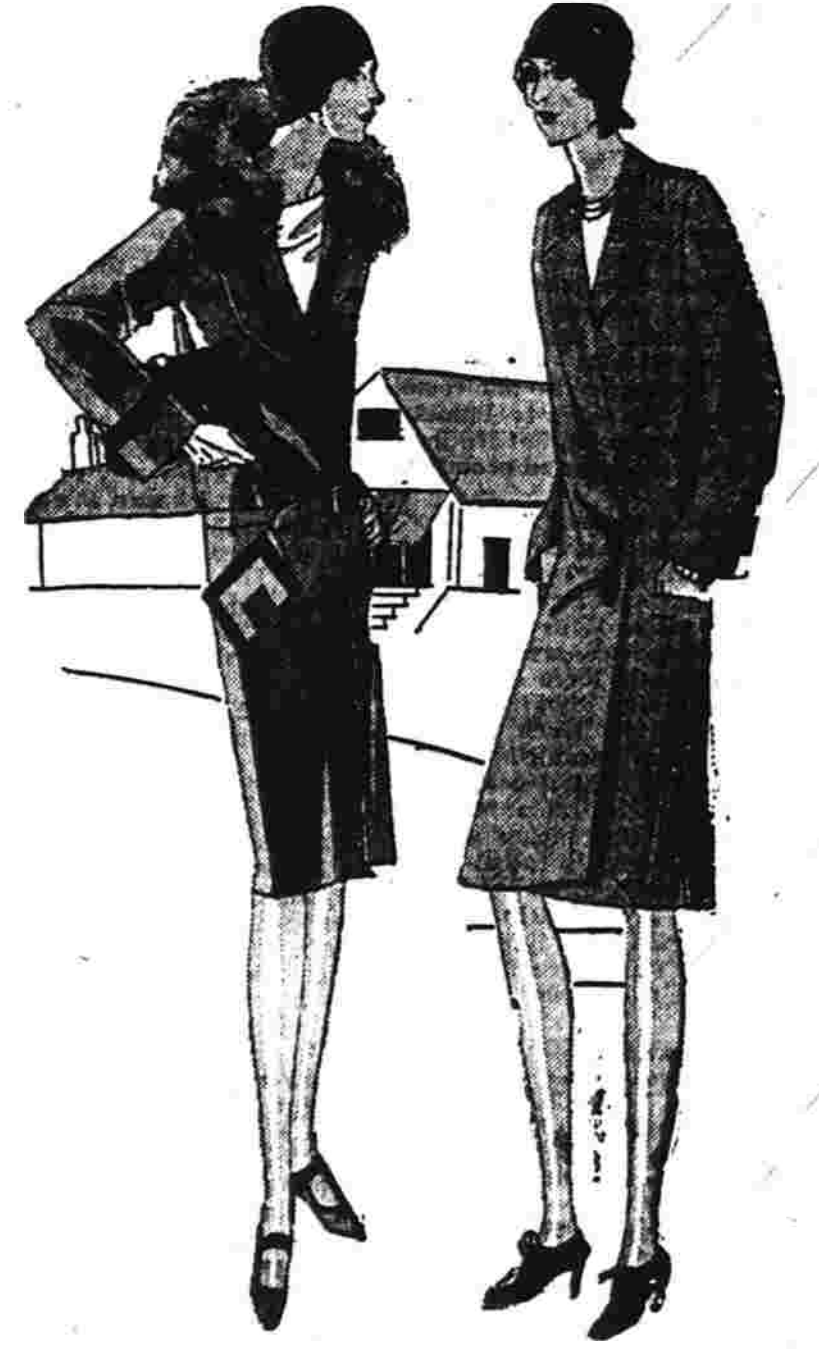

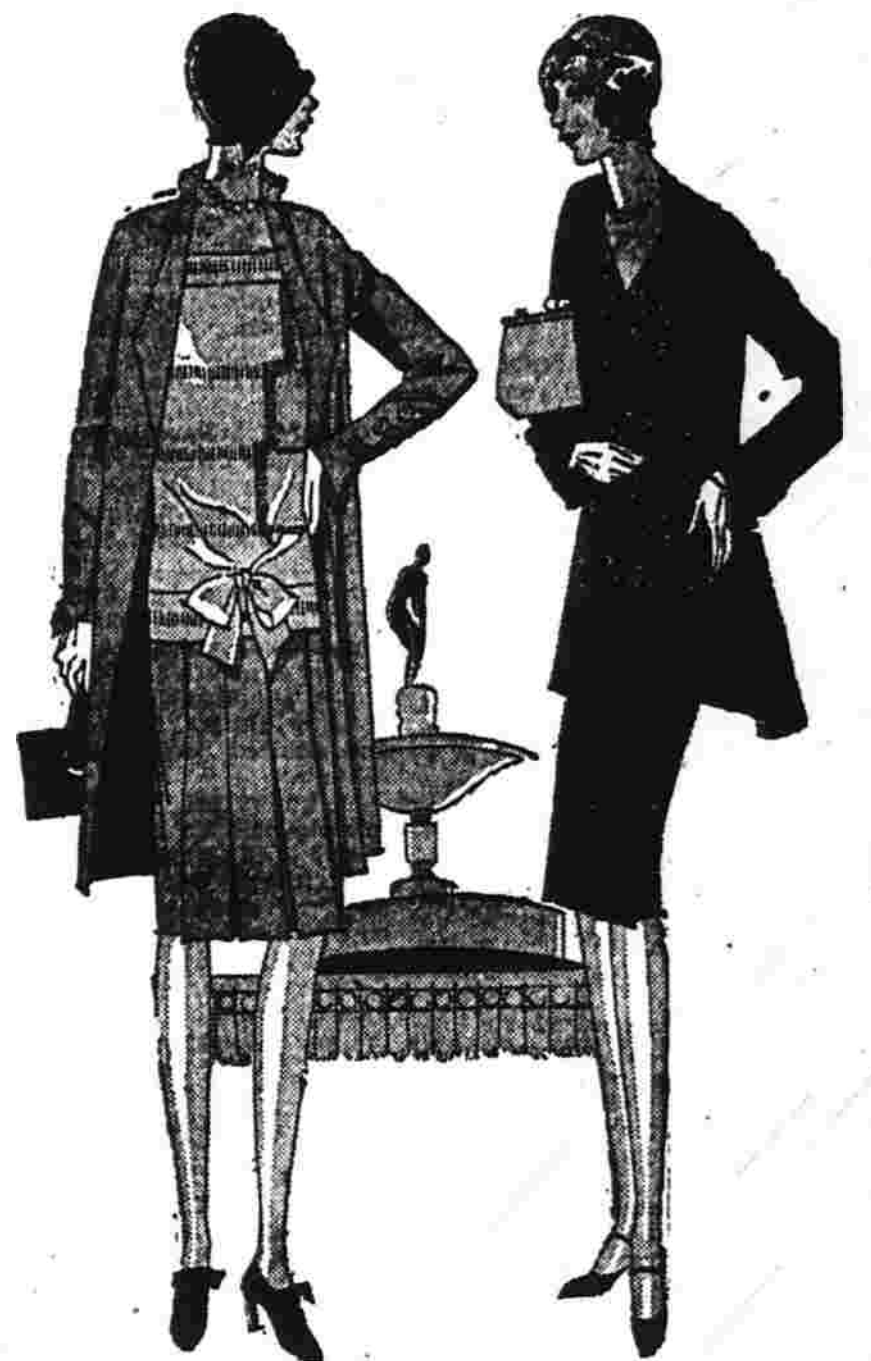

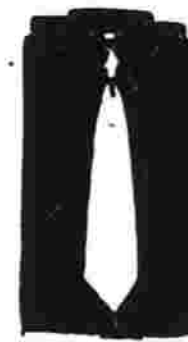

## \$750,000 YACHT FOR BRITISH SPORTSMAN

London, May 3.—A Diesel yacht costing \$750,000 is being built for Sir Richard Cooper, famous British yachtsman, to the design of Cox and Stevens, naval architects, of New York.

The boat will be built at the Walland-on-Tyne yard of Swan, Hunter and Wigham Richardson. The new vessel is to be of steel construction with an overall length of 145 feet, beam of 27 feet, and draught of 10 feet 6 inches. She will be driven by a pair of 350 h. p. Sulzer Diesel engines, and will have a complete equipment of auxiliary motors.

Heated with hot water, lighted by electricity, furnished with the most modern kind of plumbing with an American pressure system, the boat is designed for long cruises. In appearance she follows the lines which have come back into American yachts after a post-war period of straight lines and plumb stems.

## Britain To Try Breaking World Plane Records

London, May 3.—Determined efforts by Great Britain to capture the world's airplane records for speed, duration, distance non-stop and altitude are to be made this summer.

Plans are under way for the construction of a number of new machines for the record attempt. Racing aeroplanes designed to fly at a speed of six miles a minute are being built in greatest secrecy for the international aeroplane race for the Schneider Cup off the Isle of Wight early in September, and there is great activity in all other fields of flying.

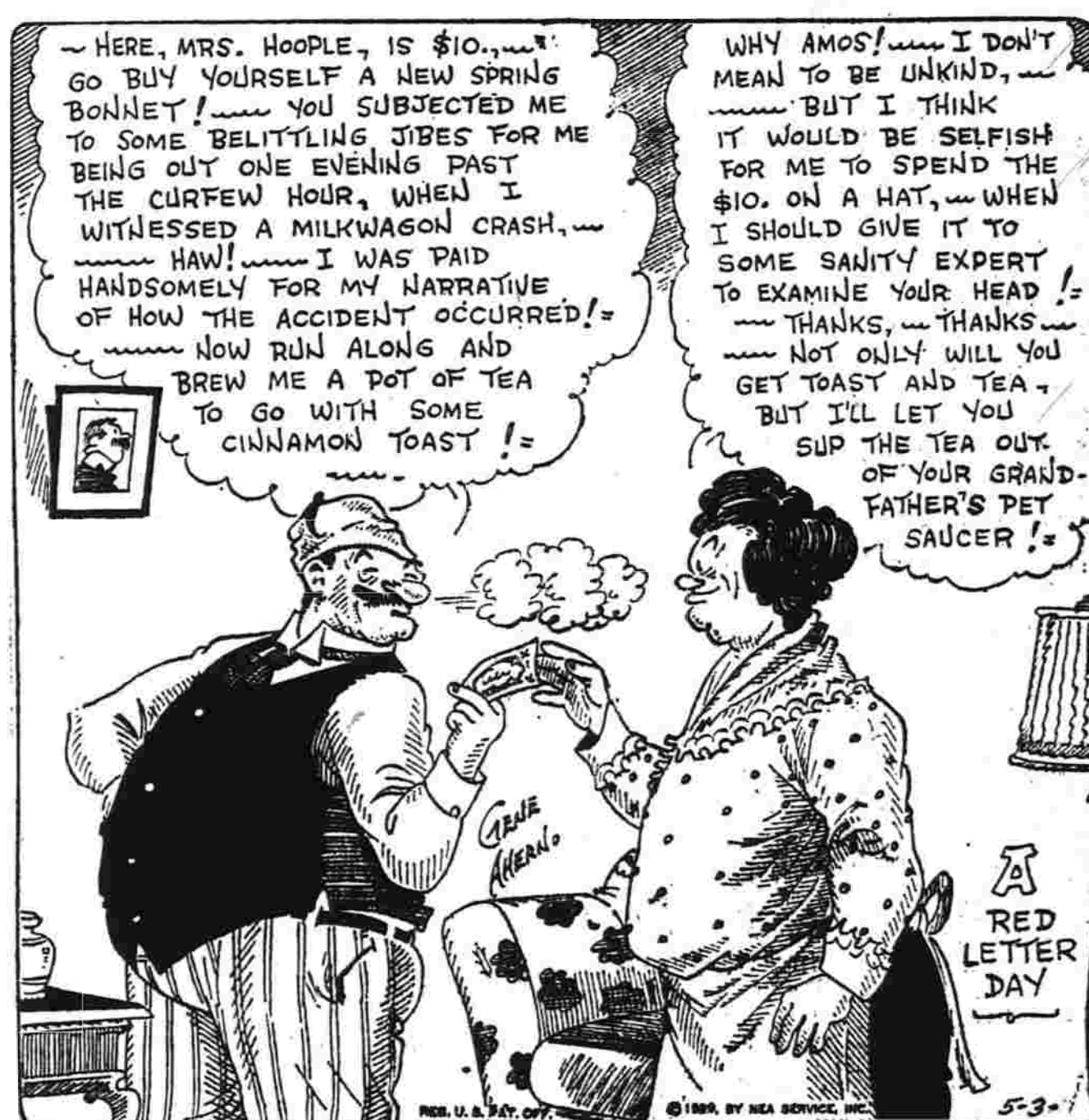

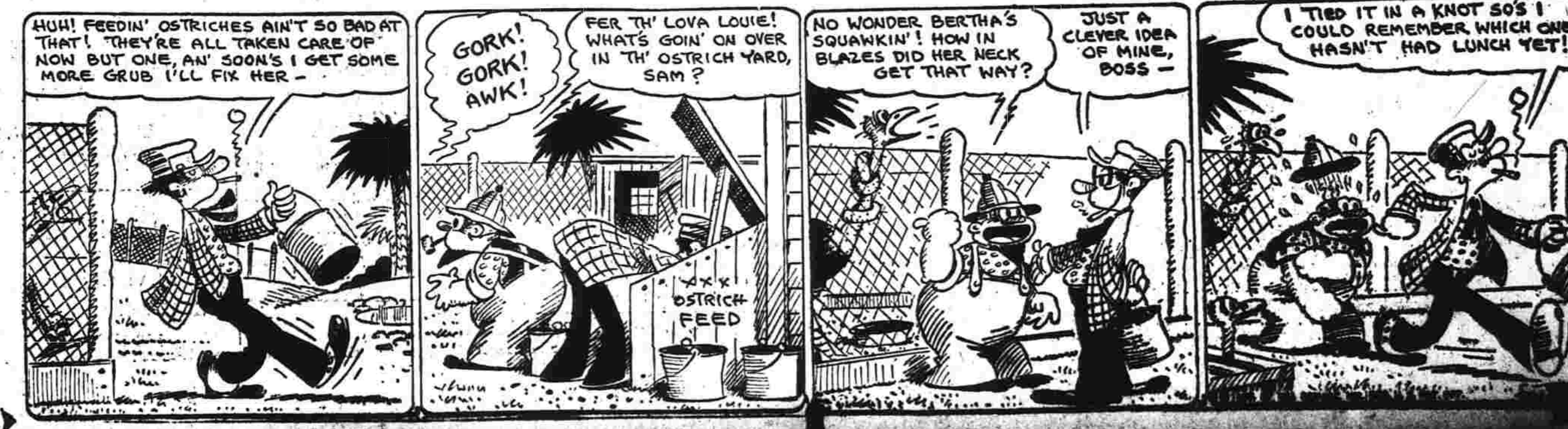

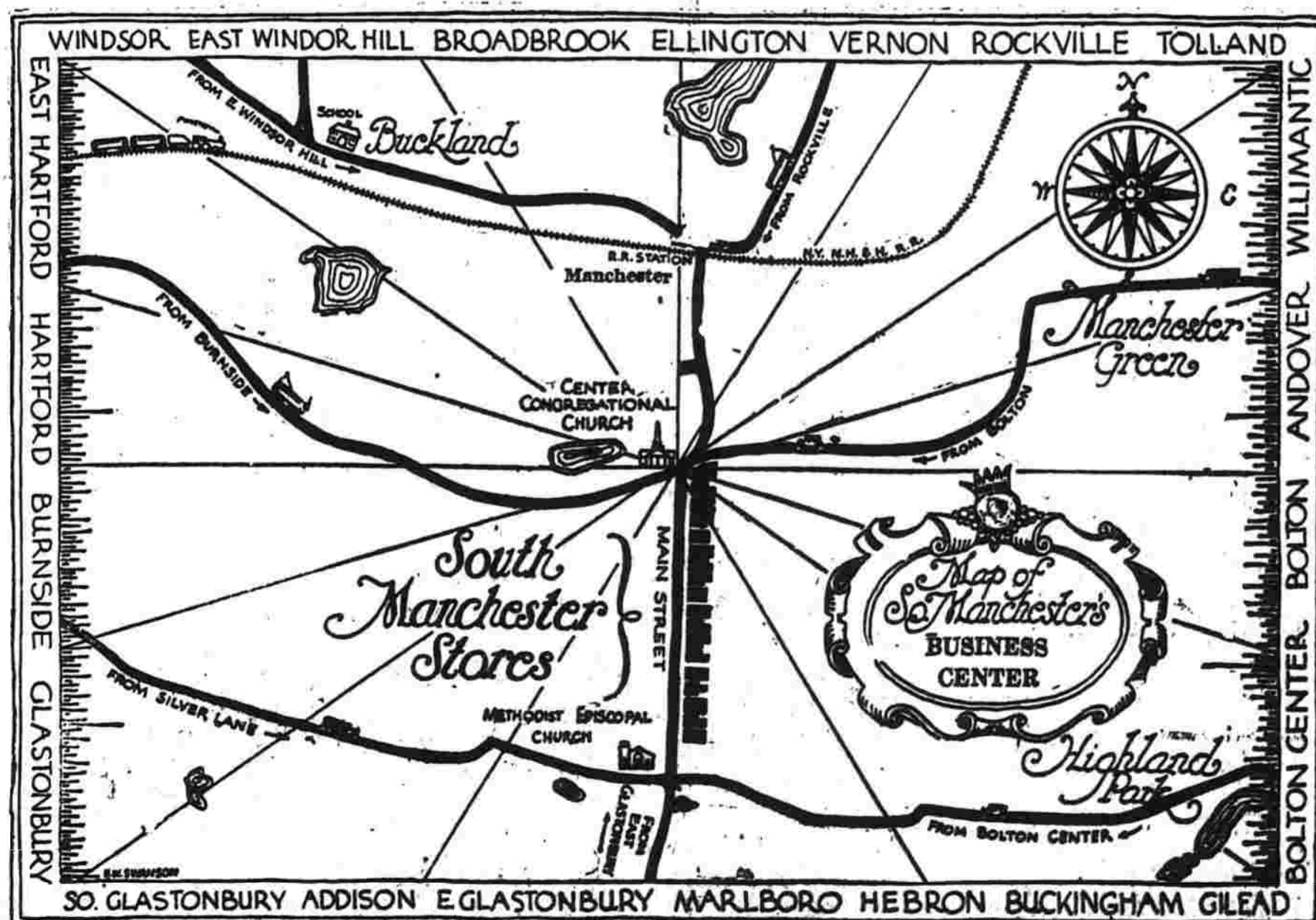

**TAILORED COSTUME DEMANDS GOOD CUT**

**Lines Important With Type of Fabric Close Second in Necessary Factors.**

While tweeds and jerseys, generally thought of as only correct for country wear, now are constructed into suits to be worn in town, strictly tailored suits are making a strong bid for feminine favor. For the first time in many a dreary season women's tailors are encouraged to believe that the former popularity of the severe coat and skirt may be revived. The real artist knows that line and cut are of first importance to the success of a tailor. The fabric, however, from which a suit is built plays a very close second. This, too, is a matter of sartorial knowledge.

The beauty of the tweeds and jerseys from the British Isles in a large measure is responsible for this suit revival. England, Ireland and Scotland each send out such wonderful weaves. France, appreciating the value to fashion of these wool materials, now has looms speeding jersey and tweed production. That country is furnishing two new materials for women's clothing. The tweed is a novelty in a rough surface cloth. The jersey is produced in a dual capacity. It is made both plain and figured, the latter being herringbone, shell and zig-zag in design.

Tailored suits are the correct thing for shopping or for practical purposes. The well-dressed woman dons a suit fashioned from tweed or jersey for the occasion of the morning lecture or club meeting. O'Rossen of Paris has set his stamp upon this utilitarian type of feminine clothing. While a single tone and a single fabric form the majority of the suits seen, a bid is made for contrasts. Here a skirt may be of one material and the coat of another. Tweed or jersey compose the skirt in these instances, broadcloth being used for the coat. O'Rossen is the authority for the single-breasted coat. This he cuts on severely straight lines. It is short in length and has hip pockets, these being completed with a flap.

He also is responsible for a good-looking double-breasted coat. The wearer of this style of jacket must be slender of body if she is hoping to carry this cut successfully. Both the single and double-breasted coats are fashioned with side and center back seams and have side front darts, thus giving the slightly curved figure that O'Rossen affects. Whether his coats are single or double-breasted they have revers and tailored collars.

In the skirts to suits a wider range of choice is permitted. While the straight narrow ones still hold sway many pleated skirts are displayed. In walking these permit greater freedom. Pleats are shown

in single, double and triple form. The width of the pleat is a matter of personal choice. Again for slenderness one must be watchful not to have bulk, though the tweeds and jerseys of today are composed of such soft and yielding material that these pleats are easily pressed to the appearance of a single laid fold. Whether pleats are boxed, grouped or single, usually the center front and the back of the skirt has an inverted one.

The jerseys and tweeds of today come in a wide variety of colors. Neutral beige and wood browns are prime favorites, and light gray will be seen when the warmer days come on. Navy blue

in the jersey has the advantage of being becoming to both fair and dark complexions. This tone of blue never loses its place as a favorite.

## Tucks The Signboards Of Summer Fashions

Nimble fingers are vying with the whirr of sewing machines in tucking fabrics to trim spring and summer clothes while scissors have been busy cutting and snipping silks, woolsens and chiffons into bits to be pieced together into beautiful dresses.

This reminds me of the work of the Seminole Indian women who, poised and solemn, sit in their palm-leafed huts on the Florida reservation, tearing asunder bright colored strips of cotton. Then they earnestly patch them together again on their tiny sewing machines. Their colorful costumes, thus constructed, represent in the dress of a primitive civilization with that of the ultra modern of today.

Woman's simple untrifled dress has passed. Now elaborate workmanship is essential.

All sorts of artistic designs are formed on suits, wraps and dresses by means of tucking. There are flowers, leaves, fans and seaweed, indeed almost any design of which the fancy of dressmakers conceive. Tuckings and appliques in points and slanted effect are perhaps the outstanding.

Stitched cut-out sections on the skirts or suits may represent fan effects. These are pointed up or pointed down. A sunburst design may frame circular gores on skirts or spring away from a pleated hem. Lightweight wool crepe frocks, which are so important in this season's wardrobe, have their straight bodices ornamented with stitched sections. Other wool gowns are entirely pleated at their skirt part, some under a hip yoke curved up in front. Others are covered at the waist and over the hips with horizontal stitched straps that hold the pleats in under a detached bodice. One dress has a skirt pleated in two sizes of box pleats. It is attached to a simple top trimmed above the waist with a cut-out Greek key design.

Channel does two of her smartest evening gowns in the new jersey fabric which is really merely a fine silk jersey net. These she covers with tucking. One frock is brilliant scarlet in hue, the other is of a royal blue. The red dress has a tucked band around the neckline. This extends in a slender flaring scarf that falls to the hips. Another tucked scarf starts at the hipline to float away in a long train. The blue gown has a bodice covered with tucks. It, too, depends on a flaring scarf for its train.

Plain chiffon gowns have elaborate insertions of tucking in geometrical patterns. Even in the early summer frocks for daytime wear in the country this idea is carried out.

A feature of special interest in many printed crepe gowns is that the flowers with which they are figured are cut out and assembled to form floral borders at the neck and sleeve openings, the hem and the cuffs.

Garden or country dresses of crepe de chine or chiffon printed with multicolor dots or with bright diagonal lines are sleeveless and have petal patterns at their armholes and skirt hems. More elaborate printed chiffons are trimmed, like printed crepe gowns, with borders of the cut-out floral design. With these are worn hosiery scarves of chiffon petals, a flattering and feminine fashion and one likely to appeal to the older woman. Flowers that lend themselves well to such trimming are carnations, cornflowers or daisies.

A black satin gown with a decol-

letage cut to points and held by narrow straps across its bodice has stitched bands curved down in front and at the center back, where they are interlaced above a flared back-draping skirt with a broad tucked hem.

The once despised selva edge of cloth now plays a big part in trimming. It is used as unlined coats. Narrow selva bindings edge many a coat. One of mixed gray cloth has a lighter gray and back selva binding around its straight collar, down its front opening and across the pockets. The same thought is carried out at the bottom of the skirt.

Bands of tucked or pleated cloth also are used to border coat collars and skirt hems. The hems of garments have got into the limelight of fashion. If it happens to be the hem of a suit or coat, it tucks. If it is an elaborate gown it may be laden with a flower garland or a faring ruche.

Horizontal tucks are found across the hem on pastel colored coats that are constructed of a series of vertical tucks down to the hem. Some coats, like one in poppy red rough wool, have regulation collar and revers. Down the bodice part of their fronts are stitched panel designs framing hip pockets and extending across the back in a mitered fashion. A smart looking one occasionally this sort of coat is worn over a crepe de chine dress of the same tone, printed with white designs. In one instance a printed two-tiered crepe dress with circular skirt frills and a scarf collar is shown with a blue cloth coat colored in ermine. An unusual trimming on the back consists of festoons of stitched bands.

Dressy coats for the early summer season are of silk. The somberness of the black, which usually is the outer fabric, is relieved by a brilliant colored lining of printed silk. This may be gayly flowered. Coats such as these usually are of three-quarters or seven-eighths length. Collars may be of very fluffy lightweight fur. A smart looking one is colored in fox. If a flatter fur is preferred it may be ermine or shaved lamb. If one does not wish a fur collar the collar may be a scarf of printed silk like the lining of the coat.

A few tailored suits have three-quarter length coats. Others have straight fingertip-length jackets with a scarf or a straight tailored collar. Some of them are vertically striped with tucks down either side of the front, others at the under arms and across the back, with similar tucks down the skirt.

Belted coat dresses are much worn this spring. Some of them open from the waist to the skirt hem. Appliqued bands trim them across the waist. White pique collar and turned back cuffs are the concluding touch. One model has a starched white lawn collar and cuffs.

Dotting and spotting is favored in fabrics this season. A green silk crepe is showered with gold coin dots. Chanel has chosen it for one of her best models. She cuts the neck of this dress round in the front and surplice in the back, making the back the central point of decoration by a garland of flowers outlining the opening. To repeat the floral idea on the skirt she uses long petal shaped panels.

## FIND NEW PROFIT IN STRAW STACKS

Good Insulating Material Now Being Produced as By-Product of Wheat.

In the past, when the farmer was celebrating a prosperous wheat year by burning his straw stacks, he didn't know he was burning money as prodigally as the oldtime sport who lighted his stogy with dollar bills.

In future years the farmer who burns his straw stack probably will

be hailed before a sanly court.

Wheat straw fast is becoming a part of the marketable farm crop. It is proving its worth as the raw material from which insulating boards are made. Insulation of homes, factories, chicken houses, dairy barns, milk houses and other farm buildings means a saving of more than 25 per cent on the heating costs for the home, more eggs in winter, more milk with the same amount of feed and earlier pigs.

Thus, the discovery of a use for wheat straw has a double meaning to the farmer. It means, on the one hand, an additional cost return for each acre of his wheat crop, and, on the other, a method of reducing heating costs in his home and of sheltering his stock from cold or hot weather, thus increasing productivity.

Straw Shed Makes Good Shelter

Farmers as they burned their straw never realized, perhaps, that it contained the long, strong fibers, the material from which insulation is made. True, every stockman always has known that straw was warm. Throughout the great wheat

plains the straw shed, as a shelter for stock, is a familiar sight.

But it took a scientist with a commercial instinct to devise a means of separating the straw fibers and then of matting and interlacing them into boards half an inch thick and of any length or width, and those boards have amazing structural strength and are highly efficient as a barrier to cold and heat.

The industry is young, but indicative of the future for the farmer, a future, the vistas of which are becoming tinted more with the rose of hope than with the red of despair.

The first mill for the transforming of wheat straw into insulating material was placed in operation in St. Joseph, Mo., last March. During the past threshing season the company which operates the mill purchased 30,000 tons of straw. Every twenty-four hours this mill produces 125,000 square feet of board.

The straw is fed first into cutters, then into rotary digesters, where it is cooked. From the digesters belt conveyors carry it into the shredders through special refiners and

then to the forming machines, from which it emerges as board.

From the forming machines the board rolls into superheated dryers more than 1,000 feet long, which complete the process. At the end of the journey knives cut and trim the boards and workmen stack it like lumber. It later is wrapped into bundles for shipment.

Affords New Market to Farmer

In the transformation wheat straw has become worth \$4 or more a ton to the farmer who produced it, and heating engineers know it will mean a saving of from 25 to 40 per cent in fuel when applied to dwelling or office building.

Thus science and business have pointed the way toward practical farm relief. Eliminate farm waste. Imagine the increased farm wealth in the wheat belt when expansion of the wheat straw board industry makes it possible to utilize the hitherto worthless straw. In Kansas alone, where the average production of wheat straw is a ton to the acre, the new farm income would amount into many million dollars.

Such expansion is bound to come.

The market for insulating material is just beginning to develop, the process is perfected, the raw material is abundant. What is to stop it? Consider the farm market for insulating board, which is only a small part of the field. In winter the hen and the cow must use too much of the food they consume for body warmth, thus reducing the egg and milk production.

Insulation Boosts Egg Production

In November, December, January and February, it has been demonstrated, the average hen, subjected to adverse weather conditions, will produce only five eggs a month. A tightly built henhouse, insulated and ventilated, it has been shown, will increase that production to fifteen eggs a month during the cold months when eggs are highest in price. Two hundred hens, at five eggs each a month, will produce, during the four cold months, 333 dozen eggs, which at 50 cents a dozen will add \$167 to the winter income. But experiments show that if those same 200 hens are given the advantage of a warm shelter the average production will be fifteen eggs each a month, which in the four cold months means 1,000 dozen eggs, at 50 cents a dozen, or \$500. That is a gain of \$333 income, all other conditions being equal.

Therefore, it would appear, the wheat straw insulation industry not only would provide additional farm income through the marketing of wasted straw but also would increase the productivity of farm animals through the use of the finished product.

Other industries long ago learned the lesson of utilization of by-products. Is it not fitting the farmer should profit by the experience of others? Such a program would mean, in my opinion, the realization of farm prosperity.

**NEW FEMININITY ENTERS THE LINGERIE FASHIONS**

**Ensemble Idea Adapted to Undergarment Modes—Colors Important Factor.**

Lingerie represents today the most outstanding features in the new period of femininity that fashions are now entering. The new corset lines all show the uplift motif and define the bust-line. These garments also use a great deal of lace and tiny ruffled trimmings, but they do not express the depth of soul satisfaction and feminine pleasure that is to be seen in undergarments today.

Another idea that the makers of lingerie have capitalized upon for this spring is that of ensemble. After seeing what this branch of the industry can do, it appears that the outer apparel people have missed several good leads for lingerie. A bridal set is being shown by one of the local manufacturers consisting of step-in, pajamas, gown chemise, slip and dancing set. The entire outfit is made of flat crepe in ivory, with elaborate lace trimming and flat appliques of orange blossoms.

But not all the style is confined merely to bridal sets. There is a peach-beige outfit that has the gown with matching cocktail coat; the step-in, pajama and dancing set. The fineness of the Georgette and the daintiness of the Alencon lace makes this a number to grace any wardrobe.

While all this style and attention are producing new business for local undergarment firms the smartness of underdressing has need of a great deal of promotion. Too many women are prone to feel that "unless it shows, any old thing will do!" Not this year. The fashion requirements are every bit as severe for the woman who has a severe for a good many years as for the bride-to-be.

This is a thought that merchants have overlooked. More style is needed in the preaching of undergarments. Take a sleeping pajama set of flesh-pink with facing and trimmings of coral flat crepe and combine this with tinted coral glass buttons. That is something to wear to bed! Lounging pajamas are in high color scales and dashingly intense in coloring, offset with solid colors—black, red, orange.

Colors in undergarments are just as important as in hosiery, carpets or frocks. Peach-blow in Georgette forms the basis of some clever ensemble pieces and gives a brilliant color thought. Consider dance sets in peach and black and you have a flash of underwear brilliancy again.

And from every source in this market as well as in reports from abroad the woman who dares to omit an all-black ensemble from her undergarment wardrobe simply cannot be rated among those well groomed for 1929.

Laces and more laces and more laces take on airs of bewitching Spanish femininity and flaunt these in the face of buyers who are looking for the "something new."

From the depths of the past has emerged the new bed-jacket, but its revival is as different as are music and noise. The new bed-jacket is the newest member of the undergarment fashion parade and struts to the name of the Cocktail Coat, concocted of lace and chiffon or lace and georgette and is truly an effective "mixture."

New slips are also on the list of requirements for being well dressed and some of these are made of two straight pieces of material, thus omitting all fullness and being completed with gay ribbon bodice straps and handkerchief lace. There is also the wrapped skirt giving plenty of room for one who strides and at the same time giving the very last word in a shadow skirt.

Venise laces and quantities of ribbon decorate all the garments at one house, resulting in a line that is most modern in its appeal and smartly distinctive in the long slender lines that have been achieved.

In knickers the best of crepes de Chine are being used by one house and the new yoke treatments, the slashed and bound button-holes that are decorative features are as unique as life itself and often quite as surprising. But all knickers are not of silk. One of the best makers in the market is offering a line of thirty-two fancy cotton numbers that are style "humdingers." Coolness, color and comfort are offered at one and the same time.

**GENTIAN SEED PLANTING MAY SAVE SPECIES**

**Woodland Wild Flower Is Found to Be a Biennial and Can Be Propagated.**

"Do not pick the gentians," has been the slogan of the nature lovers for many years, says C. W. Johnson recently in "Wild Flower," but in spite of this the fringed gentian has been fast disappearing, for frost and many thoughtless pickers have prevented the ripening of the seed. Many have tried to grow these flowers and a few have succeeded. It now looks as if a way had been found to bring these lovely flowers

back. The fringed gentian (Gentiana crinita) is not an annual, as many think and as many books say, but a biennial—that is, it blooms the second year and then the plant dies.

Persons who have gathered the seed where the gentians are plentiful and have sown them in moist places have been rewarded with many blossoms two years thereafter, but with fewer plants after an early frost.

The seeds are produced almost by the million, but are so very fine that few find a suitable place to grow. Its seed does not keep well, as it dries out, and should be sown as soon as it is ripe in the fall. Many ways to grow these plants have been tried, but with only partial success. There are still places far from motor roads where the fringed gentians grow in abundance. The root dies after blossoming, and if the flowers are picked they soon close and will not open unless put in the sun.

If the plants are carefully dug up and placed in pots, these pots may be set on a porch or window ledge, and not only will the flowers open for many days, but the buds will grow, and these open also. If the plant is brought into the house on frosty nights they are sure to grow seed enough to sow a large piece of ground, and in two years you may reap your reward.

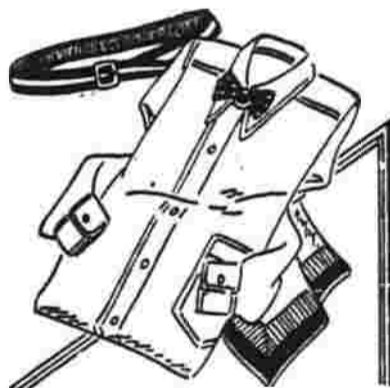

**Broken Lines, Varied Colors  
Feature Newest Clothes**

Deviating from the straight and narrow way has its advantages in fashion, and that is what clothes have done, with the result that the straight line dress or coat rarely is seen. Lines are broken by intricate ways of cutting clothes and by the combinations of colors used, and through trimmings.

In suits coats may be of a color that contrasts with the skirts. No pretense is made of having them bear any relation to each other in hue. For instance a dark brown jacket may be worn with a rose colored skirt or a bright blue one with a red skirt. Somewhat extreme, these two combinations, but there are many others showing more restraint.

Diversity of styles makes the assembling of a new wardrobe interesting and at the same time economical, offering as it does opportunity to combine the old with the new. To add a blouse in one of the new tones to a suit one already has in some measure makes it a new costume. A summer frock is metamorphosed by the addition of an unlined jacket of chiffon or crepe. Any of the lingerie neck-pieces such as berthas or fichus, and starched lawn collars and cuffs offer unlimited opportunity to develop diversity in dress.

The model at the left of this page is suggestive of the importance of the blouse as a means of changing the feeling of a costume. With a jumper, or one of the old-fashioned tuck-in blouses, another revival it may be worn in the morning, while a frilled lingerie blouse makes it suitable for the afternoon. In buying blouses it is well to bear in mind the importance of the soft satins in pinkish white tones, the shade known as eggshell, or very pale beige. Among the newest blouses are those having square neck openings, side buttoned closing and linked cuffs. These cuffs necessitate the use of the old-time cuff links. Small, flat metal buttons make the smartest links.

Flowered chiffon capes and coats to wear over one's evening frocks are attractive additions to the wardrobe. Over a very simple white crepe satin frock a three-quarter length black and white flowered chiffon cape may be worn. An effective way to have it made is with the upper part fitting the shoulders like a deep yoke and from there a succession of flounces falling to the bottom of the wrap, which should be cut considerably longer in the back than in the front. A three-quarter length chiffon coat with a petal ruff collar at the neck is a charming way to enliven an evening costume which, while still perfectly good, has lost interest for the wearer.

Net gowns covered with sequin embroidery will be very smart for this summer. Chanel showed them at her opening in black, in bright red, and in green and blue tones. These are quite different from the

palletted gown of last year. A jumper top seems extraordinary for ceremonious occasions, but she displayed one in green for a wedding event. On another is the cardigan jacket of net, also palletted. The dress consists of a jumper bodice and gathered skirt.

Squiged cape coats for evening are lined with velvet and have ruffled collars. Other cape coats are covered with horizontal lines of artificial silk fringes, while some straight crepe capes with scarf collars have two gathered frills from the elbow line to the hem.

Hats for this spring and summer may be small or of medium size, but there is a decided tendency toward the larger hat with a lower crown. The older woman always is glad to have a hat that throws a becoming shadow on her face. In hat fabrics felts, satins, straws and ribbons are equally good. Straws of this year, however, are very much like fabrics. Most of them are as light and soft as thisledown. Milliners in designing hats use them just as they would felts. The smartest hats for young women are very short in front to show the forehead. The carefully shaped eyebrow must be seen. Some of the most attractive ones are long either on the side or back. Turbans may have ruffles across the back, or if of straw may be trimmed with rows of straw curls. Models such as these are especially adapted for the woman who is permitting her hair to grow.

With street clothes the very simplest gloves always are in good taste. They may be of white or yellow chamolles. Yellow gloves are very smart at the moment. For the morning gloves should be heavy and washable and of the gauntlet type. For afternoon wear nothing is better than white or beige kid or doeskin cut on the same lines.

Shoes vary from the tailored oxford worn with the sport suit to the intricately cut strap slipper with high heel, which so many women who carefully consider their toilette prefer for afternoons. Colored leathers, used either for the shoe itself or for the trimming, are much in evidence this spring, so if you like colored shoes, your footwear may match your ensemble. If you prefer the beige tones of the natural lizard or snake your pumps may be trimmed with a color to harmonize with your costume.

With the ensemble or the three-piece suit, if it is not fur trimmed, and very often it is not, we will wear a gay scarf, figured perhaps if the ensemble be of plain material, and in patchwork effect if it is not. The flattering fox scarf which has become almost a necessity of late years may be composed of one or two skins. The mode in which the perfectly dressed woman wears this scarf is most important. The fashion of wearing the single skin loosely over the shoulder and hanging down the back has departed. This season the scarf should be worn around the neck with both head and tail to the front.

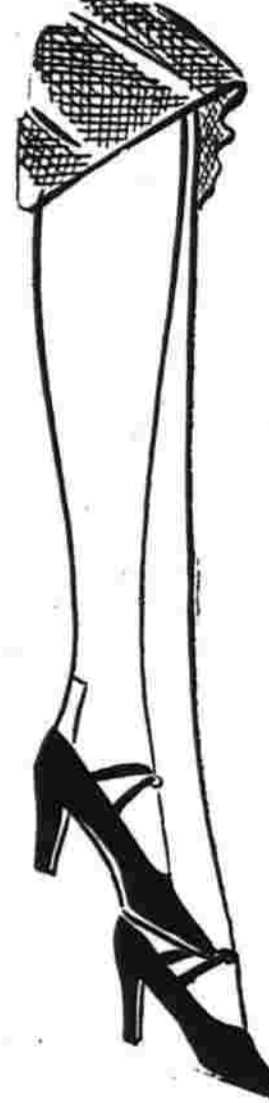

**PRINTS ARE GAYER THAN EVER BEFORE**

**Old Time Fabrics Revived and Printed in Newest of Effects.**

By MILLICENT

Will American women wear prints to the extent that they are being worn in Paris? That is what every one is asking. I think we will. Incoming steamers bring reports that "Europe is overrun with printed fabrics."

We will wear these innumerable printed materials because they are more beautiful in design and color and more flattering in texture than any we have had. Chiffons of sheers and exquisite colorings are strewn with every flower seen in old-fashioned or modern gardens. Mousselines are dotted, flowered or spotted in every conceivable way. Crepe de chine are printed with field flowers, with huge roses, or with small clusters of blossoms and foliage, in marble effects or in diagonal stripes.

Upon a black crepe background rose petals may be scattered, as if a passing breeze had blown them there or a pale yellow surah silk

may be figured with brown and white roses or brilliant poppies. Black moire carries yellow daisies, while blue cornflowers are strewn over black faille. Vivid flowers and silver leaves appear on white crepe, while amber moire, with a floral design in brown and orange, is especially striking. A cloth of gold has white daisies with black lines to give it character.

France exploited printed velvets last winter and much was expected of them, but meeting with little response in this country they struggled feebly for a while and dropped out, proving that it is what the well dressed woman wears that stamps fashions.

Hundreds of dress ideas are launched in Paris each season. It is the few that are chosen.

American women have been accused time and again of slavishly following the style dictates of France. No one can deny that Paris is the great clearing house for ideas in dress. Most of our art derives its inspiration from older countries whose peoples have more leisure and riper themes from which to draw.

No woman wears clothes better than the American. None expresses herself more effectively through dress than she. This year her opportunity is great, for designers have turned to a time when dress was replete with a multitude of ideas.

Fashions run in cycles in fabrics as well as in the models designed from them. It is impossible to say whether fabrics influence dress designers or types of dress inspire fabrics.

An artist or designer may get in-

spiration from a garden, an old painting, a bit of rare pottery beautifully colored, a sunset or the hues of a butterfly's wing, but we find that the dress of bygone days is in general the fountain from which ideas flow.

Types of earlier periods of history are revived from time to time and modernized. To-day it is the 1880 period that subtly pervades our newest clothes. The dress of that time always has had a certain fascination for designers. It was a decade when clothes had variety and charm. A time when women had no desire to be replicas of each other, but were anxious that some individual touch should be given their costumes, and when there was a spirit of rivalry rather than a de-

sire to copy. May we not be hopeful that there will be revival of that trait so well calculated to improve dress as well as a renewal of the designs of that far off time?

Our grandmothers may have been sisters under their skins—I always have thought that little couplet about Judy O'Grady and the Colonel's lady a delightful fallacy—but they insisted on individuality in dress, and that is why designers so frequently turn to those days when endeavoring to modernize the charm of the old and combine it with the best of the new, thereby widening the scope of their activities.

Old-time fabrics as well as old-time styles have made their appear-

ance this season. On the right of this page is a sleeveless dress from Schiaparelli which shows alpaca, that material which was used for grandmother's rainy-day dress, in a new and glorified form. It is of a soft yellow shade sprinkled with red, black and white flowers. With it an organdie blouse and Schiaparelli's well known scarf are worn.

Another printed fabric, this time the ever-popular crepe de chine, is used for the dress in the center of the page, and here yellow flowers riot over a white background. Accordian pleated ruffles are placed on the skirt in an unusual way. To give it character Miller, who designed it, used touches of black in the tabs at the neck, the wrists and hip.

**PATTERNED SATIN TIES FOR SUMMER PROMOTED**

**Desire for Something Different in Four-in-Hands Prompts New Style Idea.**

With many of the quality stores of the east giving preference to foulards, the middle west retail institutions putting much of their faith in crepes, there are several neckwear buyers for smart stores who believe those men who pay \$2.00 and more for their four-in-hands will purchase patterned satins this summer.

These men agree that the designs shown in the foulard and crepe lines are handsome, summery and appealing. But the better dressed men will want something different. The patterned satin offers a variety, which possibly no other silk can offer during the coming season, according to the buyers who buy for some of the best known stores in the country. They point out that with the exception of foulards and crepes there will be few silks offered to the public in light, summery colors and patterns. The heavier weight silks are no chance, and cottons and linens are receiving little preference, it is admitted. By this method of deduction, they are led to believe that sufficient fancy satins will be wanted to result in a big demand for the tie in the summer of 1930.

If logic counts for much in the prediction of the public acceptance, these buyers have a rather satisfactory argument. One man, who heads a most successful style neckwear department in a prominent middle-west metropolis, points to the tremendous selling of plain colored satins in the better qualities this spring. The fact that low price satins have moved rather slowly indicates, he says, that the man looking for something different will not be afraid of the fancy satin, for he has seen satin four-in-hands worn by better dressed men only. Then, too, he adds, a number of important figured lightweight satins, which he brought back from Europe, are meeting with unusual favor at \$4.

There seems to be a divergence of opinion as to the lasting popularity of the small figure patterns. A number of big stores had believed the small figures would be "dead and buried" this spring, but they have remained in favor both in the popular price and the better qualities. Others contend the era of the Spitalfields ideas will come to a

close this spring, but it is argued by others that there is little likelihood that figures will be supplanted until next fall. The new silk lines for fall are said to contain a greater number of stripe motifs than at any time since the last mogador invasion.

One of the big features in the spring tie business causing some concern to retailers is the new shade, burnt orange. This color has won many customers, especially in the new satins, barathens and chevrons, which, incidentally, are the best liked silks in solid effects. Some buyers look for a continuation of the demand for this shade, declaring the men who will wear red brown suits next fall are likely to be attracted by this unusual off-

shade. Others are afraid to order these for fall.

Blues and reds, however, are still in the front line trenches—the favorite colors of both the mass and the discriminating. Several smart shops attempted to interest their clientele in orchid and lavender, but present indications are that such shades will be found sharply reduced in the semi-annual sales. Gray and tan are gaining in popularity, but green is apparently losing headway.

Preparations are being completed by neckwear manufacturers for the annual observance of Father's Day. It is expected that special neckwear patterns will be introduced for the selling on the special occasion, which comes June 16.

## GOOD CLOSET LIKE ADDITIONAL ROOM

### No House Can Have Too Many of Them—Can Be Easily Arranged.

BY HELEN SPRACKLING

Closets fill a particularly important place in the confines of the city dweller. What apartment or house was ever known to have enough! They must serve many purposes: attic, coat closet, dressing room and bureau drawer in one. In the small one or two-room apartment where all that suggests of the two intimate side of living must be kept out of sight, the manifold purpose of the closet is increased in proportion to the decrease of the space of the living quarters. Hence it behooves us to give our closets careful thought and consideration and organize them to their utmost capacity.

The space distribution of the average closet seldom satisfies individual needs. As it first meets our eye it is generally an empty recess with one, possibly two, shelves across the top and a row of empty hooks around the sides. Let us consider this space thoughtfully and with the help of the handy-man-in-the-family or, lacking such a one, the neighborhood carpenter double the possibilities of this space and bring order into what would otherwise be a chaotic and wasteful situation. We will presume that across the entire closet there is at least one shelf which should be on a level with the top of the head or within easy reach of the outstretched arm. Consider this shelf as "attic" for the storage of out of season garments carefully enclosed in moth and dust-proof packages and boxes and other little-used garments. From this shelf let us drop a partition which will divide the closet either exactly in half or into one-third, two-third proportions, the decision resting upon the actual measurements of the recess. In the right-hand space which should be the narrower if the spaces are of different widths, install a rod from which to hang garments in constant use. This rod may go from left to right, from the partition to the right wall of the closet and may be a wooden or metal rod bought for the purpose, a section of an old curtain pole or a broom handle glorified with brushing lacquer. A towel rack inverted and screwed to the under side of the shelf serves the purpose admirably. If the rod is to extend from front to back, then choose an extension rod made for the purpose which allows the entire rack of clothing to be drawn out so that the selection of a single garment is a simple matter.

Disposing of the left-hand space is a matter of individual preference, but, generally speaking, its most effective division is as follows: at the bottom two rows of pigeon holes each sufficiently large to hold a pair of shoes with shoe trees. The top of this shoe section will form a shelf to hold compartment trays for stockings, gloves, handkerchiefs and trinkets of all kinds. Just above this two shelves placed rather close together will hold soft piles of folded garments and flat boxes. Larger and wider boxes containing blouses, scarfs and so forth, will find their place on the next shelf above. Still one more shelf, and about the last, should be placed sufficiently below the top shelf to hold hatboxes and handstands.

If it is not convenient to build the lower compartments for the shoes use instead one of the many attractive paper covered units which come for six, eight or ten pair of shoes and which may have, if desired, a little drawer at the top to hold a dozen pair of stockings. Or it may make for a better arrangement to substitute instead of the two lower shelves one of the many extremely convenient lingerie cabinets or wardrobe units. These come in various sizes, slipping easily into place in any closet and effecting a swift change to order and convenience. The remaining space of this section of the closet, if there is any—and that will depend on the depth of the closet—may be shared with a clothes hamper which comes in various heights, sizes and kinds from the brightly painted ones adorned with a gay print or entirely covered with figured paper to a flat and compact red hamper attractively lacquered.

Having disposed of our space efficiently it is now quite natural that we should turn our attention to the matter of decoration. Any urge for decorative expression will find com-

plete satisfaction in the innumerable colorful and cunning things designed to transform the closet into a perfect bower.

But it is the boxes that are the piece de resistance of closet equipment. Big and little, round and square, tall and capacious for hats, or flat and divided into many compartments for trinkets and jewelry. They await you in every possible size and shape to hold everything under the sun! Covered with gay imported papers, modern and bizarre, or quaintly reminiscent of lavender or rose leaves, antiqued and lacquered if you prefer, covered with cretonne, chintz or muslin, they may be had in matching schemes to complement and establish any decorative idea. There are nests of boxes of all sizes, shoe compartments, stocking trays and utility boxes which are much like hat boxes in appearance until one discovers that the cover is on fast and that it is the side that lets down as

an opening. One of the most fascinating and incorporating quite the newest idea is the tuxedo suit box of two compartments, its lower one a drawer which contains the right sized divisions for a shirt or two, collars, tie and studs; lifting the cover discloses an upper tray which holds the suit carefully folded.

Bags are interesting too. Chiefly, these are the garment bags which may be in materials that match your boxes or your shelf edgings such as cretonnes, glazed chintz or sateen. ment within and thus avoid opening the wrong bag in a hurry. With these are also matched amusing little hat covers which slip on over a hat as if rests on its stand on the shelf. If you prefer laundry bags to hampers and shoe bags to compartment boxes, you will find plenty of both carried out in a matching fabric. The shoe bags have an added feature in a long narrow pocket designed to hold an umbrella.

In the excitement over these gay accessories we must not forget that there are utilitarian aids to real convenience which do much to help in the transformation of an old closet. It is amazing what can be found upon the counters of the five-and-ten to assist in the metamorphosis.

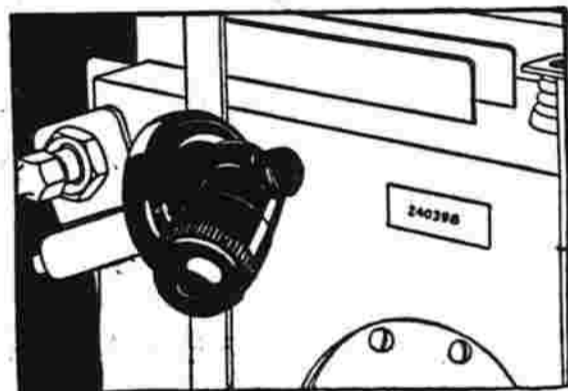

# France Mourns Dead In Black And White

France, so quick to show its national feeling, already has displayed its recent twin bereavement. The outward and visible sign of this dual sorrow is shown in the Parisian dress. This is particularly true of the feminine citizenry. Sombre attire is donned for all public functions. Black, or black and white, has been seen on all important occasions. The simple worker as well as the aristocrat thus expresses personal grief at the double loss sustained.

Whether at weddings, on the promenade, driving or walking in the Bois, this jackdaw combination has been not entirely swathed in solemn black. These mourning costumes are worn as much in honor of the late Ambassador Herriek as for Marshal Foch. The American diplomat was greatly beloved. High and low alike have expressed national as well as individual sorrow in dark yet becoming costumes.

A very pronounced fashion is the vogue of the flared redingote. This style of outer garment is extremely becoming to tall, slender, feminine figures. Again the feminine redingote in black marocain, ornamented at the throat with a fur standing collar in the same sombre hue. This neck finish is composed of fox. The coat is cut on straight lines to the high waistline, and the feature which gives its distinguishing mark is the flaring out to a three-tiered skirt hem.

In black again another handsome redingote is shown. Here the characteristic goes appears in three phases. The first is on either side of the coat, the third goes showing in the center back. But the wearer must have grace in her walk to carry this style of garment or its beauty of form is lost. This coat is created of crepe de chine and is elaborately covered with curved lines of stitching. An ermine collar, shawl shape in form, relieves the dullness of the black.

Still in sombre tones is a redingote of moire. Its lines follow closely that of the crepe de chine model. The stitching, however, is omitted, so as not to conceal the watery effect of the silken fabric. In this coat the black droops to the hem, and it is trimmed at the front opening with a gray fox boa.

Still continuing the display of redingotes, a velveteen one was shown on a tall, fair-haired mannikin. It was a very handsome model and of soft gray in tone. The delicately colored complexion of the mannikin admirably carried this unusually trying shade. In this velveteen garment the faring goes were cunningly inserted at the side skirt seams. Then these had a decided curve-in at the normal waistline.

Decidedly handsome for afternoon wear was a suit created from broadcloth. The texture of this material was of such a fine weave it had the appearance of rich heavy satin. It was black in color and the circular

skirt had a flared back panel. The coat was worn over a pale yellow blouse of crepe de chine. This blouse was cut to the short waist, feet and draped at the neck opening with a tie band.

For wear earlier in the daytime was a suit model in which the hat and the skirt were composed of the same material, broadcloth again being the fabric from which this suit was fashioned, and the color, too, was black. The skirt, straight-cut was finished at the collar and cuffs with fur, and the coat was worn over a white satin waistcoat which denied its masculine origin and was distinctly feminine in cut and look.

The dress coat as shown by Vonnet is the ideal costume for walking when the April sunshine calls for the gentle world to promenade in the Bois. This couturiere has exhibited a model especially adapted to the youthful figure. It is for the woman who believes the youthfulness is retained by a brisk daily walk in the park. The model this artist displayed was of soft wool in a neutral tone and cut very straight with a side opening. This walking costume had a scarf collar and the waist was encircled with a leather belt.

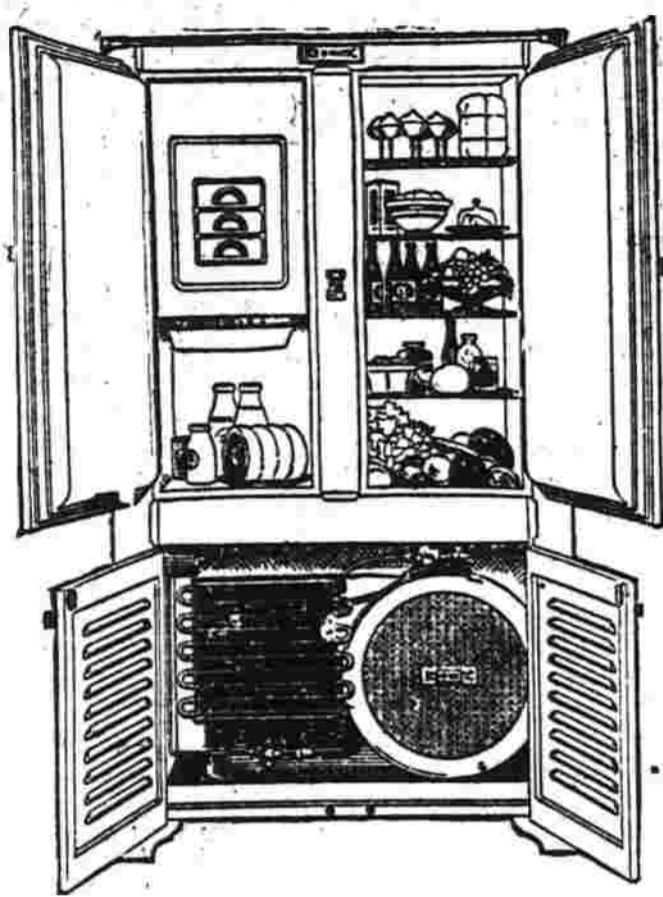

### 'TUB GARDENS' ADAPTABLE TO SMALL GROUNDS

Minimum of Space Needed  
Makes Them Especially  
Suitable for the City.

By THE GARDNER

The love of water in pond or pool can be much more easily gratified on small home grounds than is usually realized.

Even town back yards can be beautified in this unusual way at slight cost of either time or trouble, and specialists are now ready to supply all kinds of material, from the needed fish life up to the best tropical lily, while native lilies often can be found growing wild.

The simplest plan for putting a pool in the back yard is to procure one or more half-barrels or commercial tubs (quite inexpensive) and sink to the level of the ground. Where there is room, two or three set close together and plenty of suitable water plants around the edge give a delightful, irregular outline.

**Treat Tub as Aquarium**  
Where it is difficult to pipe water into the garden, tubs of this kind have to be treated as balanced aquariums, with a few fish, snails and tadpoles necessary with the water plants to keep the water pure. Fish life prevents breeding mosquitoes or the objectionable accumulation of scum. Carefully prepared lily pools of this kind can be made a joy throughout the season.

A single tub is large enough to hold one water lily, which will keep in bloom most of the time, with several of the aquatic plants that give a variety of foliage. The choice of lilies is one of individual taste. They come in both native varieties and tropical which are hardly enough to be put out-doors in early summer and will flower on until cold weather.

As these are not expensive, where people have no greenhouses they are treated as annuals and renewed every year. Moreover, choice can be made of the day-blooming and the far less known but highly desirable night-blooming. Where two tubs could be set side by side

and a day-blooming put in one and a night-blooming put in the other, even in such a small space they would be a rare delight.

**Hardy Lilies Day Bloomers**  
The hardy lilies, of which native varieties are found even in Canada, are day bloomers, generally float on the water and are in all shades of yellow, pink, red and white.

Marillac white is a fragrant five-inch beauty, listed by one dealer at only \$1, while the splenda, with petals shading to red, costs more than \$7, but is quite unusual. A dainty little Chinese specimen, listed as pygmy, is a dwarf, with snowy white scented flowers. The yellow pygmy, quite similar, has heavily spotted leaves, while another yellow, also fragrant, is listed as Odorata sulphurea, good for long blooming.

The Paul Harlot is remarkable in that its petals are clear yellow the first day, orange-pink the second, afterward deepening almost to red. Thus the same plant will have flowers of different hues. It is listed at only \$4, yet for a small pool it is a real gem.

**New Hardy Varieties Available**  
About twenty new rare hardy varieties are available this season, running up to \$20 each for the finest novelty; but when considered in comparison with a corsage or a single dinner table decoration decidedly inexpensive.

The true Egyptian lotus, or sacred lily of the Nile, according to Bailey, is the Nymphaea lotus, which has rose-colored and white flowers; but our American specialists usually list as the sacred lotus the Nelumbium speciosum, which comes in pink. All the average person cares to know is that the Oriental lotus is available in white, pink and a fragrant blue—a rare gem breathing the poetry of antiquity.

Among the day-blooming tropical water lilies is the General Pershing, one of the finest pink. In a delicate shade, delightfully fragrant. The August Koch, introduced about 1922, is a strong, steady bloomer in a lovely delicate lavender. The Mrs. George H. Pring is a new type, fragrant, with pointed petals in white.

**Three Desirable Night-Bloomers**  
Of the highly desirable night-blooming, so effective in the moonlight, come three in beautiful shades of red—the Devonshire, the George Huster and the Sturtevant—but each with blooms from ten to twelve inches in diameter, so requiring more room and especially good for small ponds.

Lovers of water lilies unacquainted with the numerous varieties are advised to visit one of the big lily growers or go to one of the city parks, where they can be seen

blooming most of the time throughout the year.

The marshy plants, ferns, ornamental grasses and bamboos, with suitable perennials, all listed in good water lily catalogs, are a study in themselves, and they are material for endless masterpieces in garden pictures.

Although there will be several total and partial eclipses in the world this year, none will be visible in the United States.

MARK NEW SHIRTS**

Haberdashers, experiencing a most gratifying pre-Easter business, are now willing to agree that the arrival of spring turns both more and immature male minds toward thoughts of clothes. They assert that as the weather becomes warmer and the days lengthen, there has been a noticeable change in the shirts sought by both men and young men. The darker shades, which had met with great favor during the drab, cold months, seemed to fade out. The early spring business has been largely on soft pastel shades. The most popular blues at present seem to be pale casts, not nearly so deep in hue as those purchased last fall and winter. The same is true of the tans, grays, greens and other colors preferred by young men.

Presently, a large portion of the shirts purchased in all sections of the United States will be white, white, retailers expect. Just as the first arrival of warm weather creates a trend toward lighter shades in colored shirts, so does the steady warm period arouse a national desire for white, collar-attached shirts. It is pointed out by some men in the trade that the ever-increasing interest in golf and other sports is somewhat responsible for the huge business on whites in the late spring and summer.

Buyers for both popular priced establishments and the smart, higher priced shops, relate, however, that whites are apparently becoming confined to summer wear. They assert that during the past two seasons fancies have pushed whites into the back shelves. Of course, thousands of plain white broadcloths have been distributed, but there seems to be little question in the minds of retailers that neat patterns in pastel shades are supplanting whites as the dominant factor in the shirt business. Several manufacturers, whose lines are found in the better stores, say that while their total volume has been appreciably larger than a year ago, they have sold 10 to 15 per cent less plain white shirts.

One of the most prominent men's wear stores in the country reports that its early spring business indicates that many of the better dressed golfers have preferred colored shirts. An executive of this institution says that those in demand have not been merely the blue oxfords, preferred by some in the past, but new chambrays and woven madrases in patterns on tan, gray and blue grounds.

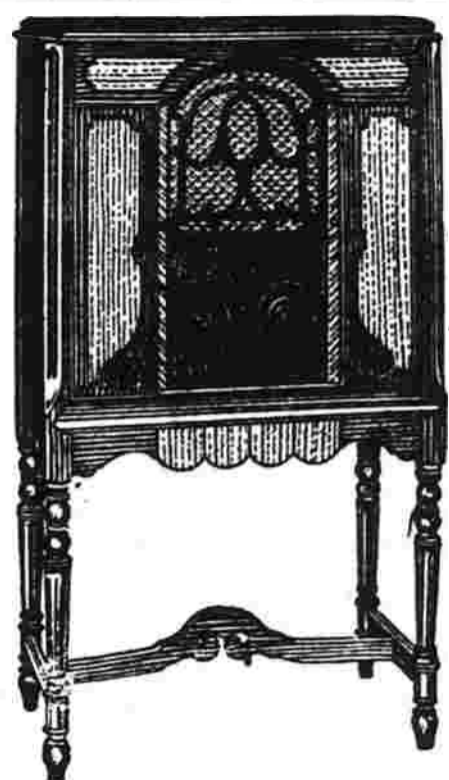

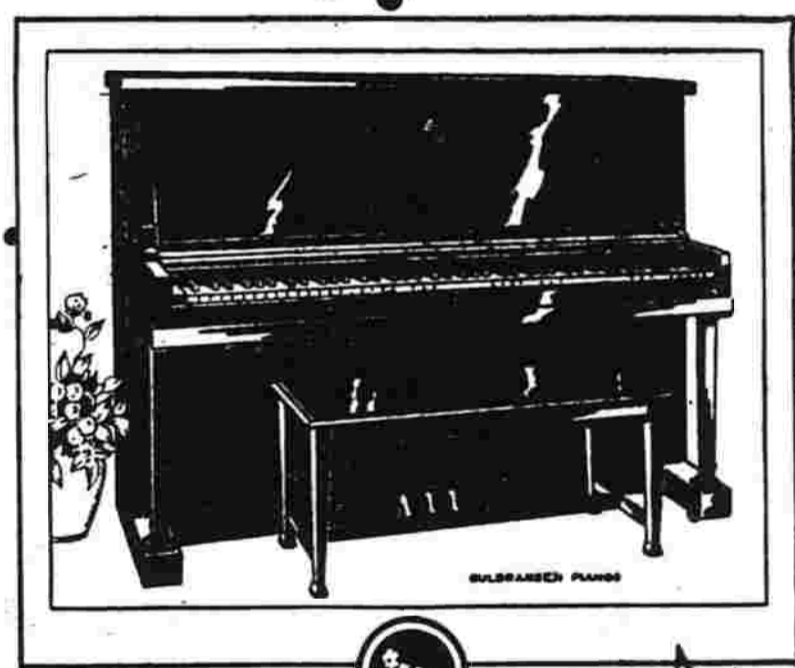

## Rising Tide Of Color Produces Gay Clothes

Throwing caution to the winds is at times a satisfying gesture and one in which we seldom indulge in matters of dress—this year we may do it in the colors of our clothes.

One thing to remember, however, is that color makes no compromise this season—it is very bright or delightfully subdued, which is fortunate because everyone may not choose to take on the hues of the flamingo and a personality to match, for we do in some measure change our personality with our dress.

In choosing colors avoid medium tones; you may be certain that throughout the summer bright colors will vie with pastel shades. A riot in the dye pot has produced many bright fabrics with red supreme for the moment. One of fashion's highlights, it is the color most often seen at smart restaurants and in the home. That does not mean that everyone is dressed in red—but there is enough of it to make it outstanding.

While we have the styles of our grandmothers' day subtly incorporated in our dress we find few of her ideas about age limiting a woman's choice of colors. Today colors have little to do with age. We consider what is becoming, taking it for granted that if becoming it is suitable.

A few days ago I saw a silvery haired grandmother wearing a wool crepe frock in one of the new red tones, with wide collar and cuffs of white mousseline much like those worn by school girls. She was beautiful in that frock and wore it quite as suitably as her granddaughter might have done.

Light weight wool frocks have a definite place in this spring's mode and woolsens follow the same shades as silks. Wool crepes are gayly printed and embroidered in contrasting colors and printed pastel jersey is very smart. Among the most charming shades are faded blues, heliotropes, greens, reds and yellows—orange, too, is much favored. Even white is tinged with color in the so-called off-whites.

Cheruit does a beautiful dress in warp-printed taffeta with yellow and flaming orange flowers on a black background. She makes it with a deep circular flounce starting at the back, and in the middle of the back at the waistline poses a huge bouquet of multi-colored garden flowers.

Dressmakers are using the fabric designers' art to the fullest in applying broad sweeps of color to their new models. If plain colors are used combinations of color are resorted to for novel effects. Tulle is used with bottle-green, white and ochre with brown, yellow with brick red, and brown with gray or yellow. Black may be lined with primrose-yellow or a scarlet coat worn over a white dress. A white linen dress is trimmed with bright colored pings or a yellow suit with black. Brick red wool lace makes

two-piece dresses that are informal in effect. One model of this sort has an overblouse cut in scallops around the bottom and bound with red. The neck and sleeves are finished with flaring collar and cuffs of white lawn outlined in red.

Cheruit uses a lovely bright blue and black printed silk for a youthful costume consisting of a one-piece dress and a short double cape which slips on over the head and is closed at the waistline in front in a waistcoat effect.

In negligees full rein is given to color. Callot does beautiful tea gowns of yellow wool lace, in princess effect, very long and trailing and accented with violet and blue ribbon. In another model she uses flame colored chiffon with red and silver metal lace.

One of the most interesting color combinations is seen in a pyjama costume by Worth consisting of a Provence blue dressing gown, with small sprigs of white flowers and a white satin pyjama suit with collar, cuffs and pleated inserts of the blue silk. Another, following the same lines, has black satin pyjamas over which a robe of coral pink satin is worn. The trimming around the necks of each is small flowers made of coral pink rick-rack braid. Pyjamas of this character, chosen by the English actress June, were in pale blue satin with collar and belt of flowered chiffon, in which the background was a soft bluish-green and the flowers pale yellow and lavender. The flowered fabric was used for the lounging robe as well.

Another colorful combination, appropriately called "Gaucho," is seen in trousers, blouse, and a long coat of brilliant red and yellow silk in modernistic patterns to be worn with printed frocks are another way in which Paris uses color this year. In the center of this page is a Worth gown of black mousseline flowered in red and pale pink. With it a patchwork scarf of chiffon in the same shades is worn.
