While Fred Blish, Jr., answered the advertisement, it was Muske who preceded him and stopped to assist in caring for Thomas Futner, the elderly man who was injured at the time. Blish did not recognize the Manchester party but commented to his wife on the speed with which the Cheney La Salle car was stopped, with half its own length, as the chauffeur was not driving more than 20 miles an hour.

Muske drove away before it occurred to Mrs. Cheney or Robinson to inquire his name. In Muske's opinion Robinson was blameless. He is ready and willing to testify in his behalf when the case is called for trial, pending the outcome of the injuries to Futner.

### BIG NAVY DIRIGIBLE SKIRTS THE TOWN

#### "Los Angeles" Passes Just South of Manchester on Her Surprise Visit.

The unexpected appearance of the U. S. Navy dirigible "Los Angeles" over the southern part of the town last night gave many Manchester people their first opportunity to glimpse an aircraft of this kind. It was paying an unannounced visit to Hartford.

The silver sides of the monster of the air first came into view here from out of the southeast about 8:45. News of its appearance quickly spread about town, scores of persons calling up their friends to notify them by telephone of the unusual sight.

When Hartford became aware of its unexpected guest of the air, Station WTIC immediately broadcast the news and in a short time the streets were thronged with people eager to get a glimpse of the great ship.

Efforts to communicate by wireless with the "Los Angeles" as it passed over Brainard field proved futile because the call letters of the ship were not known. Because of prohibitory government regulations WTIC was unable to establish communication. John L. Reinartz, Manchester's radio expert, said that without the ship's call letters, communication was impossible.

The dirigible was proceeding at a comparatively slow rate of speed as it passed to the south of the town and on to Hartford. Only two of her five motors were in operation until after the ship passed over Hartford.

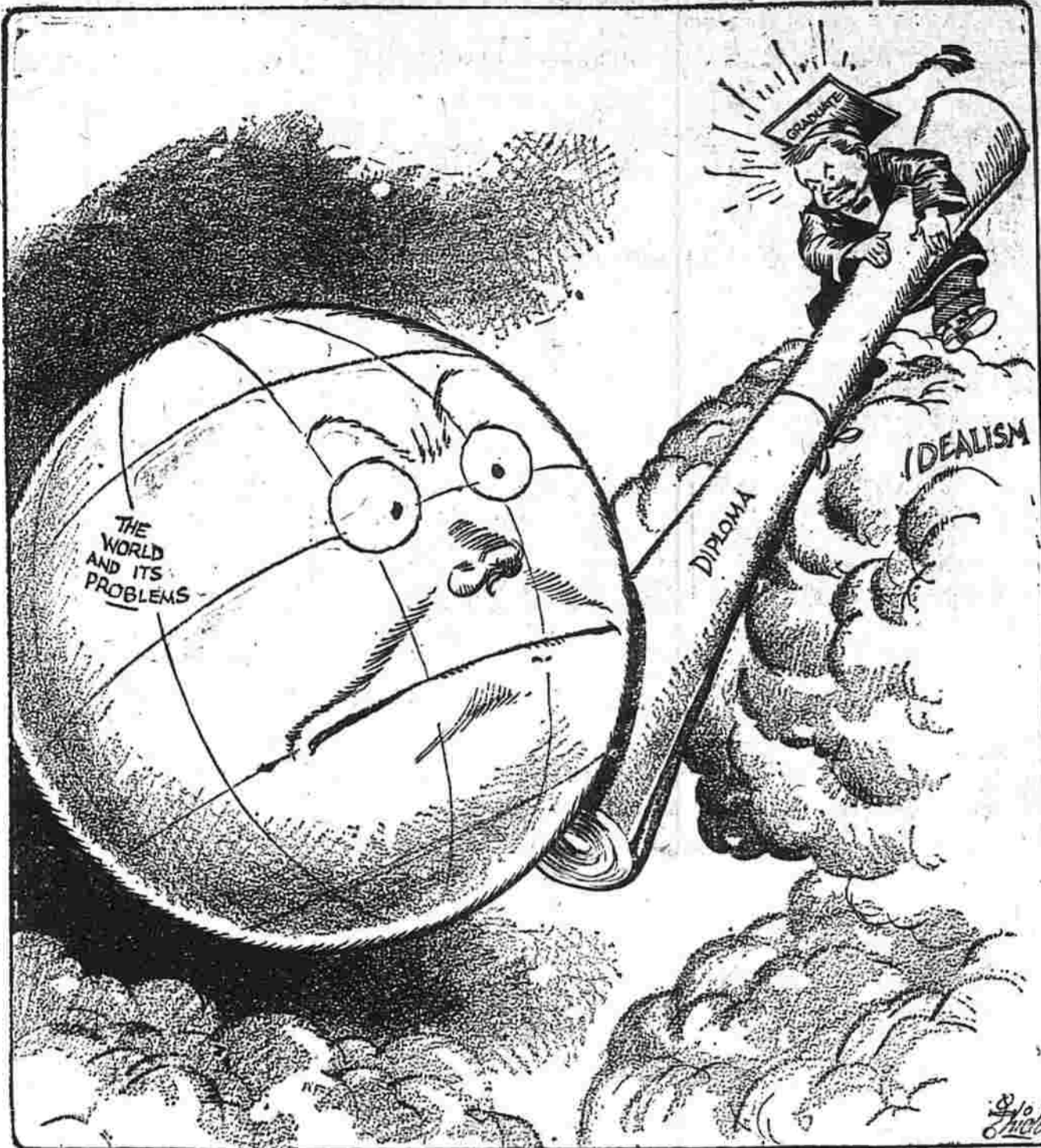

### CHARGED WITH MURDER TWICE IN TWO YEARS

Valparaiso, Ind., June 5.—Mrs. Catherine Cassler's stoicism was shattered today as she stood charged with a second murder in two years.

Gone was the indifference to fate that once enabled the stout matron to laugh with the gallows but 48 hours away. She wept and ranted by turns. Not over her own plight, but because her son, Edward 19, was a prisoner. He is detained as a material witness.

Edward was an unwilling witness at the inquest into the death of Miss Meola Soutar, 23, described in testimony as the mistress of Truman Cassler, the husband. By conflicting statements Edward unwittingly damaged his mother's defense.

A verdict by the coroner's jury was expected today. Mrs. Cassler was arrested on the murder warrant while on the stand at the inquest.

It is alleged Mrs. Cassler shot the Soutar girl to death and flung the body in a swamp near Hebron, Ind., several days ago.

Only a month ago she escaped the gallows. She was convicted and sentenced to death for the murder

### HOLD RED ENVOYS

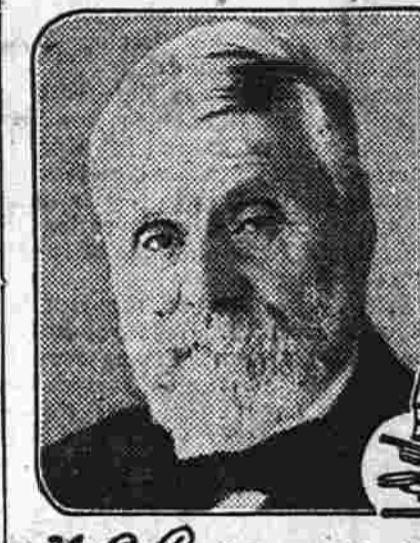
London, June 5.—Chinese officials have arrested three Soviet diplomats enroute to Moscow for conferences on the recent Chinese raid on the Russian consulate at Harbin, according to a dispatch to the Daily Telegraph today.

The Soviets, the message stated, were forced to return to Harbin under guard, and the Chinese authorities refuse to explain their action. Soviet reprisals are expected.

According to a Peking message to the Daily Express, Soviet troops have been massed on the Manchurian frontier to prevent Chinese residents in Russia to return to their native country. Thousands of Chinese, fearing reprisals because of the consulate raid, have sought to cross the frontier but have been stopped by the troops, the dispatch says.

# COMMUNITY LAWN FETE JUNE 6-7-8

## MARQUETTE TO BE A FETE FEATURE

**Buick's Brand New Car to Be Displayed at Community Club Affair.**

The Marquette, a fast, new powerful car with lines of sleek beauty, designed, produced and distributed by the Buick Motor, and offered to the public last Saturday, will be on display by the Capitol Buick Company of East Middle Turnpike at the three-day Lawn Fete of the Community Club, opening tomorrow night.

This new creation is offered in six models: a two-door sedan; four-door sedan; business coupe; sport coupe; roadster and touring car. With a wheel base of 114 inches, it is an exceptionally large car for its price and class.

Although built to meet certain high pre-determined standards, rather than a price, the Marquette enters the medium cost field with a price range of \$965 to \$1035 at the factory. The car brings to this field evidence of new standards of appearance, roadability, speed, durability and comfort. All bodies are Fisher built and finished in Duco color combination that exemplify the modern trend of color fashion.

Many advanced features have been incorporated in the Marquette including a non-glare, sloping windshield; a newly created type of water-proof mohair upholstery; a complete frame and radiator metal covering; stocky spoked wheels using large section tires; four-wheel, twelve-inch, internal expanding brakes and a carburetion system that insures economy of operation.

### Exhaustive Research

The six-cylinder in-line motor has a bore and stroke of 3 1/8 inches by 4 5/8 inches and develops a rated horsepower 23.44 and a maximum brake horsepower of 67.5. In accordance with time proven Buick standards, light cast iron pistons are used. The crankcase and cylinder block are cast integral. A tapered chassis frame, thermostatically controlled water cooling system, forced lubrication to main, connecting rod, camshaft bearings and to the timing chain are some of the engineering features. The engine is set on rubber mounting and thoroughly insulated from the frame.

Its hill-climbing ability was determined with a four-door sedan, (Model 37.) This car carried a total load of 450 pounds. The hill chosen for the test presented a climb of 400 feet over an 11.6 per cent grade. The average grade is 7 per cent. The car approached the foot of the hill at a rate of five miles per hour, then, with the climb started, the engine was accelerated and with a quiet and steadily increasing speed it swept up the grade and passed over the summit at 25 miles per hour.

A five-passenger, four-door sedan, carrying a total load of 450 pounds was also used in a series of acceleration tests with the following results:

The car accelerated from 5 M. P. H. to 25 M. P. H. in 8.8 seconds; from 10 M. P. H. to 25 M. P. H. in 8.3 seconds; from 10 M. P. H. to 40 M. P. H. in 12.4 seconds; from 10 M. P. H. to 60 M. P. H. in 31.0 seconds.

These tests were conducted with a stock car with a 50-11 (4.54 to 1) axle ratio which is standard on the Marquette, together with a 28x5 balloon tire which gives 728 wheel revolutions per mile. The medium speed engine operates at 3,310 revolutions at 60 miles per hour and reaches its approximate maximum of 4,140 revolutions at about 75 miles per hour. At the average road driving speed of 40 miles per hour the engine turns over at 2,200 revolutions per minute.

The cylinder block and crankcase are cast in one integral unit, well reinforced with ribs which assure sturdy construction.

**Uniform Smoothness**  
The Crankshaft is made of a special heat treated steel and is amply counterweighted to make a smooth and vibrationless engine. The shaft has four main bearings stepped in size which give it a tapered effect and insures maximum rigidity with a minimum of weight. Crankshafts are placed in static and dynamic balance. These features assure uniform smoothness of the motor at all speeds.

In order to stand abuse from extreme high speed driving, the four steel-backed main bearings have been designed with a generous factor of safety.

The pistons are cast iron, light in weight, and mounted on exhaustive tests have proved them free from rattles, slaps and excessive wear. Bronze bushings are used to insure maximum life of the piston pins. These piston rings are used, two standard type compression rings and a special oil control ring. All three rings are above the piston pin. The pistons are drilled beneath the third ring and a combination of slotted ring and drilled piston keeps the oil consumption to a minimum.

**New Upholstery**  
A distinctive and major improvement is found in the new type tilted non-glare windshield which will prove a new factor in safety driving. While retaining all the advantages of comfort and ventilation of the older type, this new windshield provides absolute freedom

from glare, either from the front or rear. To accomplish this, the windshield is tilted outward at the bottom 2 1/2 inches which gives it an angle from the perpendicular of seven degrees. This angle causes all the glare from the windshield, whether from the rear, front or sides to be reflected below the driver's line of vision.

The Marquette also brings out for the first time a recent and very valuable improvement in upholstery cloth. This cloth, a soft but exceedingly durable plush mohair, is impregnated, under a new process, with a rubber solution. This treatment protects the cloth from any damage by rain or moisture and makes it, by actual test, ten times more durable.

## VIKING LUXURY'S APPEAL TO WOMEN

**Impresses "White Lilac" Star, Aside from Power, To Be Shown at Fete.**

In designing the new Viking particular care was taken in the construction and finish of the Fisher-built bodies. They are of composite wood and steel construction to give the maximum of strength, durability and riding comfort.

A neutral tint which harmonizes with the various body colors, is used in the Vikings. In harmony with the name of the car and the fact that it is powered by a V-type engine, a "V" motif design is carried out on the interior moulding which decorates the window and door panels. This inlay is artistically accomplished in solid lines. The same motif predominates on vanity case and match and ash receptacle.

All interior metal fittings are of rich period design by Farnstedt. Instruments are grouped in a new type panel which is designed with a shrouded top to prevent reflection of light. As a further comfort in night driving, the lights on the instrument panel which normally operate with the headlights, also may be turned off or on independent of the headlights.

The driving compartment is lined with rubber covered mat with a heavy felt base which extends up to the cowl. This excludes drafts and any road noise. The rear compartment is equipped with high grade carpet.

The Fisher designed adjustable front seat can be moved backward or forward to accommodate the particular preference of the driver. An adjustable steering column gives further driving ease, the two providing a customized tailored fit for each individual driver. Rear seats have upholstered arm rests.

The long wheelbase—125 inches—and spring suspension, together with the four Lovejoy hydraulic shock absorbers which are built into the car, also contribute to the luxury of the Viking by providing the maximum of riding comfort.

The new Viking comes in three body types—the four-door sedan, the close-coupled four-door sedan and the convertible coupe. All body types may be had in standard or de luxe models. The de luxe have six wire wheels with the two spares carried in side fender wells and a folding trunk rack as regular equipment.

Besides the Viking, the Oldsmobile, the New Roosevelt and the Marmon will be exhibited.

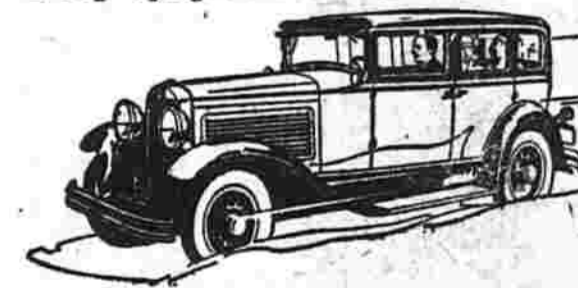

## DOGE SEEKS OUT THE ROUGH TRAILS

Used for Path Finding Tour of 8,000 Miles in Northern Michigan.

When you drive comfortably along with accurate road maps through sparsely settled country on hard dry roads, the hardships and dangers experienced by men who blazed the trail in the spring and made those maps, probably never occurs to you. Yet each year new maps have to be made to insure motorists' comfort and safety as new roads and new resorts are opened. And each year these trips must be made long before the average driver would venture far from home.

### COOLIDGE FINDS PRECEDENT FOR CONGRESS SEAT

Washington.—If Calvin Coolidge "chooses" to represent his home state of Massachusetts, either in the House or in the Senate, and Massachusetts voters "choose" to let him, he will set no precedent, but will simply be following in the footsteps of another Bay State president, John Quincy Adams.

Though the second John Adams returned to Washington after leaving the executive mansion, he has had two successors, who have followed his example, though several others have returned to the capital in national roles in various routes.

The second Adams, returned to his home at Quincy, Mass., following the popular election of Gen. Andrew Jackson in 1828, but soon after was elected to represent his state in the House of Representatives, where he remained until his death in 1848.

**Returns to Senate**  
 Andrew Johnson of North Carolina, who found his president in the turbulent times after the assassination of Lincoln, returned to Tennessee, the home of his choice, after his stormy executive career, and in 1875 was elected as a U. S. Senator by the "Volunteer" state. He died shortly after.

Former President Taft returned to private life in 1912, following the "Bull Moose roundup," of Theodore Roosevelt, but was appointed chief justice of the supreme court of the United States in 1921, where he has since presided.

One other former president stepped upon the national stage after retirement, but briefly and in the hectic days of the slavery question. He was John Tyler of Virginia.

Like Johnson, Tyler inherited the office of chief executive. He fell heir to the presidency upon the death of William Henry Harrison, (Tippecanoe) in 1841. Nearly twenty years later he was elected by Virginia to the Confederate congress, but died before that body assembled.

Three New Yorkers, who retired from the presidency, later essayed to return to the White House or at least the capitol, but failed of popular support.

**Other Attempts**  
 Martin Van Buren was the first Vice-president during the second term of Andrew Jackson, he succeeded "Old Hickory," as chief executive and after four years went out of office in the "Log Cabin," campaign of "Tippecanoe and Tyler too," in 1841. In 1848 Van Buren's name led the national ticket of the "Free Soil" party, but he was defeated in what was to be the last victorious national campaign of the Whig party. Gen. Zachary Taylor, Indian and Mexican fighter was the successful candidate.

President Taylor died soon after his inauguration and was succeeded by Millard Fillmore, of New York, in 1850. Fillmore finished the term and retired. Seven years later he attempted to lead the remnants of the Whig party in a three-cornered race. Buchanan and Breckinridge, Democrats, were elected. Col. John C. Fremont, the California "Pathfinder," headed the first Republican ticket. Fillmore carried only one state, Maryland. That was the end of the Whigs as a national power.

Popular as was Theodore Roosevelt, during his stay in the White House, he succeeded in accomplishing nothing except to put Woodrow Wilson in and kept Taft out, in the national campaign of 1912.

### WEATHER SIGNS RELIABLE SAYS BUREAU EXPERT

Washington.—Probably the weather forecast in the little box on the front page of the daily newspaper in almost the first item most of the millions of newspaper readers scan.

Explaining this, Weather Bureau experts say that those who live in the city want to know, naturally, whether to carry an umbrella or put chains on the automobile, while those who are engaged in agriculture, the probable state of the weather for the day and the prediction for tomorrow determines what work will be planned or accomplished.

"With reliable service from the Weather Bureau it would seem that the old-time weather proverbs would soon pass out of use and be forgotten, even if any of them were dependable," one of the experts said. "Many, indeed, were absurd and misleading, but not a few are interesting as reflecting the accuracy of observation by those who are 'out in all weathers,' and useful when the daily paper is not at hand to furnish a forecast."

According to this expert among the best of these, perhaps, are the proverbs that have to do with the color of the sky and the appearances of the sun, the moon, and the stars, for all are affected by the state of the atmosphere.

**Sun Flares**  
 "Any modified appearance of the sun is most conspicuous when it is near the horizon," the expert said. "Hence there are many weather proverbs about the sun at morning or evening. When the air is heavily charged with dust particles laden with moisture we see the sun as a fiery red ball, and predict rain, in such proverbs as 'a red sun has water in his eye,' or 'if red, the sun begins his race, be sure the rain will fall apace.' The red sun implies a humid atmosphere, a condition essential and favorable to the occurrence of rain."

"On the other hand, a red evening sky usually means that the air contains very little moisture and that rain within the next 24 hours is improbable. When the evening sky is overcast with uniform gray the dust particles in the atmosphere have evidently become loaded with much moisture, giving rise to the proverb, 'if the sunset is gray, the next day will be a rainy day.'"

"A gray morning sky, however, for reasons which meteorologists can explain in connection with the formation of dew, generally justifies the expectation of a fair day. 'Evening red and morning gray, two sure signs of one fair day. An evening gray and a morning red, though,' will send the shepherd wet to bed."

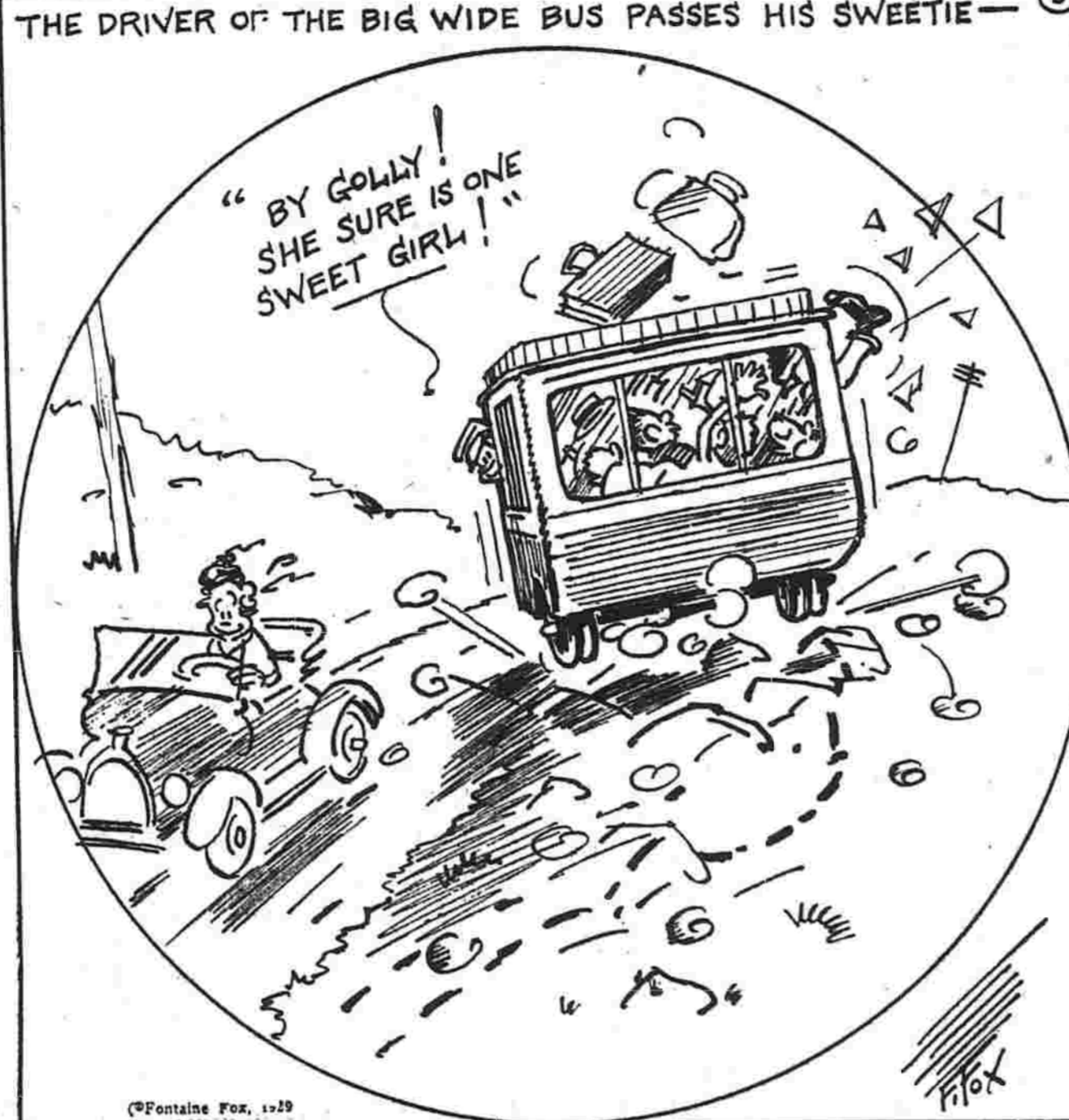
