LABOR LEADER SEES KING ON

Form New Government; stroyed by fire off the eastern coast of Kamchatka on May 26, dis-No Definite Selections Yet Made.

London, June 5 .- J. Ramsay Mac Donald, leader of the Labor-ites, appeared this afternoon at a joint meeting of committees of the National Labor Party and the Parliamentary Labor Party to discuss the labor policy of the new Labor government. He was given an enthusiastic welcome.

Earlier in the day Mr. Mac Donald had been commissioned by King George to form a cabinet to succeed the Conservative Baldwin

ministry. It had been expected that the premier-designate might reveal the names of the new cabinet members tonight, but Arthur Henderson, another Labor Party leader, announced that the personnel of the Mac Donald government would not be disclosed tonight and that the news may possibly be delayed several days.

London, June 5-King George. who is lying ill in Windsor Castle, today formally commissioned J. Ramsey MacDonald, leader of the Labor Party, to form a new Cabinet.

The new labor government will succeed the Conservative ministry headed by Stanley Baldwin, resigned.

Braintree, Mass., June 5-With the recovery of two charred bodies from the smouldering debris and the death of a man in Quincy hospital, the double explosion at midnight in two stills in the plant of the Cities Service Refining Company had taken a toll of three lives and caused property damage by fire estimated at \$500,000 this afternoon. Burned almost beyond re cognition, the bodies of Night Superintendent Grant C. Chase and Laborer Wallace Minott Will All Quit, If Industry Is were found. They had lost their lives in a heroic effort to stop a flame that ran up a pipe leading to Still No. 1, which caused the first explosion. As the bodies were being taken from the flame swept bebris of the two giant stills. fireman Frank Ford. who had been rescued while a blazing torch, died of body burns at Quincy hospital.





nowever, if France is to escape having to pay \$400,000,000 to the U. S. Treasury on August 1. This debt was incurred for the purchase o. war stocks left by the A. E. F. after the Armistice. France bought them for about 40 cents on the dollar and gave ten year notes for the amount. In the general debt ugreement, the \$400,000,000 was funded along with the principal debt of nearly \$4,000,000,000, payable over 62 years. But as there has been no ratification, the \$400, 000,000 becomes due on August 1. The Senate, which has long regarded with suspicion American participation in reparations conferences, was examing the settlement terms with interest today, and, incidentally, looking for "jokers."

May Ask Cancellation The chief fear expressed was that Germany may now join the general European chorus for a reduction or cancellation of the allied war debts to this country. There is a proviso that the Allies will reduce their claims against Germany only to the extent that the United States reduces its claims against the Allies. Consequently Germany's sole hope of lightening her own burden would seem to be dependent upon America scaling down the allied indebtedness.

Congress bristles at the bare uggestion.

Senator Swanson (D) of Virginia, ranking member of the foreign relations committee, summed up the general Senatorial attitude today by saying

"If the reparations settlement is satisfactory to the Allied and Central powers it should be to us.

VOTES PAY RAISE TO SCHOOL DOCTOR

Town Board Approves Esti-Increase Only \$1,600.

The salary of the town school doctor, which was last year fixed by the Town School Board at \$1,000, has been decided by the board to be too low for the work done by Dr.

LeVerne Holmes and at a special meeting of the board this morning it was voted to make the salary \$1600 for the coming year.

The meeting of the board was held this morning to provide opportunity for all its members to get first hand information as to the exact needs of the outlying districts which includes Oakland. Manchester Green, Highland Park, South Main street. Keeney street, Buckland and the entire Eighth District group.

There were several important matters to come before the board, principal of which was reclassification of the salaries of the teachers. who have all been engaged for the coming year, and the fixing of the salary of the school physician. Although the doctor's salary was cut last year that fact did not prevent him from going on with the work just the same, though the duties of the position consumed a very considerable amount of his time.

Objection to the increase was October. raised by one member, who asserted that more time was given to the work than was necessary, but other members who had made it their business to investigate favored the increase.

District Budgets The budget estimates of the different districts were gone over carefully and will be presented to the joint school board meeting as the lowest possible figure that the school board can recommend. In District No. 1 an appropriation of \$1.850 will be recommend-


President Taylor died soon after his inauguration and was succeeded by Millard Fillmore, of New York, in 1850. Fillmore finished th, term and retired. Seven years later he attempted to lead the remnants of the Whig party in a threecornered race. Buchanan and Breckinridge, Democrats, were elected. Col. John C. Freemont, .the California "Pathfinder," headed the first Republican ticket. Fillmore carried only one state, Maryland. That was the end of the Whigs as a national power.

Popular as was Theodore Roosevelt, during and after his stay in the White House, he succeeded in accomplishing nothing except to put Woodrow Wilson in. and kept Taft out, in the national campaign of 1912.
