The new laws or changes, according to a digest prepared by the motor vehicle department, range from methods of license applicaindividuals, to tion, affecting measures of regulation demanding state-wide administration.

A state traffic control system, which aims at uniform regulation for every town, is among the major enactments. Automobile junk yards are now under state and town regulations. Taxicabs are included among the vehicles required to be licensed as public service vehicles by the public utilities commission. A so-called insurance merit rating law has become effective which calls for state classification of operators whose driving records make them subject to the financial miles. responsibility law.





render the old plates, if any, to the department. Formerly, mutilated plates were returned at the time of application for new registration.

A clarifying clause in the statues definitely makes it an offense for a person to "cause or permit the operation of any motor vehicle by any person under sixteen years of ' As interpreted by the department this law prohibits anyone under sixteen from operating even though accompanied by an older person or "under instructiou."

An additional fee of \$3 is now provided for the registration of each motorcycle with a side car or box attached when used as a commercial motor vehicle.

Special registrations are necessary for motor vehicles which are not, in the strict application of the definition, public service motor vehicles but are used in transporting passengers. Such vehicles are defined in the statutes as "passenger motor vehicle, or commercial motor vehicle used in part as a passenger vehicle with a seating capacity greater than seven and not used as a public service motor


Next year, for example, France will be called upon to pay the United States only \$35,000,000, while under the Young reparations plan she will collect from Germany \$22,175,000.

From 1942 onward, France's payments to the United States will never be more than \$125,000 annually. That same year under the Young plan, she will collect from Germany \$297,850,000, with heavier payments due in subsequent years. In no year under the agreements will France be called upon to pay the United States but a fraction of what she has due from Germany.
