#### Home Made Bomb Shatters Window at Hathaway Home Early Yesterday; Few Clues; Attorney Conducting Own Investigation

> Loud Explosion It was just about 4 o'clock when the blast occurred. Both Mr. and Mrs. Hathaway were trying to sleep through the usual celebration racket when there came a heavy, jarring report that shook the house. It sounded, Mrs. Hathaway said today, like a tremendously large firecracker or heavily loaded cannon, fired close by. Neither of the Hathaways, however, realized that the explosion was on their own premises. It was not until in the day that they discovered that an obviously purposeful attempt had been made to injure their home if not themselves. Then the shattered window was discovered, with the

litter left by the explosion. Work of Amateur The residue in no way resembled that left by an exploded ' ecracker, but there were scattered about bits of scorched newspaper and particles o: wrapping twine. From the evidence left it was plain that the bomb was not the fabrication of an experienced hand in the making of affair constructed by wrapping a heavy charge of common gunpowder, into which a fuse had been introduced, in many layers of newspaper and binding the whole contraption tightly with the twine.

Such a device, while lacking some of the shrapnel qualities of a metal cased bomb, is capable of working much destruction through the sheer force of the explosion. An Announcement of Particular Interest to Subscribers who have Dial Four Party Line Telephones

NEW FORM of four party line telephone service for dial subscribers becomes effective in the Manchester exchange area on Saturday night, July 13, at midnight. Its chief advantage is that, although there may be four subscribers on the line, each subscriber will hear only two numbers rung on his line: - ring one and ring two.

Therefore, each dial party line subscriber must know which ring to answer after midnight on Saturday, July 13. This information has already been furnished to each subscriber affected; it appears on the lower part of the card in the center of the dial four party line telephone instrument.

With the introduction of this improved party line service will also become effective an improved method of ringing. The bells on dial party line telephones will be rung by means of a machine which will give fixed intervals between rings. This machine will automatically ring the bell at the called telephone - if the line is not busy - until it is answered, or until the calling party hangs up.

In "Ring 1," the bell rings for two seconds followed by an interval of silence lasting four seconds, after which the ringing in repeated.

In "Ring 2," the bell rings for only one second, and the ring is repeated after a one second interval. The pause following the completion of the second ring is three seconds long, after which the cycle of rings and intervals is repeated.

The desirability of a four party line service where each subscriber hears only one call on the line in addition to his own, and in which the ringing is done automatically with fixed intervals, is obvious.
