FRAINS COLLIDE ON ERIE R. R.; SIX ARE DEAD

Freight and Passenger Trains Meet Near Corning, N. Y.-Crew and Two Tramps Are Killed.

Corning, N. Y., July 11 .- Five men were killed outright and another died shortly after in the trash here today of a derailed eastbound Erie freight train and passenger train Number 6 from Cleveland.

Three cars of the passenger train caught fire and were burned.


The dead are Engineer F. E. Blake, of Hornell; Foreman W. J. Latonic, of Susquehannah, Pa., and Mail Clerks B. A. Fagan, of Salamanca and H. M. Hurlbert, of Lockport, and two tramps, riding the freight train.

The baggage, express and mail cars of the east bound passenger train caught fire and were destroyed.

Joaches Overturn Several cars of the freight train overturned after it left the rails. A number of ambulances with doclors and nurses, were rushed to the scene to render first aid treatment.

The wreck occurred on a stretch of through track two miles east of here. The freight, carrying more than 40 cars, was proceeding on the west bound track when it trashed into some obstacle, derailing a score of cars. Amid this debris the bodies of the two hoboes still remained.

DRY EXPENSES President Says Budget Totals Must Remain Within Limits-Expert Whittling Down on Many Items.

TREASURY NOW

PLANS TO CUT

Washington, July 11 .- In keeping with the injunction of President Hoover that the 1930 budget totals must remain within the limit of that of 1929, Treasury experts today started to whittle down preliminary estimates dealing with various phases of prohibition enforcement.

Preliminary figures prepared by the Customs and Coast Guard, and in the hands of Acting Secretary Ogden L. Mills, Treasury budget officer, were said to be somewhat higher than the appropriations contained in the 1930 budget.

The Coast Guard, in the present year, has available \$29,676,000. which was \$700,000 more than appropriated in the year ending June 30. The Customs 1930 appropriation was \$43,180,500, an increase of \$4,319,000 over the preceding year.

Doran's Request **Prohibition** Commissioner James M. Doran was understood to have asked for \$15,325.000, the same figure as was contained in the 1930 budget and the deficiency bill by which congressional drys hoped for more efficient enforcement. The deficiency bill appropriation, amounting to \$2,700,000 allowed TARIFF CUT \$1,700,000 for the Prohibition Bu-reau, and carried \$50,000 for edu-cation purposes. This was included

The Oakland plant, located in the extreme north end of Manchester, has been idle since March 1925, and has been for sale since that time.

Dexter Company, manufacturers of high grade issue and condenser papers, and a leading paper specialty concern will begin operations in the local plant as soon as the ouilding here can be reconditioned and additional machinery installed. THE JOB of delivering 5000 copies of the new Summer issue of the L telephone directory in the Manchester area was begun today. It will continue for several days, until directories have been delivered to all subscribers.

This directory contains a new number for every telephone in the Manchester exchange. These changes are caused by converting practically all of Manchester's telephones to the dial system. This has brought about the following important changes which appear in the new issue of the directory:--

All dial party line subscribers are listed as though they have individual line service, there being no "ring number" shown. Thus it is impossible to tell, from the listing in the directory, whether the telephone is on an individual or on a party line. If, therefore, a busy signal is received on a call to what is apparently a single line, this will not necessarily indicate that the called person is using the line. It may be a party line, and some other subscriber on the same line may be using it.

A few telephones will remain manually operated; these are listed with the prefix "Rosedale." To call a number so listed, it will be necessary to dial "Operator." An operator will then request the number desired. Give her the name prefix "Rosedale" and the number, in the usual way. She will make the connection for you.

McCarthy Says Wilson Blameless For Fight

Chicago Manager Places Blame for "Riot" in Reds' Own Camp; The Inside Dope.

By DAVIS J. WALSH

New York, July 11 .- Lewis "Hack" Wilson, the sterling youth who brought the bock beer age back to baseball, if only for a day, when he tried to punch his way through the Cincinnati player limit and lived to testify in his own behalf in the ensuing investigation, is just another Pagillacci whose public life has been made a tragedy by the jeers and taunts of fans and fellow players. This was the version of the Wilson-Kolp-Donohue incident to be presented by Joe McCarthy, Chicago manager to President John A. Heydler at the final hearing of the case tomor-

It probably will save Wilson, for the Chicago line up without further penalty, since it will furnish the second of the customary two sides that are supposed to make up every story. The understanding here is that Wilson will be told to go forth and sock no more.




