

Has a Piece of the Rope That Tied Mrs. Surratt's Feet.

In the course of this week's interview, with Charles Griffith, whose interesting story is told on this page today, it developed that one of his kin, his uncle, Thomas Griffith, was one of the guards assigned to assist at the hanging of the conspirators in the assassination of President Lincoln.

Among Mr. Griffith's relics is the bayonet and sword carried by his uncle and a bit of the rope that tied the feet of Mrs. Mary Surratt, before the noose was placed around her neck.

"It was the saddest time of my life," the elder Griffith was wont to say. "Nobody wanted the woman to be executed. Whether or not she was guilty has always been a moot question, but I had to do my duty. The executions of Powell, Atzeroet and Herold did not affect me as they were surely in the plot. As I understood it, it was merely that they talked over the details in the house where they boarded which house was conducted by Mrs. Surratt. It might have been that the poor woman did not know what the men were talking about but she died just the same. It was a time of great stress and people do wild things then.

"As I stooped to tie Mrs. Surratt's feet I clipped off an end of the rope."
