

The constitutional provision advanced as a reason for declaring the McCook deal invalid follows: "If the bills shall not be returned by the governor within three days, Sundays excepted, after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it; unless the General Assembly, by its adjournment prevents a return, in which case it shall not be a law." The Supreme Court decision says: "We are obliged to hold that Acts signed after the three-day

prise. Blanket Action Impossible

Parliamentarians said today the legislature could not take blanket action and make all the laws affected valid in one stroke, but must act on each one separately-a job which will take three months at least. A great many members of the Legislature are farmers, there is always mumbling and complaining if a session lasts too far into the spring planting season, and three months now would oblige the farmer-legislators to sit in Hartford shuffling over routine that measures and forgotten issues during the entire harvest period. There is another alternative. The state, which is one party to the action in which the decision was rendered, can appeal to the United States Supreme Court.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS Adhesions and Constipation

Question:-B. J. H. writes: "I would like to know what the symptoms of adhesions are. Was operated on for ruptured appendix about a year ago and suffered no ill effects until a couple of weeks ago. Have had continual headache, as if from stomach, usually constipated, and pains in back that lead up to back of head."

Answer:—Adhesions binding the intestines together are a common cause of constipation. The only way you can be sure whether or not you have adhesions is to have an x-ray examination made. Adhesions may produce symptoms in almost any part of the body if they are of sufficient strength to interfere with the functional activity of the stomach, intestines, or other abdominal organs.

No Starch for Diabetics Question:—H. G. asks: "Will you please tell me if the entire wheat bread is starchy, and if it is good for the diabetic instead of gluten bread?"

Answer:—Entire wheat bread or plain white bread has a preponderance of starch over all other food elements. Gluten bread has slightly less starch, but the diabetic should not use bread of any kind, as he can get along very nicely if no starches are used, but may be forced to take insulin if he insists on using any form of carbohydrates. Corners of Mouth Sore

Question:-G. H. asks: "Will you kindly tell me what causes the corners of the mouth to get sore? Also, the remedy for this disagreeable trouble?"

Answer:—Soreness in the corners of the mouth may be caused from an irritated stomach or from abscessed teeth. ARMY NOW SEEKS BIGGEST PICTURE

Flying Cameramen to Try for Photo 200 Miles Away; Beat All Records.

Wright Field, Dayton, O. - And now the army is going to try to photograph objects 200 miles away. Seeking to excel the present record of 175 miles for long-range photography, Captain Albert W. Stevens, ace of the army's aerial cameramen, and Lieutenant John D. Cockrille, pilot, will make a 6.000-mile cruise to the lofty peaks of the Continental divide and return in a specially prepared photographic plane. They hope to prove that photographs of military value can be taken from a distance of 200 miles.


The flyers' route from Dayton lies across the states of Montana, Oregon and Washington, including the Cascade and Rocky Mountain ranges. It will cover, in fact, very much the same territory that Captain Stevens, piloted by Lieuten...nt Macready, photographed in 1924 when the present 175-mile record was made.

This mountain region was chosen for the long-range photographic test because it will, in most instances, be a simple matter to embrace in one exposure three or more outstanding peaks. With







Legal Bars Are Down, But Ex-Kaiser Won't Dare Risk Return To Germany


London .- Is former Kalser Wilhelm getting ready to do a sneak. into Germany now that July 22 has passed?

That's what monarchists as well as republican Germans would like to know and what they are puzzling about. For on that date the law for the safeguarding of the German republic ceased to be active and there is no legal obstacle to prevent the former monarch from leaving his home in Doorm, Holland, and going into the country over which he ruled for so long.

The republicans, of course, do not want him back, even if he promises to live quietly and undertake no political agitation. Strange as it may seem, the monarchists do not want him back, because, inside Germany, most of them would look upon him as a liability rather than an asset.

How Muddle Came About The whole muddled situation is due to an extraordinary occurrence in the lower house of the German Reichstag the other day. Seven years ago a long series of political assassinations of members of Germany's republican government was attributed to secret organizations of monarchists. Aroused at last, the Reichstag passed a law for the safeguarding of the republic. It provided special penalties for conspiracy against the state or its organs and endowed the administration with special powers. In addition. It contained a paragraph specially making it unlawful for the exkaiser to seek to come into Germany. As some of the provisions were contrary to the Weimar Constitution, to pass the bill required





He Steers Ocean Flights To Safety, But Opposes Them As Risky Stunts

By BERYL MILLER.

New York .- The man who made possible seven successful trans-Atlantic airplane flights is opposed to ocean flying.

This seemingly paradoxical fig-ure is Dr. James H. Kimball, government meteorologist. He is the man who gives the final word to those west-to-east flyers who match their daring against the hazards of the Atlantic.

And Dr. Kimball hasn't lost a flyer yet. Not one aviator who "played the game" and followed the doctor's meteorological guidance has been forced down in the ocean by storms.

When Dr. Kimball said "go," a little-known young man named Charles A. Lindbergh gave his ship the gun at Roosevelt Field, Long Island, shot out over the ocean, landed safely at Le Bourget Field, near Paris, and became a world hero over night.

Aided Byrd's Flight. Hours of errorless work by Dr

Kimball and others in the weather bureau made it possible for Commander Richard E. Byrd and his companions to navigate a safe course to France. And the meteorologist gave them a west wind to push their plane.

Dr. Kimball's word is law to the Atlantic flyers. After preparations for their flight were completed, Amelia Earhart and the late Wilmer Stultz waited many days to take off for Europe because the meteorologist said the weather wasn't right.

Clarence Chamberlain's hop to Germany was made possible by the weather bureau's observations. Others who placed their lives in Dr. Kimball's hands were the three Frenchmen, Lotti, Assolant and Lefevre; the globe circlers, Schlee and Brock, and Williams and Yancey, who flew the Atlantic recently.
