
ENTIRE BOARD OF SELECTMEN TO RUN AGAIN Hyde's Name Goes in With Rest - Police Officer **Roberts Enters Contest** for Constable.

William S. Hyde, chairman of the Republican Town Committee, this morning filed as those of candidates for selectmen, the names of G. E. Keith, John H. Hyde, Albert Jackson, Thomas J. Rogers, Robert J. Smith, Wells A. Strickland and William Robertson, all to succeed themselves. They constitute the entire board.

It was expected up to a few days ago that there might be one change, that John H. Hyde, present chairman of the board and a member for eight years, might not be a candidate, but his friends prevailed on him to allow his name to be entered. Unless some other candidates are entered before night which is not probable, there will be no contest in Republican primary this year for selectmen.

Must Resign If Elected The entrance today of Albert Roberts into the field as a candidate for constable assures a contest for that position. There are already four names in and Mr. Roberts, who is a police officer, had his application signed and ready to present this afternoon. If he is elected constable he will have to quit his position in the police department in order to qualify.

Chief of Police Samuel G. Gordon, who had been a constable for a number of years, was not allowed to continue as constable after he became a member of the police force. Frank J. Quish was in : e same position and Clarence E. Wrisley was also called on to resign as constable when he became

ALLIES MAKE FINAL OFFER TO BRITAIN

Commander Eckener Wants to Make Around the World Meets Fully 60 Per Cent of Snowden's Demands-If **Replaced It Will Break** Up the Parley.

The Hague, Aug. 26.—It was reported here this after-noon that Philip Snowden, British chancellor of the exchequer, has turned down the "final" compromise offer of France, Belgium, Italy and Japan in the reparation conference. This offer was understood to meet sixty per cent of the reparation demands originally made by Snowden to his fellow delegates in the Hague conference.
