HOOVER PICKS A MINNESOTAN FOR DRY POST

G. A. Youngquist Selected to Succeed Mrs. Mabel LEAGUE PLANS Walker Willebrandt as Dry Law Head.

Washington, Nov. 1- (AP)- G. A. Youngquist, attorney general of Minnesota, has been selected by President Hoover to succeed Mrs. Mabel Walker Willebrandt as assistant attorney general in charge of prohibition enforcement.

Mr. Youngquist, who was born in Sweden and whose home is in Crookston, Minnesota, is now in Washington, and will take office in the near future. His nomination is expected to be transmitted to the Senate this week.



AFGHAN'S NEW KING IS OF ROYAL FAMILY Spent Most of Life as a son to 4,500 men. Military Leader.

London. - (AP) - Nadir Khan, Afghanistan's new king, is of the same royal family as the former King Amanullah, for both trace their descent to one Sardar Panda Khan, a minister at a minor court one of whose 21 sons became the first king to rule the country in something like its present form about a hundred years ago.

The new king, who is 49 years old, has spent the greater part of his life in military and political affairs, although he gained no wide reputation outside his own land until a few Europeans came to know him as commander-in-chief of the Afghan forces, A post which he later exchanged for that of minister

He was steadily acquiring during this period the remarkable influence over many of the Afghan tribes that has stood him in such good stead during recent months. . Had Many Friends

In 1924, Nadir took up the post of Afghan minister in Paris; and here he made many friends. Illhealth intervened, and in 1926 he had to leave his post and take up residence as a private citizen of the French Riviera.





* Cooked lettuce: The mention of lettuce instantly brings to mind a raw salad vegetable, crisp and cold. However, as a change, it is surprisingly palatable in the form of a cooked green, prepared in the fol-lowing maner which eliminates the draining away of any excess liquid and thus destroying the valuable mineral elements contained in all

vegetables. Separate the leaves of as much lettuce as desired, or cut the heads into quarters or eighths as in preparing cabbage, and wash thoroughly under running water. Put lettuce into a heavy aluminum pan over a low fire. The water that clings after the final washing affords sufficent moisture. When lettuce is heated through, which will take about three or four minutes, turn the fire higher, cover the pan, and cook for about ten minutes. Serve

hot with butter. QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Ankylosis Question: K. D. W. writes:-"I am suffering from ankylosis in the hip. It is on the ball joint that goes into the body. I have had x-rays taken, and all kinds of medicine and rubbing. I have been getting worse for five years, until now I can hardly walk. Some doctors advise an operation by scraping the bone. I am 50 years old."

Answer:-It is difficult to advise you about your condition without first having the opportunity of making a personal examination. The treatment I employ is by fasting and dieting to remove the toxins which may have accumulated around the joint. I also advise the application of a deep therapy lamp. This regime should be continued until all inflammation has subsided, after which time osteopathic or other manipulative treatments usually prove advantageous.

Gastritis or Cancer Question: Mrs. A. W. writes: "At present I am being treated for rastritis. Am getting some relief from gas, but I seem to have a dull ache in the stomach continually. No sharp pains to amount to anything and no vomiting. Have had this for about four months and it is making me think there might be something

peside gas, perhaps cancer."

Answer:—It would be impossible to diagnose cancer of the stomach, yourself. This is sometimes difficult for a trained physician, and it would be necessary to have a number of x-rays taken as well as a physical examination of the stomach contents. A continual dull ache in the stomach with gas would likely indicate gastritis. Sometimes this requires a long time to cure, but you should be persistent in following strict fasting and dieting instructions which I will be glad to send you upon request. If you did have cancer or ulcer it is likely that you would have sharp pains and vomiting unless of course they were in the incipient stage which would be
