



Were Carrying 80 Pounds of Dynamite in Tunnel When It Explodes Prematurely; Two Other Men Injured In Accident; Were Working on Water Development Project.

Worcester, Mass., Nov. 8 .- (AP.) -Five workmen were blown to pieces in a premature explosion of 80 pounds of dynamite in a shaft of the Metropolitan water development at Coldbrook early today.

The cause of the explosion could not be immediately determined. Fellow workmen told investigators that a dynamite explosion had been set off further in the tunnel at an early hour and that the five men were on their way toward the entrance, carrying 80 pounds of dynamite in one of the small cars used for transporting material. In some manner the dynamite was exploded. The men were blown to pieces and several hours later the parts of the bodies had not been recover-

ERIK NELSON, AIR **EXPERT, PREDICTS** PLANE FOR FIFTY

## Also Believes Pullman Service Will Be Established for Overnight Runs.

#### By ISRAEL KLEIN **NEA Service Writer**

Cleveland .- One of the first men who ever flew around the world believes that commercial aviation soon will pe offering service that will surpass what is now available as greatly as modern railway trains surpass the trains of the pre-Civil War era.

He is Erik Nelson, the first successful round-the-world flyer and today sales manager for the Boeing Airplane Company of Seattle, which is said to operate the two longest air transport routes in the country.

Opens a New Service Nelson recently inaugurated a 20-hour passenger line between Chicago and San Francisco-the first all-air day and night flight of that distance. Immense 18-passenger ships, powered by three engines totalling more than 1500 horsepower, take passengers over the broad plains of the middle west and across the Rockies at night, guided by experienced pilots with the aid of a radio range system and direct radio communication. These ships cruise at a speed of

135 miles an hour, yet Nelson looks at them as crude compared with what he expects to come within only a few years.

"Speed is what we want today, even ahead of safety and luxury," he says. "And so we are giving our passengers speed, of course, with as great a factor of safety as could possibly be had. Later on we will undoubtedly have planes with berths, but at present the demand is for speed first of all.

"As a practical minded areonautical man, I can vision planes with 50 or more passengers. Pullman service will be established for overnight runs, thus enabling people to travel between cities as distant as-1200 miles without the loss of any business hours.

**ACCIDENTS TOTAL** SHOWS DECREASE

#### For First Time Motor Vehi-Notes cle Department Drop in Car Crashes.

nual total of motor vehicle accidents, according to reports being tours received by the State Motor Vehicle Department. Accident figures for the first ten months of the year are | traffic, slight delay. nearly 1,000 below the number reported in the corresponding period

last year. It is estimated that to reach or exceed the record of last year, which was the greatest in the history of the state, accidents must be reported at the rate of more than 3.000 a month. This is an unprecedented number, and far above the usual total for either November ." December. The largest number thus far reported in any one month was in August, 1928, when there were 2,908.

There were 20,440 accidents reported to the department up to October 25, this year. In the same period last year there were 21,405, These figures take into consideration the fact that since July 1 of this year, by virtue of a new law, only those accidents causing damage of \$25.00 or more have been reported. In using comparative figures for one mile. for last year, accidents which occurred after July 1 and resulted in damage of less than \$25.00 have not been considered. It is also of note that the low total is attained this year despite an increase of approximately 8 per cent. in the number of cars in use on the highways.

Connecticut's record of accidents since 1918, when the annual total reached 1,000 for the first time, follows:

Up to October 25, this year, 368 persons had been killed in accidents. This is one above the number killed in the corresponding period last year. Per-sonal injury accidents have also increased this year. The rate of increase for the first nine months was about 12 per cent. During this period 7,268 persons were injured, as compared with 6,489 in the same months last year.

#### **TO DEPORT ALIENS**
