Question: K. H. W. writes:-"I am by trade a driller, at present doing concrete work. This is naturally a very dusty job, and this fine concrete dust envelopes me when at dust getting into the lungs? If I keep this work up for a long time will it have any effect on my health?

Answer:-If you breathe too large a quantity of rock dust it could lead to a coating of the lungs which is termed "silicosis" but usually much dust must be breathed before this occurs. Various occupations where dust is breathed may lead to a fibrosis of the lungs. Those who absorb too much silica or stone dust may be incapacitated in from two to eight years. Coal miners or dwellers in cities where there is dust and soot may gradually have the lungs carbonized. The first symptoms are those of coughing and failing health and if this begins to occur it would

Before one can be certain that the child is a normal child, it is necessary to find the capacity of the child physically and mentally and to find whether it falls within the limits that are generally considered normal. This means that the normal child is one like most
