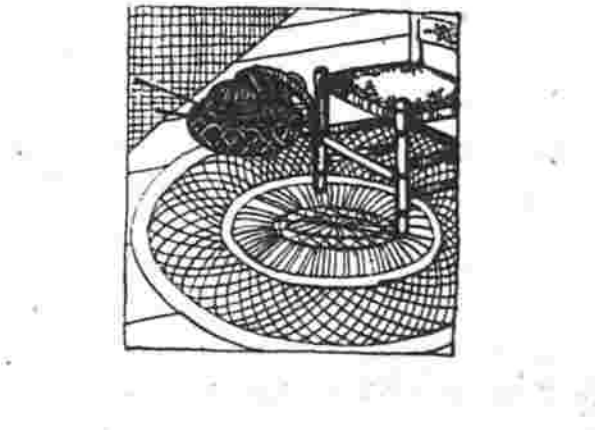

MOST PEOPLE ARE LIKE DUCKS

You read about "self-made" men. There is no such thing. No man ever made himself. Other people did it. The so-called "self-made" man was just smart enough to know that every time he did something for others, others would do more for him—and he did it.

You want to make money. You wouldn't be doing what you do if you didn't. Believe it or not, the fact remains your neighbor does. Therefore, what you do to help him, helps you; and what he does to help you, helps him.

Your neighbor isn't just the man next door, but the man next door to everybody else in Manchester. In other words, your neighbors are the people who make up your community.

If your neighbors didn't do for you, where would you be? You can't do a thing by yourself. You can't eat, sleep, work or play without others entering into it in some way. Sounds ridiculous, doesn't it—but try getting along by yourself and see how far you get.

Socially, the fellow who does not hold up his end is a poor sport, a short hose, a tight-wad and a

moocher. You say, "He has fish hooks in his pockets," which is anything but complimentary, and something that you would not want said about you. In fact, you detest such people.

There really isn't a great difference between things social and things civic, except that there are more short hoses entered in the latter event. Many of you who are good sports socially at moochers are civically—not always intentionally so, but so, nevertheless.

New York—Now it's colored skyscrapers.

More hues are in the new Western Union building than any women dared to wear at one time.

There are, specifically, 19 different shades of brick in the 24-story pyramid that has just broken through the Manhattan skyline like a red necktie on a grey shirt.

Starting with a reddish brown at its broad base, the outside brick become lighter and lighter in coloring up to the bright salmon peak, the shades so blended that commuters on the Hudson ferries cannot detect where they change each 29 feet.

Unique Towers

The man responsible for the innovation is Newcomb Carlton, president of the Western Union.

When the project of a new building was first discussed, Carlton said he wanted something different from the buff brick used in virtually all of the downtown skyscrapers. It was, he thought too common, if not gloomy.

Ralph T. Walker, the architect, said he would see what he could do about it. First he made a trip over the country to view buildings distinguished for their color and to bring back samples of different brick.

Then, while the old building was being demolished, Walker had a tier of six shades built right on the site, so that it could be seen under the lighting of that locality. Carlton inspected the tier and found it pleasing.

This is not the first novelty in modern building color. The gilt-encrusted American Radiator landmark in midtown is said to be the only American structure made of black brick.

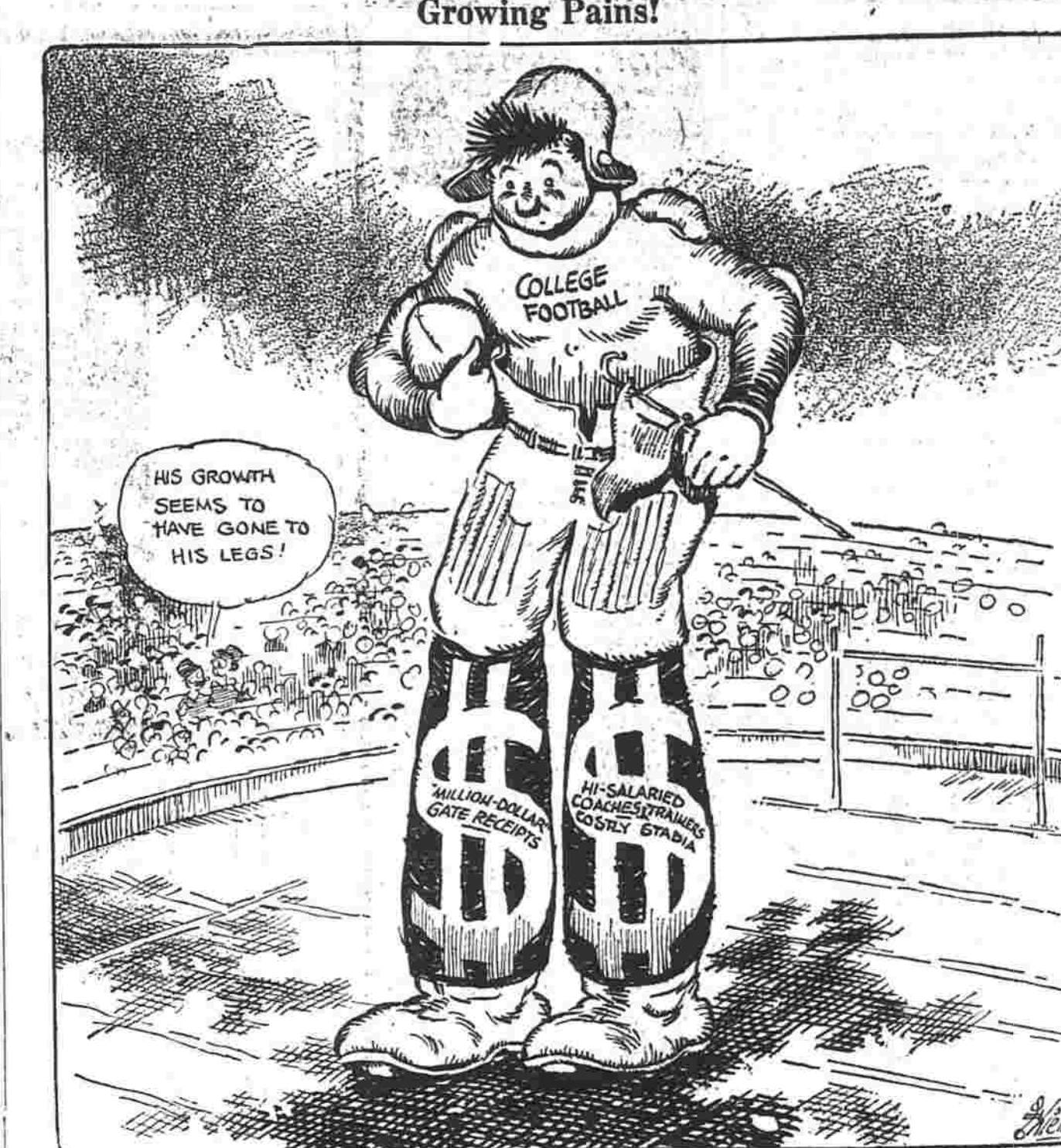
The architect, Raymond Hood, specified black to symbolize coal. It was only with difficulty that he persuaded a manufacturer to make enough black brick for his purpose. There was none on the market then and it's said that none has been made since.
