It will be the first visit any King nonsense of other people of Italy has made to any Pope. It will be of great significance. But only the walls will hear what the three noted personages will say.

To American tourists who "do" the Vatican, the throne room is unknown. It is not on the list of the hundreds of rooms and salons which they are permitted to visit, course of instructions at the Con-It is not in the guide-books.

The Throne Room On the right, as one enters it, is | -Adv. the papal throne, a raised armchair, richly ornamented, standing beneath a square canopy to red velvet embroidered in gold.

Around the room are a few gilded chairs, and several tablets against the wall, with religious ornaments upon them.

The room is very simply furnished. It might almost be called bare, except that what furnishings there are are very rich.

The ceiling and upper walls are decorated with elaborate murals. The floor is covered by a Spanish carpet especially manufactured. It was presented to Pope Leo XIII.

The Sala Clementina The approach to the throne room is through a series of beautiful rooms. The King and the Queen will first enter the magnificent Sala Clementina, a huge room with beautiful murals. Here a squadron lined. of Swiss guards is always on sentry duty at the entrance to the papul

apartments. From the Sala Clementina the the Queen will walk Lirough the Sala Degli Arazzi, or Hall of the Tapestries. In this room hang three great Gogelin tapestries presented to the Pope by Louis XV of France.

Between the Sala Degli Arazzi and the throne room is a small froom in which the noble guard, composed of members of the papal nobility, has its post. This room leads to the Pope's private chapel. Behind the throne room is the Pope's private library. Here the Pope receives privately. This is the Pope's working-room.

Above these rooms are the Pope's living quarters. Below them are the rooms of the cardinal secretary of

When the King and the Queen enter the throne room they will find two chairs placed for them beside the throne. The King will take the one to the right, the Queen the one to the left.



Health and Diet Advice

By DR. FRANK McCOY

CODFISH

The codfish is a fish weighing from three to thirty pounds. It is smooth skinned, white fleshed and fine grained. Where this fish may be obtained fresh, it makes a very desirable salt water fish.

Only a few years ago the fresh cod could only be purchased at the seashore in Maine, Massachusetts, California and Alaska, but now with our modern refrigeration the fresh fish is being supplied to all parts of the country, being shipped on trains direct to countrywide markets.

Cod fishing is no doubt one of the most dangerous occupations, due to the heavy seas and the deceptive fogs which seem to exist wherever the cod are found. The fishing boats are often lost, or the fishers swept overboard and drowned.

Most of the cod is found off the banks of Newfoundland or Labrador, but many tons of the "Cultus" cod are now caught off the coast of California. The fresh cod is best cooked by

broiling or baking, and is cooked in much the same manner as any other fish. An ordinary size small cod will broil nicely in about twenty minutes. It should not be buttered while cooking, but a small amount of butter may be melted over the fish after it has been baked or

The salted codfish is the form in which it is most used, and many of my readers perhaps do not even know that it is possible to buy fresh cod. The salted cod is perfectly wholesome if it is soaked overnight and then parboiled to get out all of the salt.

Most housewives cook fish with milk or cream and a flour sauce, and it is then frequently served prove of this combination from a dietetic standpoint, although I remember with pleasure the taste of this mixture which I used to eat before I was so dietetically-minded. I would especially recommend to my readers the following recipe:

Rev. Francis Tondorf Report-

Cables Carried News. Washington, Nov. 29 .- (AP) -Father Francis A. Tondorf, director of the Georgetown University seismological observatory, and widely known as a student of earth disturbances, died today.

His death came unexpectedly. He appeared at a dinner with other priests and college officials as usual last night, but this morning when he failed to appear, associates went to his room to find him dead in bed. He had apparently succumbed to a heart attack during the night.

Tondorf was one of the foremost seismologists of the world. One of his most notable pieces of work was placing of the Japanese earthquake of 1923 many hours before the world at large heard about this major catastrophe.

At that time he located by means of his delicate instruments almost exactly the center of the gigantic earth disturbance. In many other

instances he also calculated the area in which earth movements had occurred long before they were reported by telegraph and cable.


