

'TINYMITES' AND 'LITTLE JOE' MOURN AS 'KNICK' PASSES ON

Noted Artist Will Be Buried at Auburn, Washington.

Cleveland, Jan. 28.—(AP)—Irving S. Knickerbocker, known as "Knick" to thousands of newspaper readers through his comic drawings and sketches, which appeared daily in newspapers throughout the country, is dead as the result of injuries received in an automobile accident here.

Knickerbocker, who at 32 had established himself as one of the leading comic artists in the country, was killed when the automobile in which he was riding was struck by another car.

MEDICAL HISTORY OF CHINA, QUEER

Modern Doctor Describes Odd Superstitions Concerning Illness by Natives

Shanghai, China. — (AP)—Describing queer superstitions and belief that made the medical history of China 2,000 years ago one of the most interesting and weird, some of which still survive, Dr. K. M. Wong, widely known Chinese physician, is confident that China will soon be educated up to the standards of western civilization.

Either Killed or Cured. "It usually took something to appease a deity," Doctor Wong said, "but in the end, one either got well or died."

New Philosophy. "In the next period, a new philosophy of disease began to spread," Dr. Wong declares. "Sheng Nung, a mythological creature with the head of an ox and the body of a man is supposed to have experimented with herbs for medicinal purposes."

Ordinarily the wheels are drawn up only for landing on water and released to convert the ships into land planes for coming down to the ground.

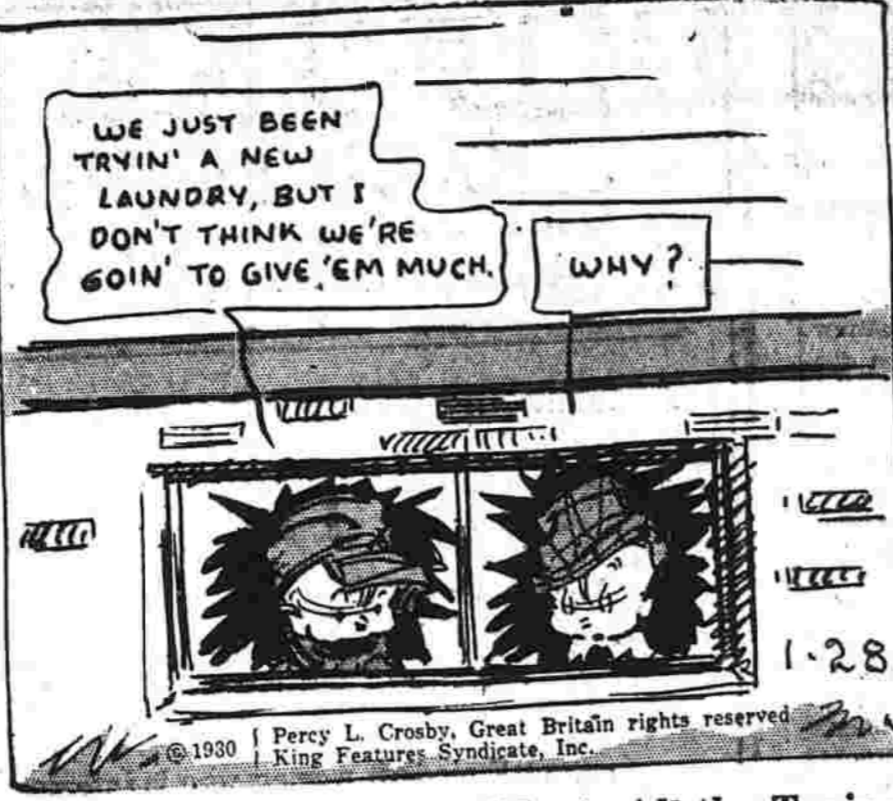
Government Gets \$4,000 In Trio Of Dead Letters

Washington (AP)—Three missives that arrived at the dead letter division of the postoffice in Washington brought government coffers \$4,000.

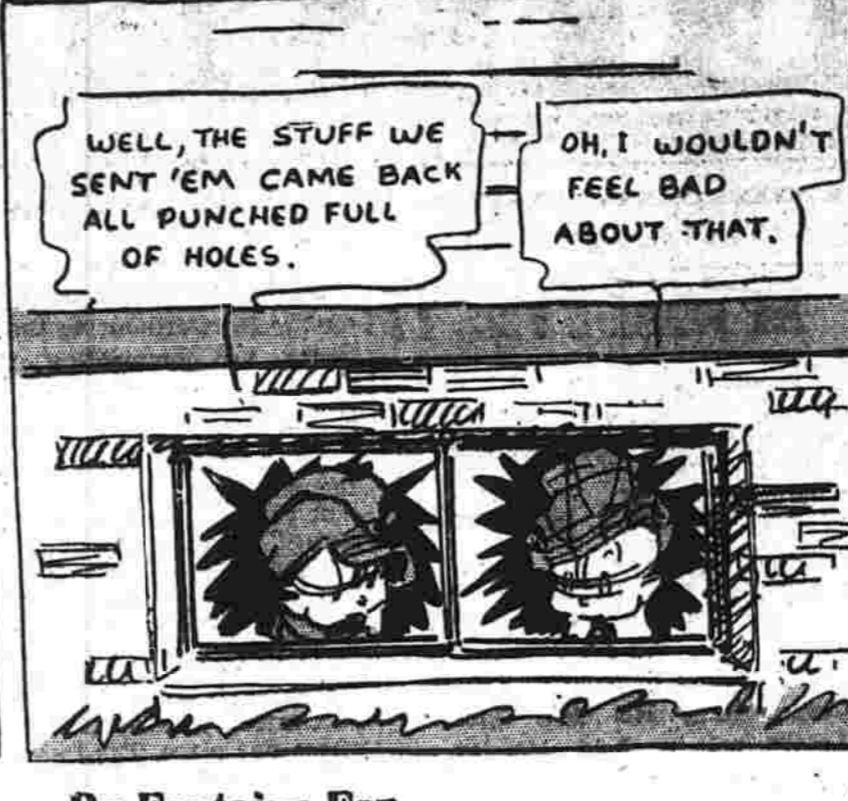
The letters contained bills of like denomination and were received within a few hours of each other. The addresses indicated they were penned by the same person, probably a woman.

All efforts failed to locate the sender or the persons to whom the letters were addressed.

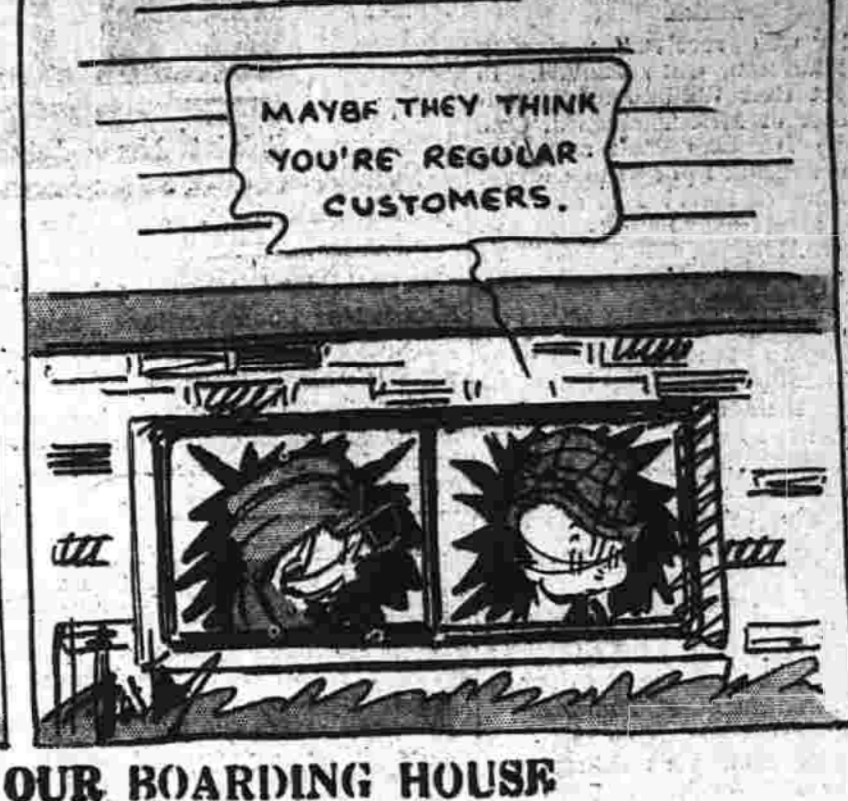

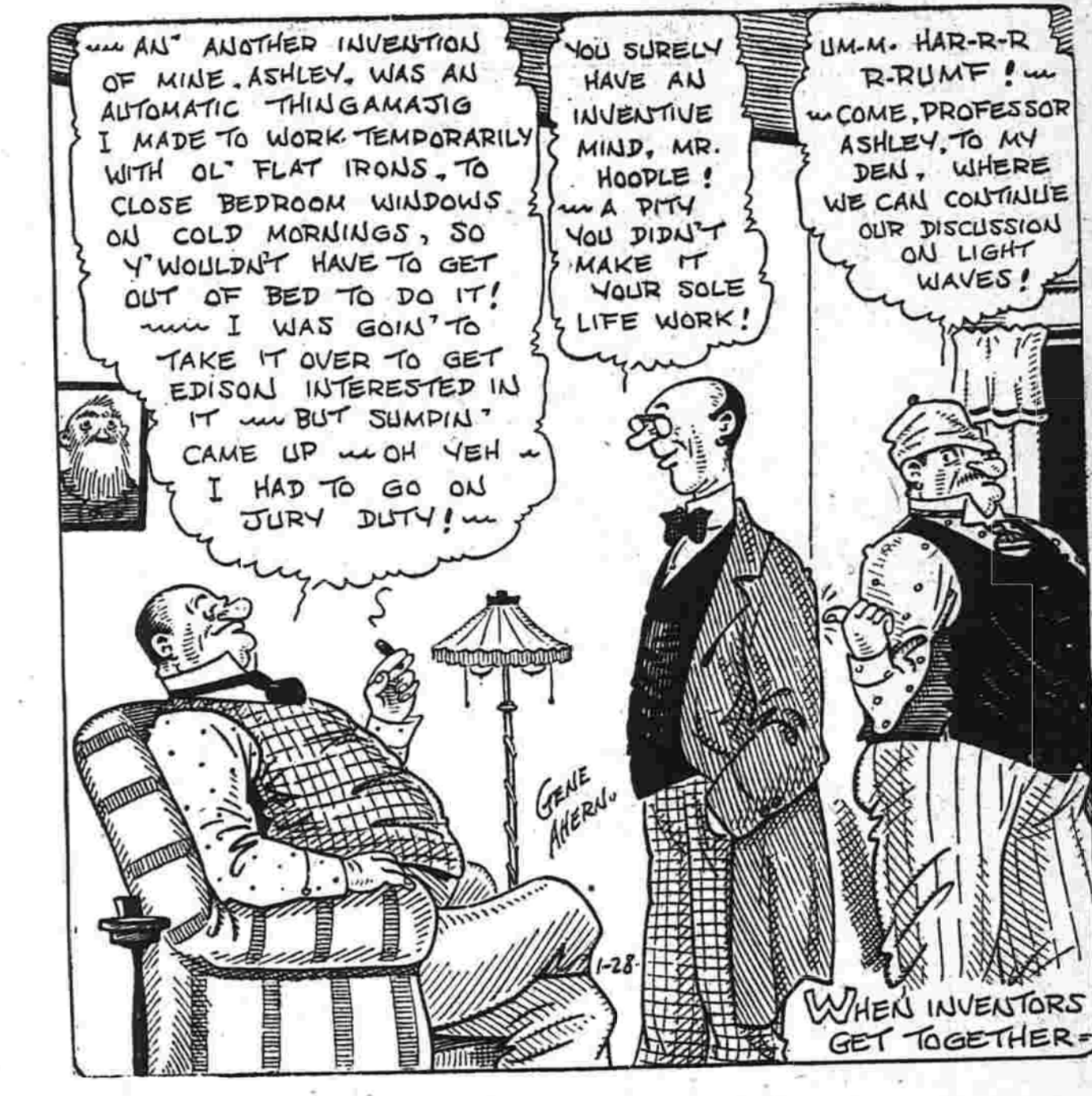

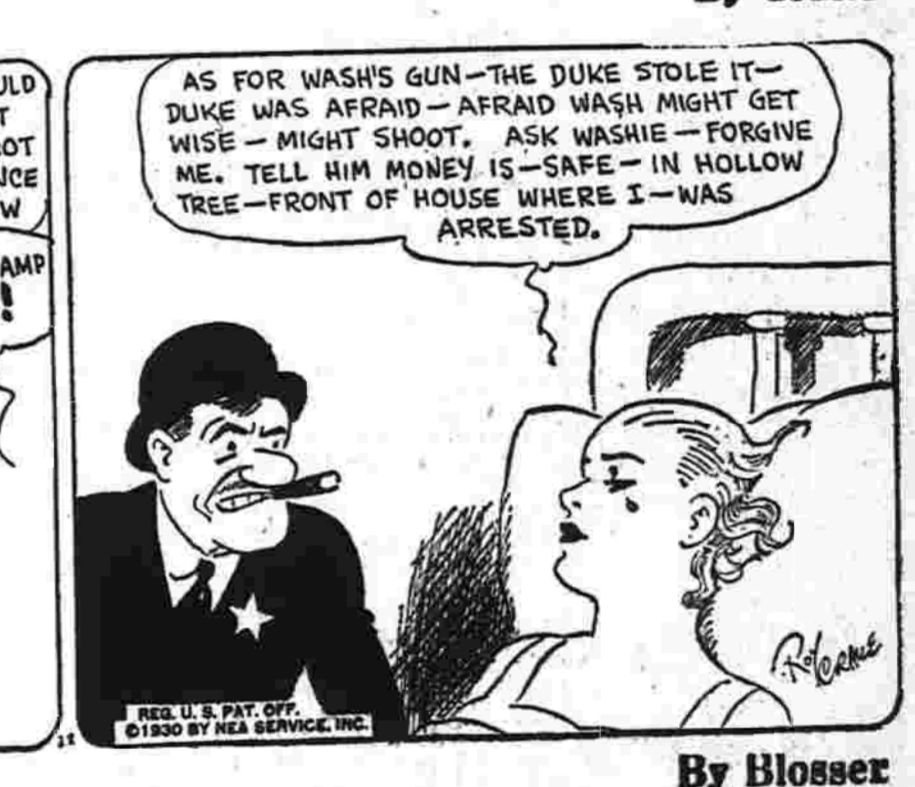
