



It was understood that the resignation was tendered because of the serious condition of the chief justice who has been in Asheville, N. C., for more than a week after being confined to his home here for some time. Taft is returning h re tomorfrom from Asheville.

Robert A. Taft said there was no significance to this change and that his father could be as comfortable here as he could be in Asheville

and desired to return home. The resignation of Taft removes from official life one of the outstanding figures of the present time.
