

Get Together in First of a Series of Heart to Heart **Conversations** Regarding Naval Ratios-U. S. Concedes Ratio of 60 P. C. of American Tonnage and Japan Wants 70.

London, Feb. 4 .- (AP) - The naval delegates of the United States and Japan, following this morning's general conference session, got totions regarding naval ratios as ef-

fecting the two countries. At the invitation of Henry L. Stimson, American secretary of state, Reijiro Wakatsuki, chief of the Japanese delegation, went to the secretary's hotel where they secluded themselves with the idea of talking over the problem of the number of 10,000-ton cruisers Japan shall have in relation to the totals of the United States.

As the two leaders faced each other in this problem, their positions were this: The United States conceded Japan a ratio of 60 per 70 per cent.
