

Speaker Longworth said today that "there would be no effort to rush the tariff bill through the House.'

To Be Discussed Monday The bill formally was messaged to the House from the Senate today. It will lie on the Speaker's table until Monday.

"We desire to giv: the Senate a rest and the members of the House an opportunity to study the Senate amendments," Longworth said. "No one yet knows what is to be done.

Conferences are to be held during this week to determine the course." Longworth said that before Monday the manner in which the measure will be considered will have been determined by the Republican House leaders.

SENATE PASSES TARIFF. Washington, March 25 .- The Hawley-Smoot tariff bill late yesterday rode triumphantly through the last violent assault of its Democratic and insurgent foes and passed the Senate by the unexpected'y large margin of 53 to 31.

The once powerful coalition of Democrats and insurgent Republicans, which for many months heid the Senate in the hollow of its hand, and revised rates up and downward at will, blew up with a loud bang when Vice-President Curtis ordered the clerk to call the roll at 4:40 o'clock.

Futile Denunciations. Ten minutes later, when the vote had been recapitulated and every member of the Senate had been placed on record, nine insurgents and eight Democrats had gone over to the standard of high protection. All that remained of the old coalition was a group of 26 Democrats and five irreconcilable insurgents, and their frantic denunciations of the bill in the final hours of debate, their insistence that it would be known as the executive mansion until he has "Joe Grundy's billion dollar steal" rather than as the Hawley-Smoot bill, seemed unimportant compared with the clear majority of 22 which sent the bill to a conference committee where the Old Guard Republicans will be in complete control., It was apparent all through the five hours of debate which preceded the final vote that the leaders of the old coalition knew they were beaten and badly beaten, too. Angry words were hurled across the floor by Democrats who resented the desertion of their former comrades of the coalition. They uttered warnings that the debenture plan, which the insurgents offered as an excuse for their votes in favor of the bill, would be strangled in the conference committee, and that as a result the farm States would be worse off under the new tariff than under existing law. Before he starts out in the world, he belongs to his mother. After that he is exposed to every sort of influence and from that time on her work consists less in actual building than in combating outside persuasions, and errors based upon her own early mistakes.

Right morals, manners, and emotions should be instilled now. and undesirable things kept out. The work of eliminating the wrong things and planting the right ones is the all-important thing at this time.

Obedience, of course, must be established now, but not at the expense of personality and a generous amount of freedom of thought and behaviour. A child trained properly at this time should give very little trouble later on, unless he is of a peculiar temperament that needs help rather than censure.

We are too quick to call the impulsive child, or the headstrong child, or the too-sensitive, shy one abnormal. We're forever talking of the problem child, too. Few children belong to either of these classes. What is a normal child, anyway? And all chil-

ANNUNCIATION DAY

On March 25, according to Biblical tradition, the angel Gabriel announced to the Virgin Mary the incarnation of Christ. The earliest authentic evidence of the celebration of the feast of the Annunciation is in a canon of the Council of Toledo, Spain, held 656.

For a long period this day marked the beginning of the legal year in England, where it became known as Lady Day. In 1240 the Synod of Worcester forbade all servile work on that day, and the various provincial and diocesan councils in England confirmed the edict.

Always highly observed in England, Lady Day has come to have a fiscal as well as religious significance, for it is observed there as the first quarter of the year for rents

and other payments. The paydays in England have been arbitrarily fixed on Lady Day, Midsummer Day, Michaelmas Day and Christmas because it is believed such important days are better as reminders of duty to landlords than the 30th or 31st of the month would likely be.
