## 19 DIE, 11 HURT **AS TRAIN HITS BIG MOTOR BUS**

#### Auto Demolished and Wreck Burned; Victims Horribly Mangled; 27 Persons in Bus at Time of Crash.

Albuquerque, April 11.-(AP) -Nineteen persons were killed and 11 injured when a Santa Fe train struck a Pickwick Transcontinental bus at Isleta, N. M., said reports to railroad officials here.

The accident occurred seven miles south of Albuquerque. The bus was eastbound and the train westbound, reports said. Every available ambulance from surrounding towns was sent to the scene.

## JOHNSON BUSY, CANNOT ACCEPT SENATE'S OFFER

#### Asks Vice President to Get Someone Else to Conduct Probe of Expenditures in Senatorial Campaigns.

Washington, April 11 — (AP)— Senator Johnson, Republican, Cali-fornia, today asked Vice President Curtis to relieve him of the chairmanship of the newly appointed committee to investigate expenditures of Senatorial candidates in this year's elections. In a letter to the vice president, the California Senator said: "My time is so wholly occupied with my duties, and particularly those which have come to me as chairman of the commerce committee of the Senate, that it is utterly impossible for me to under-

## LOST RECORDS **DELAY TRIAL** IN HUB PROBE

#### Analyses of Confiscated Liquor Disappear; Legislature to Give Atty.-General Added Powers to Proceed

Boston, April 11.-(AP)-The disappearance of certain records important to the prosecution of the Garrett investigation today evoked from Representative Roland D. Sawyer a promise to attorney-General Joseph E. Warner that, "if any added power be needed by you to sift this matter most thoroughly, your friends in the Legislature are ready to give you that."

Sawyer's assurance was in the form of a letter to the attorneygeneral who had admitted that his staff of investigators have been occasioned considerable difficulty by the disappearance of records of analyses of liquor confiscated by the

"We are very well satisfied with the treaty which is in prospect from our labors," said Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald after & meeting of the heads of the delegations at St. James's Palace this morning. "The treaty is a substantial step in the direction toward which we have been striving in the face of difficulties which at times appeared to be almost insurmountable."

#### Tremendous Job

The drafting of the treaty and getting it in shape for signing by next Thursday is a tremendous job and some of the experts were doubtful if it could be achieved. Most of the delegations today were hard at work preparing a treaty draft and virtually the whole American delegation was busy getting its treaty

All this rough material will have to be pulled into shape by the conference drafting committee which was provided for today. Dwight W. Morrow was selected as American member of this body, Commander Harold C. Train and J. Theodore Marriner are the American members of a parallel experts' committee to which drafting problems will be submitted. These committees will work almost unceasingly through the

week-end. The scene at St. James's Palace this morning was one of exeraordinary activity. The 'arge handsome suite of rooms which has been assigned the conference hardly sufficed to accommodate the various committees participating in preparation of the treaty. When a press conference was held, the newspaper men found themselves crowded out of their usual quarters.





#### DR. HOWARD EDWARDS, COLLEGE HEAD, DEAD

Kingston, R. I., April 11.—(AP)
—Dr. Howard Edwards, president
of Rhode Island State College since
1906, died here yesterday in his
76th year. He had been ill several

meeks.

In his 24 years of leadership the institution rose to full collegiate standing from a small school. An undergraduate body of 49 students increased in numbers to 610 and the faculty was more than doubled in size. Seven buildings were added.

A native of Fauquier county, Vt... Dr. Edwards was graduated from Randolph Macon College in that state in 1876 and in later years studied in France and Germany. He specialized in languages.

After several rears of preparatory school teaching in the south, he was appointed to the faculty of the University of Arkansas in 1885. He went to Michigan Agricultural College in 1890, remaining there 16 years. 1906 he became president of Rhode Island State College.

## WITH REFLECTORS

State Law Goes Into Effect May 10-Here Are the Correct Specifications.

A ruling issued by the State Motor Vehicle Department will require that on and after May 10, 1930, all motor vehicles operating under commercial, combination or trailer registration and having an over-all width of six feet or more, must be equipped with lights or reflectors to indicate the width of such vehicles. The lights or reflectors must be of approved type and installed in accordance with specifications issued

by the department. The specifications call for two lights or reflectors on the front and two lights or reflectors on the rear of the body of the vehicle, placed to show the extreme width. Each light must be placed not less than light must be placed not less than two feet, nor more than twelve feet and six inches, above the ground.

There are other styles, to be sure. Some of these are modifications of the custom last, but the jazz models of years past has been cast aside. Some toes are a bit more blunt than the present custom last, built for the man who considers foot comfort the first consideration.

Black shoes, of course, will get its proper reception, being worn alternately with the brown footwear. The latter is expected for day wear and the former for night service.





NAPOLEON'S ABDICATION






