Lease Runs Out The present septic tanks are on leased property, Cheney Brothers SAVANT SAYS UNIVERSE being the owner. The Eighth district formerly leased the right of way for its septic tanks and main sewage system from Cheney Brothers at one dollar per year. The lease ran out last year and the contract with Cheney Brothers gave the district the right to renew it at the same price. However, this matter was neglected and the lease ran out without being renewed and now British the district's option is void. Cheney Brothers are now charging the dis-trict \$270 annually for the use of their land.


