ALLEGED SWINDLER FINALLY ARRESTED

Rochester, N. Y., July 23.—(AP)—Charles K. Faulkner, 36, New York broker, was being held here today in connection with alleged stock swindling deals amounting to about \$20,000 for which he had been sought by police of New York and New Haven for six weeks. Detectives arrested him last night on a fugitive from justice warrant charging him with first degree grand larceny. Faulkner, who had been in hiding in Brockport, near here, was identified by Harry A. Brinkhoff, president of the Brinkhoff Electric Co. of New Jersey and New York, who acted as representative for Harry French, New Haven city attorney. The Complaint The New York broker is specifically charged with defrauding Thomas P. Smallman, New Haven business man, of \$2,500 by accepting money for stocks which were never delivered. Police also charge that in a similar manner he defrauded E. B. Bellamy, also of New Haven of \$6,000 and others in New York city. Listed in "Who's Who in New York State" as former confidential agent for two years, Faulkner is said to have left New York six weeks ago, two weeks before the New York bureau of securities is reported to have raided his brokerage offices at 420 Fifth avenue. He had obtained a position as director of stock sales with a large manufacturing concern here, police said. About one-third of the population of Durant, Okla., attends Sunday school regularly.

MENUS For Good Health

A Week's Supply Recommended By Dr. Frank B. McCoy

Dr. McCoy's menus suggested for the week beginning Sunday, July 27th:

Sunday
Breakfast—Coddled eggs, Melba toast. Stewed or fresh figs with cream.
Lunch—Steamed carrots with parsley butter, cooked celery. Sliced tomatoes on lettuce.
Dinner—Tomato and celery soup. Roast veal with Melba toast dressing, string beans. Stuffed beef salad. Ice cream.

Monday
Breakfast—Crisp waffle, broiled ham. Applesauce.
Lunch—Melon, or other fresh fruit (one kind) as desired.
Dinner—Broiled steak, soufflé of squash. Combination salad. Baked peaches, with dash of whipped cream.

Tuesday
Breakfast—Eggs poached in milk, served on Shredded Wheat Biscuit, (retosted). Stewed prunes.
Lunch—Corn on the cob, spinach, shredded lettuce.
Dinner—Roast mutton, baked ground turkeys and beef. McCoy salad, (lettuce, tomatoes and cucumbers). Jello or Jell-well.

Wednesday
Breakfast—Cottage cheese, fresh pineapple.
Lunch—Cream of spinach soup, celery. Avocado salad.
Dinner—Baked ham and whole tomatoes, string beans. Salad of shredded raw cabbage. Baked apple.

Thursday
Breakfast—Coddled eggs, crisp bacon, Melba toast. Stewed raisins.
Lunch—Pint of buttermilk, ten or 12 dates.
Dinner—Roast beef, carrots roasted with meat, zucchini. Salad of quartered cucumbers. Ice cream.

Friday
Breakfast—Toasted breakfast food, with cream (no sugar). Stewed apricots.
Lunch—Corn and string beans en casserole, lettuce.
Dinner—Baked white fish, artichokes. Salad of stuffed tomatoes. Jello or Jell-well.

Saturday
Breakfast—French omelet crisp waffle. Pear sauce.
Lunch—Cantaloupe a la mode.
Dinner—Stuffed pork chops, cooked greens, mashed turnips. Salad of chopped cabbage and parsley. Applesauce.

Corn and string beans en casserole. Cut tender string beans into small pieces and cook in a small amount of water for about 15 minutes. Cut an equal amount of corn from the cob, first scoring each row of kernels with a sharp knife. If any liquid remains on the beans, drain and save for soup, add beans to corn with a little cream and bake for 20 minutes, allowing to brown on top.
Corn may be used in this way with celery, asparagus, spinach or young carrots. When using the fresh spinach, shred very fine and do not cook before mixing with the corn as with the string beans, but put all into casserole and bake at once.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

(Grapejuice for High Blood Pressure)
Question:—Mrs. A. M. writes: "I read with much interest your daily articles, and would like to know if grapejuice is harmful to people having high blood pressure. I am very fond of it, but having high blood pressure, would like to be sure whether or not I should drink it."

Answer: Grapejuice is an excellent drink and when used should be taken in place of a meal or between meals, but not in addition to an ordinary meal. Those with a tendency to high blood pressure should use the grapejuice to which no sugar has been added.

(Strengthening the Heart)
Question:—F. J. writes: "My age is twenty. How can I strengthen my heart?"

Answer: The heart may be strengthened through systematic physical culture, and by living on a careful diet. Only a small amount of the right kind of food should be used, and care must be observed in avoiding all inharmonious mixtures of food which produce excessive stomach or intestinal gas.

(Abnormal Sleepiness)
Question:—F. D. writes: "I am a man of 70 years of age, have always had good health, but have always been abnormally sleepy, and as I grow older it becomes worse."

Answer: The most important cause of abnormal sleepiness is from overeating. Even though you are a hard worker you probably eat more food than your body requires. The large amount of energy which you use in digesting this food takes away vital force from other parts of your body, including the brain. Try cutting down the amount of food you have been using to about one-half and see if it is not right.

AUTO VICTIM DIES
Torrington, July 25.—(AP)—Mrs. Eunice Halsey, aged 77, of Orange, N. DETROIT MOURNS BUCKLEY'S DEATH

Detroit, July 25.—(AP)—Twenty thousand persons waited silently in line last night and early today to pay tribute to the memory of Gerald E. (Jerry) Buckley, announcer

for radio station WMBC, slain Wednesday by gangsters at the close of the successful campaign to recall Mayor Charles E. Bowles. Persons he had aided financially sent scores of floral tributes. The management of station WMBC announced that telegrams had been received from listeners in from all sections of the midwest expressing sorrow and sympathy at Buckley's death. Seven men were in custody in connection with the slaying of Buckley. Police said they expected to issue a warrant for one of them before the day was over.

The man who police said they could connect with the killing is Jack Klein, movie operator, who was sitting with Buckley in the La Salle Hotel lobby when the rain of bullets began. Klein was not

wounded. He was held for questioning immediately after the shooting, then released. Later he was returned to custody and while held as a witness, was formally arrested. The base for the charge was not disclosed.

The other six are reputed gangsters, Frank Connerso, Rosario Acosta and Alfio Castiglione, were arrested by police in the house where they had been rooming. A shotgun and revolver, the latter of the same caliber as that from which the 11 bullets that pierced Buckley's body came, were found in their room. Frank Lopez, Anthony Misnoski and Frank Robertson were arrested by state police near Ann Arbor. Police said they were Chicago gangsters "hiding out" in Benton Harbor.

POLITICS BLAMED IN SHOOTING CASE

State Senator Is Shot On Street—If He Recovers He Will Be Blind.

Moneks Corner, S. C., July 25.—(AP)—Political hostility that has existed for years in Berkeley county today was blamed for the shooting of State Senator E. J. Dennis, "Boss" of "Hell Hole" politics.

With election day only a few weeks away, Dennis is in a Charleston hospital with little hope of recovery. If he lives, he will be blind for life.

Buckshot fired at him yesterday as he was purchasing a watermelon pierced his brain and optic nerve.

Against Moonshining

Dennis was active in fighting moonshining in "Hell Hole," a name applied to the county because of its numerous feuds and widespread liquor making. He has campaigned vigorously against it the past week.

In 1929, he himself was accused of being in conspiracy with the moonshiners, but was cleared of the charge. Since then he has been even more active in his efforts to clean up "Hell Hole."

Had Been Warned

Dennis told Governor John G. Richards in Columbia recently that he had been warned by political rivals that he was a "marked man."

W. L. Thornley, a young Moncks Corner man, is being held in the state penitentiary in Columbia, charged with the shooting.

Witnesses said he drove up near the market, parked his car on the opposite side of the street, got out, leveled a shot gun across the hood of the machine and fired at Dennis. He then drove off.

Thornley told authorities who arrested him he "remembered nothing."



Chicago, July 25.—(AP)—A new hot wave swept up on the Middle West today.

The Weather Bureau saw no immediate relief, although temperatures in the hundreds like those experienced last week were not anticipated. "Generally speaking," said the Bureau, "readings will be above normal, and temperature changes will be unimportant."

The only place in the service re-

porting official temperatures of 100 or higher were Phoenix, Ariz., with 112; Fort Smith, Ark., 102; and Shreveport, La., 100. East, West, North and South, however, all had readings of 90 or hotter, and Medicine Hat, where weather is brewed, had an unusual 94.

have been of far greater proportions. The great city of Naples, where a large part of the people live in buildings of numerous stories and closely crowded, barely escaped the full force of the temblor.

It is peculiarly unfortunate that in a region like that visited by this seismic disturbance two factors work together to bring about such lamentable results from these visitations. It is bad enough to have one's country peculiarly liable to quakes; it is additionally unfortunate when the character of the terrain is such that the villages and cities have to be built so compactly for lack of elbow room.

However, the Italian people cannot make over their country so as to provide for all their communities the spacious sites that would enable them to house their people in quake-proof and separate homes.

Up at Montpelier, Vermont, the other day, William Pickett of Woodbury got the most monumental soaking we ever heard of as being experienced by a game law violator.

In Vermont they don't place a very high value on the time of a prisoner working out a fine, and Mr. Pickett, being broke, was committed to the jug for 64 days, or at the rate of two days for a dollar.

All this, however, brings about the reflection that times change, even in Vermont. Because it isn't such a terrifically long time ago that the one and only sure way of producing a gale of laughter in that tight-lipped state was to mention a game law—any kind of a game law—and when the accepted idea of a trout was that it was something to be cooked like potato chips in vast numbers in deep fat—and about that size.

Delighted as Manchester people are—or at least as we presume they are—over the erection of understandable road signs of good visibility at the Center and, particularly, at Depot Square, some of them are still ungracious enough not to ignore the peculiar arithmetic that appears to govern calculations in the office of the Highway Department at Hartford.

Dreadful as is the toll of death taken by the most recent of Italian earthquake disasters, the extent of the catastrophe does not even approach that of the quake of 1908 which almost totally demolished the city of Messina, Sicily, and destroyed some 80,000 lives on the island and in the mainland province of Calabria.

Furthermore, we have had some inquiries as to the reason why the direction boards at the Square send motorists, bound for Willimantic, to the Center when a much shorter cut for them is through Woodbridge street to Manchester Green.

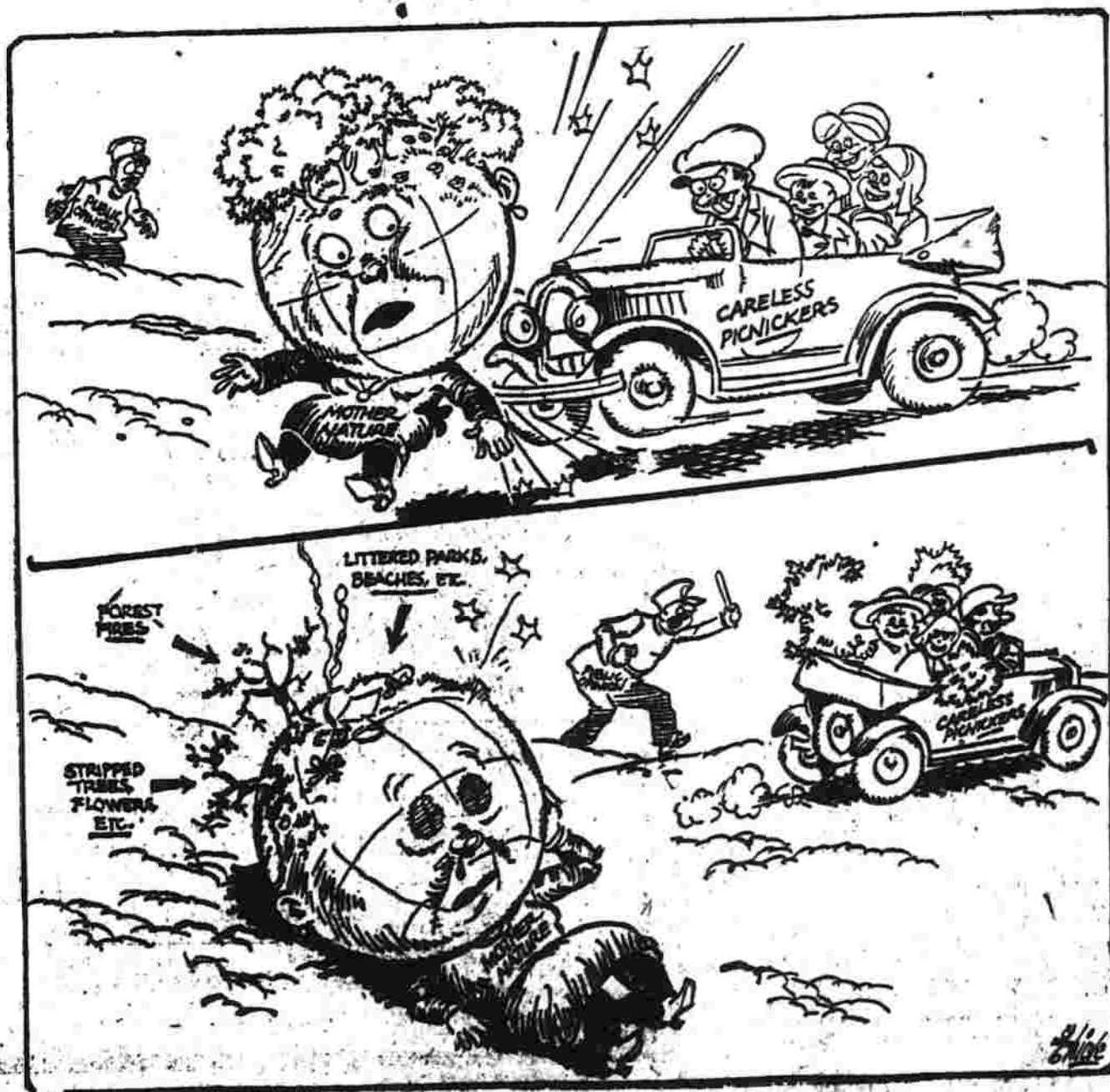

ANOTHER WITNESS TO HELP MOONEY
Cleveland Man Says He Saw Mexicans Place Suitcase On the Street.

Cleveland, July 25.—(AP)—A new witness who said he was willing to testify that Thomas Mooney and Warren K. Billings are innocent of the Preparedness Day bombing that cost nine lives in San Francisco, 14 years ago, told his version here today of the explosion.

Adam Krumesc, caretaker at the home of a Cleveland multi-millionaire, said he believed three Mexicans were to blame for the blast, for which Mooney and Billings are serving life sentences in San Quentin prison.

Krumesc, a Hungarian, said he was a 22-year-old roustabout in San Francisco at the time of the explosion. He was sitting on a fruit box on the sidewalk in direct view of the blast when it occurred, he said.

His Story
"I noticed three men who appeared to be Mexicans, loitering on the opposite side of the street. I could see across the street and noticed these three men acted very suspiciously. I noticed they left Stewart street and turned into Market, walking as if they were in a hurry." Krumesc's signed statement read.

"Almost simultaneously with their departure I noticed a suitcase standing on the curb where they had been loitering. A terrific explosion occurred. I saw debris and parts of bodies flying through the air."

It was this suitcase which evidence indicated contained the explosive which Mooney and Billings were convicted of having left there. Krumesc said he hurriedly left the scene after the explosion, fearing he would be arrested by police as a witness or as a suspicious person.

In the years that followed, Krumesc said he worked as a sailor and rarely read a newspaper, so that he never knew Mooney and Billings had been convicted. It was difficult for him to read English, he said.

Two weeks ago he read in a Cleveland newspaper that John MacDonald, found in Baltimore, had denied the testimony MacDonalld gave which helped convict Mooney and Billings. Krumesc said he determined then to tell what he saw of the explosion "because I hate to see innocent men suffer longer." Krumesc said if San Francisco authorities would send for him he would be glad to go there and testify.

GAMBLERS UNDER BONDS

Hartford, July 25.—(AP)—Three Hartford men who had been sought for several days in connection with a gambling house holdup, today were at liberty under bonds after being surrendered to the police.

The three men who surrendered last night, police charge, aided in the frustration of the holdup and in the attempt to keep the affair quiet. They are Edward "Cookie" Farvill, 31, charged with assault with a dangerous weapon; Rudolph "Boss" Patrizi, 39, who faces a charge of assault and battery; and Ed Moore, 27, who is charged with keeping a gambling house.

When the three men were arrested they were accompanied by their counsel, who surrendered them at Police Headquarters.

VISITING CONNECTICUT
Albany, N. Y., July 25.—(AP)—Governor Roosevelt planned to leave Albany today for Newington, Conn., to dedicate a home for crippled children. From Newington, the governor proposed to motor to his Hyde Park home to spend the week end.

WASHINGTON'S TROWEL USED AT CEREMONY

Washington, July 25.—(AP)—The trowel George Washington used to place mortar on the Capitol's cornerstone in 1793 was taken from its resting place today for the ceremony of laying another cornerstone—that of headquarters for the National Education Association.

C. Fred Cook, Masonic official, was selected to lay the cornerstone for the structure, which also will be the headquarters office of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers.

William John Cooper, commissioner of education, said in a prepared speech: "These ceremonies are symbolic; they record achievement and they register aspiration."

Another speaker E. Ruth Frytle, of Lincoln, Nebraska, said the building marked the replacement "of theories of foreign origin, by democracy in education." She added that "European nations are already beginning to borrow from us as we formerly borrowed from them."

The new building, costing approximately \$200,000, will be ready for occupancy by January, 1931. Its simple Colonial pattern was designed by Frank Irving Cooper, Boston architect.

DOCTORS PROTEST USE OF NEW FOUND VACCINE

Paris, July 25.—(AP)—Several doctors, including one from the United States and one from Canada, expressed opposition to general use of the Calmette-Guérin tuberculosis vaccine during yesterday's session of the First International Microbiological Congress.

They disagreed regarding its safety with Dr. Albert Calmette, assistant director of the Pasteur Institute, who on Wednesday defended his discovery, maintaining the German experts had absolved the vaccine of responsibility for the deaths of three score children in Lubeck during recent months.

Dr. S. A. Petroff, director of research of the Trudeau, N. Y., sanitarium, said that the Calmette vaccine called "BCG" was capable of developing virulence.

His view was supported by Dr. H. A. Watson, of Ottawa, who affirmed that during five years of experiments five per cent of inoculated animals developed "extensive" generalized tuberculosis and most died.

Several other doctors voiced opposition to the Calmette vaccine, with which it was said 250,000 children in Europe had been inoculated since 1924.
