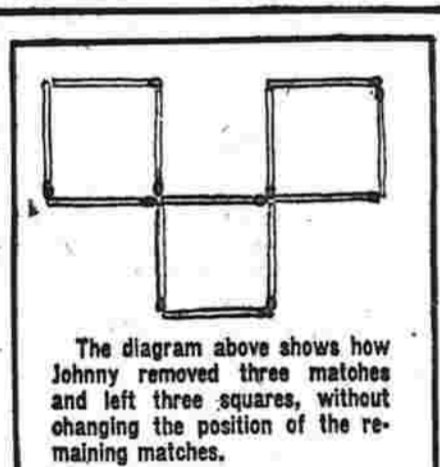

The diagram above shows how Johnny removed the matches and left three squares, without changing the position of the remaining matches.

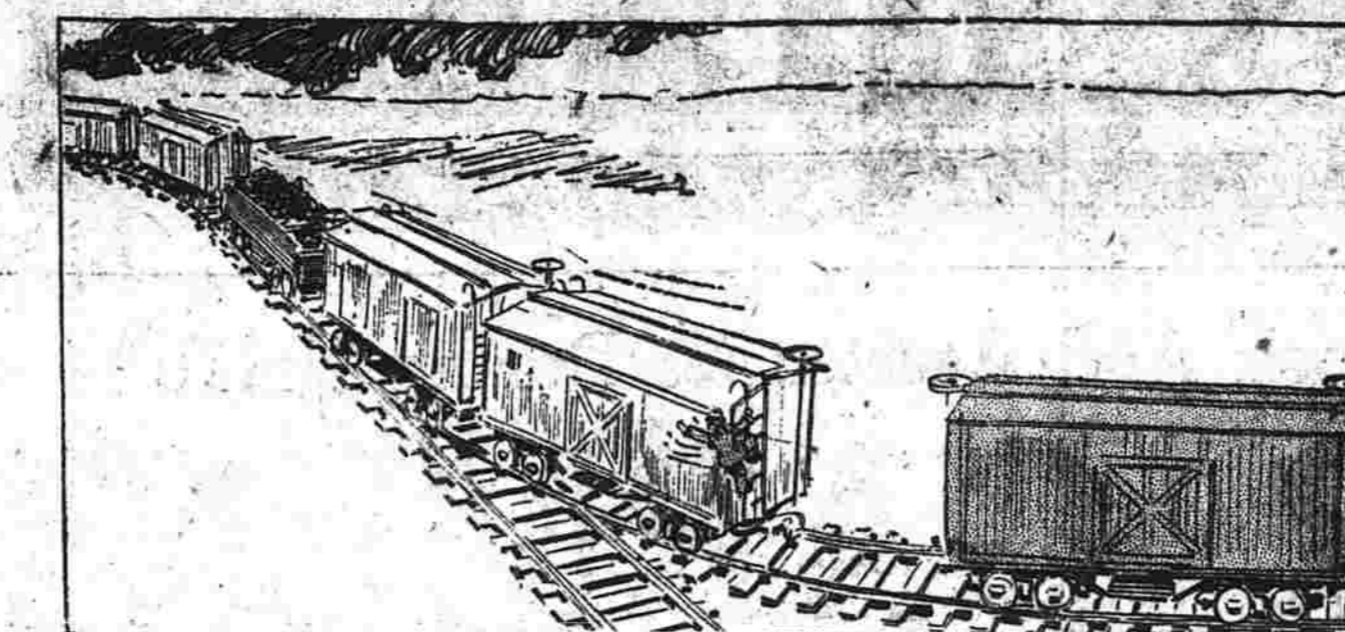
