

Spread mixture on baking sheet 12x16 inches. Sprinkle with nuts. Bake at 400 degrees 15 minutes. While, warm, cut with cookie cutter, or. mark into squares. Cool and break

To keep apples through the winter bore holes in the bottom and sides of a barrell and store on a platform a foot or more above the ground. 




