Powerful Columns Push Near Manila; May Be No Battle

Strong Indications Philippine Capital Will Be Liberated Without Major Fight; One American Force Less Than 18 Air Miles Away.

General MacArthur's Headquarters, Luzon, Feb. 3.—(AP)—Two powerful American armored columns raced toward Manila from the north today amid strong indications the Philippine capital would soon be liberated without a major fight. One U. S. battle-hardened First Cavalry (dismounted) division drove a new arrow toward Manila Thursday by sweeping 57 miles in 24 hours down the east flank of the central Luzon plain to Sabang, within 24 miles of Manila, and beyond.

Japanese Tanker Heads for Bottom

One Berlin broadcast said Marshal Gregory Zhukov's troops had been hit by a bridgehead over the Oder near Kustrin. Columns spear near Stettin.
