
for individually. Subject of Serious Issue The state labor relations act has long been a subject of serious issue in the assembly, where two sets of measures have been intro-duced, one by Republican House members, the other with the support of the Connecticut Federa-tion of Labor (AFL) and the CIO

state organization. The Senate reportedly favors the labor-supported measure which is modeled on the New York state statute and opposes the House bills which have been classed by labor leaders as "anti-Inbor" and "anti-closed shop." Labor leaders estimate that passage of their bills would give collective bargaining rights to 250,000 workers employed in intrastate firms not covered by the Federal act. That bill has been opposed by representatives of industrial and
